of ordering an election of mayor. trustees of the public free
schools and aldermen of said city in accordance with the
laws of the state of Texas and the charter and ordinances of
the city of Austin. And also for the further purpose of confirming
the election of assistant chief of the Austin fire department.

A recess of five minutes was on motion taken.

After expiration of recess the following ordinance was read
An ordinance concerning an election to be held in all the wards
of the city for the purpose of electing a mayor of the city, three
members of the board of school trustees; and one alderman from
each of the wards of the city.

Section 1. Be it ordained by the city council of the city of Austin
that an election be and the same is hereby ordered to be held
in this city on the first Monday in December A. D. 1893 for the
purpose of electing a mayor of the city for the ensuing term of
two years commencing on the expiration of the term of office
of the present Mayor. Three members of the board of school
trustees to fill the places of W. J. Mathews. J. W. Smith. and
J. W. Graham. whose terms expire. And for the election of one
Alderman from each of the wards of the city to hold the office of
^{from said ward respectively} Alderman for the term of two years from their election and
until their successors may be elected and qualified in
place of the following Aldermen:

In the First Ward one alderman in place of J. P. Schneider whose term expires.

In the Second ward one alderman in place of Chas C. Anderson whose term expires.

In the Third ward one alderman in place of Wm D. Shelley whose term expires.

In the Fourth Ward one alderman in place of J. Schuber whose term expires.

In the Fifth ward one alderman in place of H. A. Linn, whose term expires.

In the Sixth ward one alderman in place of J. L. Glume whose term expires.

In the Seventh Ward one alderman in place of G. P. Assmann whose term expires.

In the Eighth Ward one alderman in place of J. H. Mammoth whose term expires.

In the Ninth ward one alderman in place of K. C. Miller whose term expires.

In the Tenth Ward one alderman in place of J. O. Jackson, whose term expires.

In the Eleventh Ward one alderman in place of H. J. Ketteman whose term expires.

In the Fourth Ward at Goodman's Store and the following named persons are appointed judges of the election for said ward.

W. J. Egener, W. W. Williams, and Ed. Junk.

In the Fifth Ward at hall of protection hose company No 3 and the following named persons are appointed judges of the election for said ward; Chas. Shuppertz, Joe Winn, and John Luckey.

In the Sixth Ward at Hollands Shop and the following named persons, are appointed judges of the election in said ward, J. M. Peacock, Aug. Neibacher and Joe Johnson.

In the Seventh ward at Wellmer's Mill and the following named persons are appointed judges of the election in said ward, W. V. Lerenshaw, C. J. Wilhelm, and Wm Sears.

In the Eighth Ward at the County Court-house and the following named persons are appointed judges of the election in said ward, H. W. Walker, J. H. Millican, and J. H. Johnson.

In the Ninth ward at Colored Masonic building in block no 62 on East Avenue and Pecon street and the following persons

The ordinance was read after which a motion was made to suspend the rule and place the same on its second reading which was adopted by the following vote:

The ordinance was accordingly read after which Alderman Ketchum moved to file the blank concerning the Eleventh ward by naming the place of Henry Pohl, West-Monroe street, near Carson's store as the polling place for the election and J. W. Blatner, H. B. Wilson, and Chas Schaffer as the judges of the election in said ward.

Alderman Dawson offered as a substitute the same place for holding the election and the following named persons as judges of the election in said ward, Henry Wilson, Chas Schaffer. P. H. Bowdin.

The Substitute was lost and the motion made by Alderman Ketchum adopted.

Alderman Dawson requested permission to have his reasons for voting against the amendment made by Alderman Ketchum spread upon the minutes

The reasons given are as follows

Alderman Dawson as his reasons for offering and voting for such substitute stated the following, Mr. McReed a candidate for Alderman from the Eleventh Ward in opposition to Alderman Ketchum of the Eleventh Ward who is a candidate for re-election requested of me as Alderman of said Ward to have Mr. Bowdin appointed as one of the judges of election and as two of the judges selected and agreed upon by Alderman Ketchum and myself are known and recognized as supporters of Alderman Ketchum I think it fair that the person selected by Mr. Reed should be chosen as one of the judges at said election and surely no harm or injustice to Alderman Ketchum will result from the selection by the Council of Mr. Bowdin. And before offering the foregoing substitute I proposed to Alderman Ketchum to substitute said resolution with names of either of the following gentlemen, Geo A. Brush
J. J. Ferrel, G. W. Beaver, Dr King, Jas Dourie,
J. H. Potet, E. L. Whitehead, or Walter Durham or any other gentleman whose name might be suggested who

is known to be a supporter of Mr Reed. And while it is claimed by Alderman Ketchum to be the courtesy and custom of the Council to allow out-going aldermen to name the judges of election in their respective wards I regard such rule as a dangerous one and as tending to lead to the perpetuation in power of any existing administration.

And I regard the power of any out-going administration to appoint all officers of election as a dangerous one and as leading to oppression if corrupt measures are resorted to and while I know no such methods are contemplated in the present instance I consider it an act of injustice to deny any citizen a right that is reasonable and within the power of the council to grant.

A motion was made to suspend the rules and place the ordinance on its third reading which was adopted by the following vote

Mayor message

Gentlemen - My attention has been called to false reports circulated in the City of Austin setting forth "that the bonds now owned by the city of Austin remaining unsold are hypothecated, money having been obtained upon them unlawfully" While this slander is totally unworthy of notice yet that you may be informed in regard to this matter I submit the following correspondence with the National City Bank of New York where the bonds are now held for the city of Austin subject to my order as Mayor of the city of Austin.

The bonds were originally sent to the aforesaid bank to be delivered to one Morton upon his payment for the same. Morton failed to take the bonds and make payment. The National City Bank was then instructed to hold them to the credit of the city of Austin.

I received the following letter:

Carrigan and I hold his receipt for the same.

Noticing a false report in the New York World stating
that the City had defaulted in payment of interest. I
wrote to the National City Bank asking said bank to
give the New York World's representative full information
concerning the matter to which I received the following

Confirming telegram sent by you to the New York World requesting us to furnish full information concerning payment of interest on Austin water ^{and} electric light bonds sold and also full information as to the status of the \$450,000 of said bonds now in our hands subject to your order.

Its representative of the World has called upon us in regard to the matter at this writing. Yours truly

It is needless to say that the bonds nor any portion of them have ever been hypothecated or any money obtained thereon. They are now subject to my order as mayor. These bonds when sold will probably have to be delivered in New York City. I have therefore allowed the bonds to remain on deposit at the National City Bank of New York subject to my order as mayor of the city of Austin.

If it is thought wise by your honorable body I will cause the same to be returned to the City of Austin and placed with the City Treasurer. The expense in so doing will be about \$240.

Motion to refer message to special committee

Alderman Linn moved that the message be referred to special committee of three to be appointed by the chair and requested that he be not placed on the committee.

Alderman Nitschke moved as a substitute that the mayor be instructed to have the bonds brought to Austin at once. Alderman Fischer moved that the mayor be requested to ask the president or cashier of the National City Bank to make a sworn statement as to the condition of the bonds and when received forthwith publish the same.

Alderman North moved as a substitute for all the motions that the Mayor's message be received and published in full in the proceedings of the City Council and that the mayor be requested to order at once by telegraph the shipment of the bonds to the City Treasurer.

The substitute offered by Alderman North was lost.

The motion made by Alderman Fischer was then put and lost. The motion made by Alderman Linn was then adopted and the chair appointed Aldermen Raymond, Nitschke, and Platt as the committee.

The Council then adjourned.
