On motion of Alderman Plath the council  
was called and the Marshal sent after the  
absentees.

Aldermen Kinner Kupperz Schubert and  
Radkey came in and answered to their names

On motion of Alderman Plath the case of  
the council was suspended

On motion of Alderman Brueggerhoff the  
reading of the minutes of a previous meeting  
was postponed

A Petition was received from Mrs Ella Ruef  
and Mrs Virginia Shadling protesting against  
the City Council granting to Abner Taylor or the  
Capitol syndicate the right of way on College Avenue  
for a rail road track

The petition was received and ordered filed

The following is the report of the City Physician  
for the month of December 1882.

Gentlemen

During the month of Dec 1882  
I made in behalf of the City fifty visits daily  
visits at the Hospital included Patients not in  
the Hospital twenty seven prescriptions  
at the date of my last report seven cases received  
in Hospital under treatment since which time  
six additional were received

Of this number seven have been discharged  
One died and five are on our hands under treatment

Report of the City Marshal for the month of December 1882 show no of arrests 167. amount of fine collected from in cash \$94<sup>50</sup> Disbursed out \$81<sup>00</sup>. Total fine \$76<sup>50</sup> Two horses impounded and both redeemed.

The City Sexton Report for the month of Dec 1882 shows total deaths for the month 28 white & Colored B. Magician v. Remains small 12.

Alderman Brueggerhoff introduced the following resolution

Be it resolved by the City Council of the City of Austin

That the Mayor be authorized and instructed to award the Contract to the lowest bidder for seventy eight feet (78) of the sewer at the foot of Congress Avenue as shown by bid received on December 15<sup>th</sup> 1882 and the Finance Committee are hereby instructed to report an ordinance appropriating the sum of six hundred and seventy five dollars (\$75<sup>00</sup>) for the payment of the same.

The motion to postpone action on the resolution until next Monday was lost by the following vote Of the Aldermen Fennus Schubert Kappertz, May's Aldermen Lawrence Brueggerhoff Radkey Moeller Platt and Wilson

The resolution was adopted by the following vote Of the Aldermen Lawrence Brueggerhoff Radkey Moeller Platt & Wilson Yes Aldermen Fennus Schubert and Kappertz.

The following is the report of the ordinance committee on the Union Depot ordinance which was adopted by W. H. Taylor and Board of Aldermen of the City of Austin We the undersigned members of the Ordinance Committee to whom was referred the the Union Depot building ordinance with amendment offer the accompanying substitute which embodies said ordinance and all amendments and recommend the adoption and passage of said substitute

The ordinance committee introduced an ordinance as a substitute for the Ordinance granting to R.R. Companies the right to erect a depot building. The substitute granted to the I. & G. N. and other rail Roads the right to erect a Depot building on that part of Cypress street lying between Congress Avenue and Colorado street. The ordinance was read.

Alderman Metz came in and answered to his name.

Alderman Bruggerhoff offered the following amendment to the Union Depot ordinance which was adopted.

Provided that any other Rail Road here after running in the city of Austin shall have the consent of the City Council to the privileges of this grant with the consent of the Railroad Companies herein instructed on the completion of said Depot building.

Alderman Blatt offered the following amendment to the Depot ordinance.

To amend section 9<sup>th</sup> on third line and after the word material and said building shall not cost less than Fifteen thousand dollars.

The amendment was adopted by the following vote year aldermen Lawrence Bruggerhoff Radkey Pecky Wilson Mayo aldermen Kerney Schubin Haupertz and Mueller. it being a tie vote the Mayor voted yeas.

Alderman Radkey offered the following amendment to the Depot ordinance

amend section 9<sup>th</sup>. That the center of said Depot building shall be in the center of said running longitudinal the amendment was adopted.

The ordinance was then read third time under suspension of the rules and passed by the following vote year aldermen Shirley Metz, Schubin Bruggerhoff Radkey Haupertz Mueller & Wilson Lawrence Mayo alderman Blatt

The ordinance committee introduced an Ordinance repealing Section 4d of an ordinance entitled an Ordinance regulating the license and occupation Tax of the City of Austin passed

July 5, 1855. and enacting an ordinance regulating and licensing livery and farm stables and vehicles let for hire. The ordinance was read second and third time under suspension of the rules and passed by the following vote of the Aldermen Metz, Kinney, Lawrence, Schubert, Brueggerhoff, Radke, Guppertz, Koenig, Platz & Wilson.

An ordinance regulating tax on Hotels and Boarding houses was introduced and read first time and then referred to the ordinance committee.

A communication was received from J. H. Collett stating that the ~~lot~~ market house lot could be bought from its present owner for two thousand dollars. The communication was referred to the market house committee.

The following report was received from the police committee on the request of Marshal Kirk asking for an increase of the police force.

The report of the committee was adopted.

To the Hon. Mayor and Board of Aldermen.

The undersigned members of the police committee to whom the above request was referred do hereby report that we consider it necessary under the circumstances to increase the police force by one officer and request the adoption of this report and the appointment of the said one officer who shall be qualified to superintend the work of the prisoners whose duty it shall be to attend to this work.

Alderman Kinney called up an ordinance granting to the contractors of the new state capitol Abner Taylor and his associates the right to build and operate a rail road track from the intersection of the Houston and Texas Central and Austin and Northwestern Rail roads, with East avenue and along said avenue to College avenue and thence along College avenue to College avenue to Brazos street and thence along said street to the Capital grounds. For the purpose of transporting building material to be used in the construction of the new state Capital. The ordinance was read second time. The ordinance was then amended by filling in the blank the word Tex  
 on line fifteen of section third and after the words, The sum of

Alderman Brueggerhoff offered an ordinance as a substitute for the ordinance granting to the Capital syndicate the right of way on College avenue and East avenue. The ordinance was read.

Alderman Karpitz moved to lay the substitute ordinance on the table motion carried by the following vote  
 yea amendment. Mutz Kinney Schubir Radkey Karpitz and Morris Ray. Aldermen Lawrence Brueggerhoff Black and Wilson

Alderman Kinney offered the following amendment to the right of way ordinance

Amend by changing section 6 to section 7. and introducing as section six the following

The right and privilege granted by this ordinance are gratis to the contractors for building the state Capitol as herein mentioned and said right and privilege shall not be sold or transferred to any other parties therefore if the contract for building said Capitol now existing between the Capital syndicate and the state of Texas shall at any time before the completion of said Capitol building be annulled then at the same time the right of way with all of its privileges as herein granted shall be null and void and this ordinance shall no longer be in force and it is further provided that at any time said capital contractors shall fail to observe the conditions of this ordinance then such failure shall operate as a forfeiture of this grant herein made

Alderman Brueggerhoff moved to lay the amendment on the table. The motion was lost by the following vote of six aldermen. Lawrence Brueggerhoff Platt and Wilson Mayo aldermen. Metz Kinney Schubert Radke Kupperitz and Gorrell.

The amendment was adopted by the following vote. Six aldermen Metz Kinney Lawrence Schubert Radke Kupperitz Gorrell and Wilson Mayo aldermen Brueggerhoff and Platt.

The ordinance was then read third time under suspension of the rules and passed by the following vote of six aldermen Metz Kinney Lawrence Schubert Radke Kupperitz Gorrell and Wilson Mayo alderman Platt.

Alderman Martin offered the following resolution.

Be it Resolved by the City Council of the City of Austin

That the mayor be and is hereby authorized to contract with the Austin Gas Light and Coal Company to light Congress Avenue and Picau street not exceeding forty lamps. For the period of three months commencing at once or as soon as the contract can be made at a price not to exceed \$ per month per lamp.

The resolution was amended by striking out the word \$ and inserting the word \$4 per month.

The resolution as amended was then adopted.

The street committee were instructed to designate such lamps as were to be lighted under the resolution. A petition was received from sergeant Chenevill asking the council to grant him leave of absence to go to San Antonio as he was bound to appear there as a witness. Leave of absence granted.

The City Marshal was authorized to lend the street oil lamps to such citizens as may want them for the purpose of using them to light the streets.
