## Public Works RECOMMENDATION FOR COUNCIL ACTION

**Subject:** Approve a resolution authorizing the fee simple acquisition of Lot 9, Block M, Onion Creek Forest, Section 2, Amended Plat, a subdivision in Travis County, Texas, located at 7002 Thatch Lane, from Michael Gregg Pinson and Steven Alfredo Hernandez for the Onion Creek Voluntary Flood Buyout-FEMA-1606-DR Project, in the amount of \$62,000 for the land and improvements and \$36,400 in owner assisted relocation benefits, plus moving related expenses not to exceed \$10,000, for a total not to exceed \$108,400.

**Amount and Source of Funding:** Funding is available in the Fiscal Year 2007-2008 Capital Budget of the Watershed Protection and Development Review Department.

On July 27, 2006, Council approved and accepted \$6,255,823 from the Federal Emergency Management Agency Hazard Mitigation Grant Program for the Onion Creek Voluntary Flood Buyout-FEMA-1606-DR Project. The purpose of the project is to purchase and demolish up to 118 single-family structures in the floodplain of Onion Creek, an area significantly impacted during the October 17, 1998 and November 15, 2001 floods, and maintain the land as open space. The property and residence located at 7002 Thatch Lane are part of the approved grant program.

The lot to be acquired is approximately 0.24 acres with improvements that include a 1,251 square-foot single-family dwelling (singlewide mobile home). The market value of the property including improvements is \$62,000, as determined by an independent appraisal. The owner has agreed to accept the City's offer and is eligible for relocation expenses estimated to be \$36,400, plus moving related expenses not to exceed \$10,000. The City will relocate those displaced by the project according to the Uniform Relocation Assistance and Real Property Acquisition Policies Act of 1970, as amended.
