Minutes

Victor Mather's petition

By Alderman Jackson - A petition from Victor Mather for permission to relocate the stand pipe now in front of Mr Clay Jones' place of business at some other place on Congress avenue. It was referred to the street committee with power to act.

Alderman Nitschke and Roberdean entered the council and answered to their names.

John B and Joseph Fischer's petition

By Alderman Nitschke - A petition from Messrs John B and Joseph Fischer, owners of more than one-half of the property fronting on the north side of the alley running east and west in block No 50, in the city of Austin, requesting the city council "to instruct the city marshal to have the owners on the south side of said block remove all obstructions from said alley, and to allow same to remain open until ordered closed by the city council." It was referred to the street committee.

Morgan Callaway, Jr. petition

By Alderman Linn - A petition from Morgan Callaway, Jr asking the city council to refund to him \$40.86, being the amount of his city taxes on a life insurance policy erroneously rendered ^{for taxation} by him. It was referred to the claims and accounts committee.

H. W. Steinle - petition

By Alderman Linn - A petition from Mr H. W. Steinle for permission to continue the tin roof of his building now being erected just north of the building occupied by Protection Hose company over the wall of his building and join the same to the wall of the building occupied by said company.

Alderman Anderson moved that the petition be granted.

Alderman Schneider moved as a substitute that the petition be referred to the fire committee with power to act, and it was adopted by a rising vote of 16 to 3.

By Alderman Warmoth - A petition from J. A. Miller requesting permission to remove about 50 yards of clay from some point on the streets to be designated by the city engineer, to be used in filling in at 607 East North street.

A communication from H. M. Metzger, president of the Austin Dam Street Railway Company, was read as follows:

"In the event our proposition heretofore submitted to you is rejected, we the Austin Dam Street Railway company, respectfully ask that the rent for said railway, on and after March 1, 1894, be reduced to \$2500 per annum, said company to pay the rent for said road up to said date at the rate of \$5000.00 per annum. This relief is asked as the operation of said road to this time has demonstrated that the present rent is exorbitant and not justified by the earnings of said road."

Alderman Shelly moved that the communication be referred to the special committee already appointed to consider the proposition heretofore made by said company.

By Alderman Shedd, for the police committee, to whom was referred the city marshal's reports for the months of December, 1893 and January 1894, presented a report which states that said reports were examined and found to be correct.

The report was adopted.

Alderman Shedd, for the committee on claims and accounts to whom was referred the claim of W. W. Platt for loss and damage to stock and for compensation for time consumed in gathering, securing

and caring for stock submitted a report thereon recommending that the claim be referred to the Board of Public Works. The report was adopted.

Market Committee's report on meat, fish etc.

Alderman Redd, for the committee on markets, presented a report recommending the passage of an ordinance to regulate the placing of fish, meats, goods, wares and merchandise on the sidewalks in this city. It limits such displays to not more than two feet in width and provides that the space so occupied shall be next to the building used by the person making the display. The report and ordinance were laid over to be considered under the head of new business.

New Business.

Ordinance appropriating \$600 for fire truck &c in South Austin.

By Alderman Redd An ordinance appropriating \$600 for the purpose of purchasing a fire truck, and erecting a house in which to keep the same, for the use of South Austin. It was read, after which a motion was made to suspend the rules and place the ordinance on its second reading which was adopted by a vote of two thirds of the entire board of aldermen.

The ordinance was accordingly read, after which alderman North moved to amend section two of the same, which states that the money appropriated by the ordinance shall not be drawn until a deed has been made to the city of Austin, conveying a suitable lot upon which to erect said building, by adding the following "said title to be approved by the city attorney." Carried. The ordinance was then passed under suspension of the rules by the following votes:

By Alderman Powell: A resolution authorizing the street committee to ascertain the cost of a strip of land 60 feet wide through the Duval property from the dummy rail road to the International and Great Northern railroad.

By Alderman Glass: A resolution authorizing the City Assessor and collector to rent a suitable and more accessible office at a monthly rental of twelve dollars.

By Alderman Taylor Resolved, That the City Treasurer be and he is hereby instructed to transfer the sum of \$3622.62 from the Water and Light fund to the General fund to reimburse said general fund for amount heretofore loaned to the Water and Light fund. Adopted.

Alderman Jackson moved that Mr Joe Booth be authorized to sell at auction animals, wagons, etc on East Seventh street near the Eclipse livery stable.

Alderman Lawless moved to lay the motion on the table, and the motion was adopted by a rising vote of 15 to 6.
