

The Minutes of a regular meeting of the City Council.

Austin, Texas, July 6, 1891.

Stan John McDonald, mayor, presiding.

Minutes.

Election returns
11th Ward.

Alderman Morris moved that Mr. Neill McCashin be requested to relieve the City Clerk temporarily from attendance upon the Council, to enable him to complete the preparation of the general appropriation Ordinance. Carried.

Alderman Carleton moved that the minutes of the meeting of the City Council which was held on the 15th day of June, 1891, be adopted as printed. Carried.

Alderman North moved that the regular Order of business be dispensed with, for the purpose of canvassing the returns of the election held in the 11th Ward, June 22, 1891, for the purpose of electing two aldermen, and that three tellers be appointed for that purpose. The motion carried and the chair appointed Aldermen Carleton, Ziller and Schneider.

Alderman North moved that the Council take a recess until the Committee is ready to report. Carried.

The Council was soon called to order to receive the report of the tellers, which was as follows:

Robert Weyerman received 39 Votes.

H. J. Sketchum received 38 Votes.

The Mayor then declared Robert Weyerman and H. J. Sketchum duly elected.

Alderman Graham entered the Council and answered to his name.

A motion was made that a Committee of three be appointed to escort the aldermen elect to the bar of the Council.

The motion prevailed, and the chair appointed Aldermen Phillips, North and Nitschle, who retired, but soon reappeared at the bar of the Council, accompanied by the aldermen elect, Robert Weyerman and H. J. Sketchum, to whom the mayor administered the oath of office. They then took seats in the Council chamber.

Petitions, Memorials, &c.

By Alderman Glass, a petition of citizens, requesting that the one light now located at the intersection of Congress Avenue and Second Street, be removed to the intersection of Congress Avenue and First Street. Referred to the Water and Light Committee.

By Alderman Glass, a petition of citizens asking that the "bone yard" and "bapt ground" be removed outside of the city limits. Referred to the Committee on Sanitation and Improvement.

On the recommendation of the Mayor and Alderman Hume the Council revisited the fine assessed in the Harrison Court against the "iron" in the reservoir lots.

By Jas. P. Trigell, Chief Engineer, for the month of June, 1891, was read and referred to the Committee on water and light.

By the City Engineer:

Report of probable Cost of bridge to be built on the Fishville road near the Southwest Corner of Hyde Park - Amount \$44.00. Alderman Phillips moved that the City Engineer be instructed to have the bridge mentioned built as soon as possible Carried.

Reports of Committees:

Alderman Phillips, for the Street Committee, requested further time in which to report on Various Claims referred to said Committee: Adopted.

By Alderman Graham, for the police Committee, report on the City Marshal's reports for the months of March, April and May, 1891. The reports of the Committee state that the reports of the Marshal have been examined and found Correct Laid over without action.

By Alderman North, for the Ordinance Committee, a report on an Ordinance to amend Chapter Two, Title III, of the Revised Penal Ordinances of the City of Austin, by adding thereto another article to be known as Article 112 a, of Chapter Two, of Title III, of said Ordinances, relative to painting signs on sidewalks. The report recommends the passage of the Ordinance with the following amendment: "Provided, that the provisions of this article shall not apply to persons doing or causing said acts to be done on sidewalks abutting premises owned or controlled by them". The report was laid over to come up with the ordinance named therein.

By Alderman Jackson, for the Committee on Sanitation and Sewage, report on a communication from the Sanitary Inspector asking for instructions concerning Slaughter pens that were taken into the City by the passing of the new Charter. The report recommends that all slaughter pens in the City be removed beyond the limits of the city by January 1, 1892.

Alderman Jackson moved as a substitute for the report that the report be remitted with instructions to the Committee to

The report of the Committee was then adopted.

By Alderman Jackson, for the Committee on Sanitation and Beverage, a report on a communication from the Sanitary Inspector concerning the unhealthy condition of the mouth of the State sewer.

The report states that it will cost about \$50 to repair the same but does not recommend that the sum be appropriated to repair it as the sewer belongs to the State.

Alderman North moved that the City Clerk be instructed to hand a certified copy of the communication from the Sanitary Inspector and the report of the Committee thereon to Gen. W. P. Hardman, Superintendent of public buildings and grounds and respectfully request him to take due notice of the same.

The motion was adopted.

Alderman Linn, for the finance Committee, to whom was referred a proposal from G. A. Bahn, to keep the city clock in repair, made a verbal report thereon stating that no provision has been made for the purpose named in the proposal, that the Committee be discharged from further consideration of the same.

By unanimous consent the Committee was discharged as requested.

By Alderman North, for the Special Committee appointed at the last meeting of the Council, by resolution, to prepare and submit an ordinance concerning the manner of purchasing certain supplies for the city, submitted a report stating that the ordinance was prepared, and was ready for submission to the Council.

On motion the report was laid over to be taken up with the ordinance named therein.

Unfinished Business.

An ordinance to amend Chapter two, title iii, of the Revised Penal Ordinances of the City of Austin by adding thereto another article to be known as article 112a of Chapter two of title iii, of said Ordinances, was taken up on its second reading, and read together with the report of the ordinance Committee thereon, which is above set forth.

A motion was made to suspend the rules and place the ordinance on its third reading, which was lost by the following vote:

It was read the first time after which a motion was made to suspend the rules and place the same on its second reading which was adopted by a vote of two-thirds of the whole Council. The Ordinance was then read by Captain after which Alderman Morris moved to amend the same by adding \$16.25, to pay Hutchings Printing House for printing pamphlets. Adopted.

Alderman Linn moved to amend the Ordinance by adding \$14, to pay W. M. Milby for assisting in engraving the new City Charter. The amendment was adopted by the following vote:
