The Mayor then read the following veto message:

Mayor's Office,
Austin, Tex., Sept. 16, 1896.

To the Honorable City Council:

Gentlemen, I herewith return to you, with my disapproval,
an ordinance passed on the 1st of September, 1896, entitled
an ordinance appropriating the sum of \$30. for the purpose
of repairing the bridge on Riverside drive, over Clevings Branch
in South Austin. My reasons for disapproving same are as
follows: I made a personal inspection of the bridge and of
the streets and population affected, and found that none of
the residents of South Austin are inconvenienced in getting
to and from the City by the closing of said bridge, those living
east of said Clevings Branch having a good road running up
the Father homestead. The only inconvenience caused by the
closing of said bridge is, that the residents on either side of
the said branch and north of said bridge have to go about
an eighth of a mile to the south and out of the way in com-
municating with each other. The population thus affected is
comparatively small, probably not over a dozen families,
which it would be just to consider their inconvenience if the
City was in a condition to do so, in view of the small
number of citizens affected, the small amount of inconvenience
caused them and the fact that condition is likely to pass away,
I do not consider this a large enough condition to warrant it.

report that on account of the urgent necessity of protecting the valuable Electric Machines in the Power House from lightning, and in pursuance of a resolution passed by the City Council July 20th 1896, an order was given on the 1st instant for twelve station switch board and twenty-four pole line arresters at a cost of \$220.00, to be shipped by express and to be placed at once on the switch board and near the Power house. These arresters have already been received and are now being placed in position. In order to further protect the Electrical distribution system, on the 14th instant an order was given for eight more pairs of pole line arresters, the same to be shipped by freight, and at the same time an order was given for 65,000 pairs of carbons for the arc lamps supplying the City with light at \$15.25 per 100 delivered in Austin, with the understanding that the City should have a reduction on the price stated if a carload for this section could be obtained. These carbons were ordered at this time on account of the necessity of having a full supply before those on hand were exhausted, the supply on hand being quite small.
