The Chair laid before the Council the following veto message of the Mayor

Austin, Texas, May 14th 1907

To the Hon City Council of the City of Austin Texas

Gentlemen:

I beg to return without my approval a resolution passed by your Honorable Body May 6th 1907 fixing one dollar and seventy five cents as the minimum compensation per day for a day's labor for the following reasons:

First: Should this resolution become effective it will be contradictory of an ordinance passed July 17th 1905 fixing the minimum compensation per day for day labor at not less than one dollar and fifty cents.

Second: Should this resolution become effective, then the head of a department under the ordinance could pay \$1.50 per day for day labor and at the same time under the resolution pay not less than \$1.75 for a day's labor.

- It was (I am well informed) the intention of the author of this resolution that it compensated day laborers on the street force. This however, for the reasons above given, he done by ordinance.

Austin, Tex., April 6, 1907

Honorable City Council:

On retiring from the office of
Mayor of your City, in compliance with the requirements
of the Charter, I desire to briefly review the transaction in the
various departments of the City Government during the past
two years.

I congratulate you upon the City's prosperous condition,
and on the completion of various improvements begun
long before, and which have been completed during my
term of office, as well as those now in course of construction,
all of which have and will greatly add to the appearance
of the City and to the comfort and convenience of the people
generally.

Assessable Values

In the year 1905, the assessed valuation of all property
in the City subject to taxation aggregated \$9,831,147,
while the tax rate levied amounted to 1/23^{1/3} on the one hundred
dollars valuation. For the year 1906, the assessed valuation was
\$10,627,626-, and the rate levied was 1/26^{1/3}. It will be seen that
there was a steady growth in property values during the
past two years, and a decided reduction in the rate of
taxation. Under the rate for last year the City was not
able to meet all current expenses, but was enabled to pay
off a number of old bills that had been allowed to
accumulate since 1901.

City's indebtedness

On Jan 1st 1905, the City had an outstanding bonded
indebtedness of \$1,617,000.00 of which amount \$1,283,500.00
were refunding bonds issued in July 1st, 01, bearing 3% interest
from date of issue till July 1st 1916, at which time they began
bearing 4%, and will continue at the rate till July 1st 1916.
\$320,000 Water and Light bonds issued in 1891, first bearing
5% interest, and \$13,500 refunding bonds issued in 1895, bearing 6%
interest. On Jan 1st, 1907, this bonds in indebtedness has been
reduced \$65,500 leaving them outstanding \$1,528,500.

bearing interest at the rate of 4%. Since Jan 1st 1907, there has been a further reduction of \$15,000. On Oct 1, 1906, the city succeeded in closing a deal with the bondholders, to \$300,000, Water Light-bonds, thereby exchanging therefor an equal amount of its 4% redeeming bonds, thus not only reducing the amount of taxes paid by our people, but putting an end to years of various litigation. In effecting this exchange, the City had to pay Hon F. W. Maddox a fee of \$10,000. for his services, and \$150. for his traveling expenses, also \$200. extra charges on the bonds to and from St Louis on April, 1906, the Council appropriated \$500. to defray the expense of the Mayor, the City Attorney, and a Member of the Council to St Louis and New York for the purpose of making this exchange, but after some delay the parties with whom negotiations were pending declined to accept the City's proposition.

Out of the appropriation of \$500. the Committee expended \$390.65 on said trip, \$40.60 was paid out for Certified Copies of Court papers, Telegraphs etc, the balance \$68.85 was turned over to the City Assessor & Collector.

On Jan 1st 1905, there were judgments pending against the City for default in the payment of the interest on the \$300,000 Water Light-bonds, which interest had not been paid since July 1901. The amount paid in settlement of these judgments in 1905 and 1906 aggregated \$115,591.90. as shown by the books of the City Clerk. The settlement of these judgments re-established the credit of the City, and we have since been pursuing the policy of paying promptly all interest as it became due. At this time there are no suits pending against the City for unpaid interest on its bonds, and there is no accrued interest unpaid.

The previous administration (the Water and Light department) left unpaid a number of accounts aggregating more than \$40,000., all of which have been paid during the past two years except \$3,385.73. Since Jan 1st 1905, \$45,000 has been paid on the annual installments due on the purchase money of the old water and light plant, leaving a balance due \$91,931.25, which under the Contract of Purchase is to be paid in annual installments of \$22,500.

Water, Light and Power Plant

In 1890, the People of Austin by a most decided majority determined upon Municipal ownership of the Water and light service. The plan was to dam the Colorado River at a point three miles west of the City, and thus give the people the Cheapest Power that can be produced. The dam was constructed, the water and light system installed, and Austin became the owner of the power supply.

In 1904 the dam was partially destroyed.
It has since that time been the desire of our people to see it rebuilt, not only that we may again enjoy the very best water and light service that the City could afford, but that the same may be had at such rates that the poor as well as the rich can afford it, but in addition thereto we may have a splendid resort for innocent, healthful amusement and recreation.

The water and light rates under the present system operated by Steam power have been high. It has been necessary to have a high rate in order to meet the actual expenses of operation, extension, and betterments. A comparison of the rates under the Water power system during the life of the dam, and the present steam system is a sufficient argument to convince any reasonable person that the City cannot afford the present system in the face of the fact that the dam can be restored, and water and light rates materially reduced, and all this to be done without the expenditure of any of the People's money, or any risk being assumed by the City for the maintenance of either the dam or the power house. A few weeks ago the people of this City, by a large majority, accepted the proposition made for the re-building of the dam and Power house, and the maintenance of the same for a term of forty years, by the Consolidated Construction Company of New York, the City agreeing to pay said Company \$65,000. annually for said term of years for all the power thus produced. An ordinance embodying the terms of said Contract, in every particular most liberal to the City, has been passed and approved. It would seem that Austin is again about to enjoy the benefits of cheap water and light. It has been my constant wish and continual effort, during the past two years, to bring about this desired change under the proposed Contract with the Consolidated Construction Company, for the sale by it, to the City of the power produced by the construction of the dam, the City will not only be able to furnish cheap water and light to the City, but will, by reason of the electric system now in use, preventing the waste of water, have a large amount of surplus power to dispose of which will no doubt produce a good revenue.

Twelve years ago, while the dam was standing, Mayor Lewis Hanescko, in a message to the City Council, said; "The City is confronted with a peculiar problem in the disposal of its surplus power. The toil and sacrifice of our people in constructing the dam, the prosperity of the City, and the interest of all our citizens, demand that this surplus power should be utilized, both on account of the increased revenue and increased industrial activity. Your own citizens had the requisite knowledge manufacturing, & co. I wished that more Capital and energy would

I would absorb this one of our products, the effort is being made to start a Cotton Mill, which would take some of it, but the City has surplus power for sale, and understand it to be the political desire of the People, as well as their duty to utilize this power in bringing Capital here to build up our City. If the dam is restored, as proposed by the City Ordinance, under your Water System, there would be a larger amount of power for sale, which will very materially reduce the price to be paid for the power furnished.

In this connection you are referred to the full annual reports of the Water, Light and Power Commission, showing the total earnings of said plants during the past two years, including the amount furnished the City. I cannot too highly commend the services of the Commission, while their labors have been performed without compensation, yet at no time did they feel short of their duty as I have been able to see it, and they are entitled to the thanks of our citizens.

Street Improvement

During the past two years the paving of Congress Avenue from 5th street to 11th including 10th street intersection has been completed. Sixth street has been paved from Red River street on the east to the Opera House on the west. This work has been done in a splendid manner with vitrified brick. A contract has been let for the paving of Congress Avenue from 3rd street to the River bridge.

In addition to the brick paving much grading, macadamizing and graveling has been done on the various streets throughout the City and one stone and several wooden bridges have been erected under the efficient supervision of City Engineer C. E. Leonard and your Street Committee. The streets of Austin were never in better condition than at this time.

Fire Department

The people of Austin have reason of their Fire Department. The City suffers less from destruction by fire than any city of equal population in the country. The chief of this department and the firemen deserve the highest praise for the most excellent service rendered the people.

During the past two years North Austin Station has been completed and a station erected in West Austin, making seven stations now occupied by the department.

Police Department

Too much cannot be said in commendation of W. F. Morris, chief, and his efficient Police force, in preserving the peace of the City, and the enforcement of the City Ordinances. From an inspection of the report of the Assessor and Collector it will be seen that more money has been turned into the City Treasury from fines collected in the Mayor's and Corporation Court in the past two years than during the same time under any former administration.

Sanitary Department

Austin was never cleaner, and the health of its people never better than now. The City has been free from epidemics of all kinds, and the death rate has been remarkably low. The City Physician and County Inspector have been very active in the enforcement of ordinances relating to this department.

Public Schools

The City of Austin is and has for years been ~~the~~ ^{one} Public School System. Both and poor alike enjoy the advantages of an educational training as good as can be found in the South. With the addition in the last few years of Manual and Industrial Training, the course prescribed by law, the boys and girls of this City have educational advantages and opportunities that we of往昔 years knew not. That the present high standard will be maintained and constantly improved, and that our people will readily respond to all demands made by the Board of Trustees there can be no doubt.

City Cemetery

The Ladies Cemetery Association has done much to beautify the City Cemetery, and their efforts should receive substantial encouragement at all times. Nothing speaks more for the living than the care and attention they give to the resting place of the dead. During the past two years the Cemetery has been greatly enlarged, but it is only a question of time when more territory will have to be acquired to meet the demands of the City Parks.

Perhaps no city of the population of Austin can be found that has provided as few places for recreation and outing as this City. Young and old must have a place for healthful, innocent amusement. Very little has been done during the past two years to improve the few parks it has. It is a matter that has been too long neglected.

City Hall

During the year 1906, a contract was entered in for the construction of a new City Hall. The old building on the hill has for years been inadequate for the demands, and a new modern structure which will for many years meet the requirements of the City is now rapidly going up, and when completed will be an ornament to the City.

Receipts and disbursements

For the fiscal year ending Dec. 31, 1905, Sterling, City Assessor and Collector, paid into the City treasury \$127,408.36, to the credit of the general fund. At the beginning of that year there was to the credit of that fund \$10,175.68 in the treasury, making a total of \$117,614.04. The disbursements that year aggregated \$135,372.51, leaving a balance of \$9,721.53. In the year 1906, the receipts were \$143,319.76, which added to the balance over from the previous year amounted to \$152,561.29, while the disbursements were \$143,887.44, leaving a balance in the treasury Jan 3rd 1907, of \$8679.85. For a detailed statement of the receipts from all sources, and the expenditures for the support of the City Government during the past two years.
