

Minutes of a Regular Meeting of the City Council.
Austin, Texas September, 20th 1861.

Hon. Lewis Hancock, Mayor, presiding.

Roll called.

Present Aldermen Delvin, Fischer, Haynes, Horton, Kuhn, Maddox, Miller, Platt, Powell, Read, Robertson, Schneider, Shelley, Stumpf, Taylor, Townsend and Gilmer 13.

Absent Alderman Beatty, Lawless, Lim, Kitzscher and Rosengren 5.

Minutes adopted as printed. On motion of Alderman Platt the minutes of the last regular and subsequent called meetings were approved as printed, without reading.

Pet. of Jacob Stern to erect a wagon scale on Sabine St By Alderman Platt. Petition of Jacob Stern, asking permission to erect a wagon scale on Sabine Street between Fifth and Sixth Streets.

On motion the petition was granted, the work to be done under the supervision of the City Engineer.

Pet. of Henry Moore to have certain bound fees remitted By Alderman Read. Petition of Henry Moore, asking that certain bound fees paid by him be refunded. On motion the petition was referred to the Mayor.

Alderman Kitzscher entered the Council Chamber.

The Mayor laid before the Council petition of Geo. F. Roswell, for damages to milk wagon, caused by running over a water plug.

Alderman Platt moved to grant the petition.

Alderman Taylor moved as a substitute that the petition be referred to the Committee on Claims and Accounts.

Aldermen Beatty, Lawless and Rosengren entered the Council Chamber. The vote was then taken on the motion to grant the petition of Roswell, and the motion prevailed by the following vote:

Pet. of Paul McComb asking that certain tax costs be remitted. By Alderman Shelley, Petition of Paul McComb to have certain costs remitted.

On motion the petition was referred to the Committee on Claims and Accounts.

Alderman Powell, for the Police Committee, to whom was referred the records of the City Marshal for the month of August, presented a report stating that they had been examined and found correct. The report of the Committee was adopted.

Alderman Platt for Claims and Accounts Committee, to whom was referred the petition of Mrs. Tallieh, presented their report stating that they have no authority to grant the petition, and therefore, recommend that it be not granted. The report was adopted.

Alderman Platt, for the Claims and Accounts Committee, to whom was referred the account of Mrs. Ben Walker for damage to cow. Presented a report stating that the bill failed to set forth a single fact connecting the City with the damages claimed, nor is the bill addressed to the Mayor or board of Aldermen, and therefore, report that the claim is not properly before the Committee, and that they, therefore, return same to the Council that it may take such action as they may deem best and

Gentlemen:- Complying with section 99.9. of the Charter of the City of Austin, I am authorized by the Water Light and Power Commission to make the following estimate for the fiscal year ending November 30, 1898, to-wit:

Unfinished Business.

The Mayor laid before the Council an ordinance appropriating the sum of \$ 382.36 to pay approved accounts Street Department. The ordinance was read second time and passed under suspension of the rule by the following vote:

Seas Aldermen Beatty, Belvin, Fischer, Haynes, Norton, Kuhn, Lawless, Maddox, Miller, Nitschke, Platt, Powell, Redd, Robertson, Rosengren, Schneider, Shelley, Stumpf, Taylor, Townsend and Zilker 21.

Nays None.

The Mayor then laid before the Council an ordinance declaring the keeping of hogs within certain limits a misdemeanor, and providing a penalty for its violation, on its final passage Alderman Belvin offered the following amendment:

"In section one, beginning at the end of line six, strike out the following words, "Twenty-seventh Street, to Guadalupe Street, thence south with Guadalupe Street to Twenty-sixth, thence with Twenty-sixth Street to Rio Grande Street," and in lieu thereof insert the following: "Twenty-ninth Street thence west, Twenty-ninth Street to Rio Grande."

The amendment was adopted by the following vote:

Seas Aldermen Beatty, Belvin, Haynes, Norton, Lawless, Maddox, Miller, Nitschke, Powell, Robertson, Shelley, Stumpf, Taylor and Townsend 14. Nays Aldermen Fischer, Kuhn, Platt, Redd, Rosengren, Schneider, Zilker. Alderman Nitschke moved to amend by making the eastern limit's Waller Creek instead of Comal Street.

Alderman Robertson moved to table the amendment, which was lost.

The amendment of Alderman Nitschke was then lost by the following vote:

Alderman Kitchel moved to make East Avenue the east boundary line instead of Comal Street. The amendment was lost by the following vote: Deas Aldermen Belvin Fischer, Norton, Rubin, Miller, Kitchel, Blatt, Read, Schneider Stumpf and Gilmer 11.

Nays Aldermen Bealy, Haynes, Lawless, Maddox, Powell, Roberson, Rosengren, Shelley, Taylor and Townsend 10.

The ordinance was then passed by the following vote:

Deas Aldermen Bealy, Belvin, Haynes, Lawless, Maddox, Miller, Powell, Read, Roberson, Rosengren, Shelley, Stumpf, Taylor and Townsend 14.

Nays Aldermen Fischer, Norton, Rubin, Kitchel, Blatt, Schneider & Gilmer 9.

The Mayor laid before the Council the following special message:

Mayors Office,

Austin, Texas Sept. 20, 1897.

To the Honorable City Council:

Gentlemen: - On view of the outbreak of yellow-fever in the States of Louisiana, Mississippi and Alabama, I have deemed it advisable to put the City in as sanitary a condition as possible, and have instructed the City Engineer and sanitary officer to exercise the utmost activity and vigilance in remedying all abuses, to drain off all stagnant water and to use lime freely wherever it can be beneficially used as a disinfectant. I also instructed the City Marshal to detail the Police force to the special work of systematically inspecting all Alleys, privies, and back alleys, and to enforce a strict compliance with the sanitary ordinances of the City. I am pleased to say that a ready acquiescence has been met with on the part of all our citizens and that the City is rapidly being put in a satisfactory condition of cleanliness. The four carts at the disposition of the sanitary department not being sufficient for the heavy demand thus thrown upon the department, I have instructed the City Engineer to have four of the City street teams brought in from the outside, and to use that number of wagons to supplement the work of cleaning up. I trust these measures will meet your approval and that they along with such others as you may see fit to adopt, will insure perfect cleanliness for the City. Our Streets and Alleys are in an unusually cleanly condition, and the only matter for serious consideration is the cesspools and privies, and I shall use all the powers at my command to enforce cleanliness in that regard. It has been suggested to me that local quarantine should be established by the City. After careful consideration of the matter and consultation with State Health Officer Swearer, City Physician Drs. Dr. G. W. McLaughlin, Dr. Daniel and other physicians, I am of the opinion that local quarantine is not at present necessary or desirable.

There is no fever west of the Mississippi River and many hundreds of miles and a strict State quarantine separate us from the infected districts. Considering the mildness of the epidemic now prevailing and the lateness of the season, it is reasonable to hope that the disease will not secure a foothold within the State, and as long

as it does not local quarantine would seem to be unnecessary. Should the disease enter the State, or the situation change in any particular to the danger of the City, I should at once call you together in special session and ask you to take measures for protection.
