The valuations excessive, under the provisions of section 111, page 10 of the city charter, which provides the manner of appeal from the action of the Board of Equalization, the council is precluded from taking any action in the matter.

The report was adopted.

Alderman North, for the committee on purchases, offered a report which states: "That having advertised for bids for feed for the city teams for the quarter ending Aug. 31, 1893, beg leave to report that they received two bids, one by L. J. MacIntire & Co., and the other by H. C. Gandy & Co., that the bids of the former being the lowest said bids of L. J. MacIntire & Co. were accepted and the contract awarded to the latter. Your committee recommend that you ratify our action and that contracts be duly executed in accordance with said bids."

The report was adopted.

New Business.

A communication from Joseph Stalle, president Austin State, Light and Power Company, was read. It directs attention of the city council to the soon now due and about to become due said company by the city, for water and lights; and also mentions the fact that the contract for street lights will expire July 1, next, and states should the city desire to enter into further contract with said company for electric light service, he will be "pleased to submit rates upon proper application at the water company's office at any time convenient to your body, or its authorized representatives." It was referred to the committee on water and lights.

^{Policeman - Election} Alderman Fletcher moved that the council do now proceed to the election of a policeman to fill the vacancy caused by the resignation of Mr. B. Davis.

Alderman Miller moved as an amendment that the council declare that two vacancies exist on the police force, namely, the position formerly held by Mr. B. Davis and the other the position held by J. M. Bell.

Alderman Anderson moved that only the position held by J. M. Bell be declared vacant, as Mr. B. Davis had regularly resigned.

Alderman Glass moved to refer the question of declaring the position held by J. M. Bell vacant to the committee on police, and the motion passed.

Board of Pub. Works.
Council Expresses Confidence
in

Alderman Storch introduced the following:

"Resolved that the city council has unbounded confidence in the fidelity of the board of public works and in its ability to satisfactorily complete our system of water works and electric light."

Resolved, that the board of public works be, and they are hereby requested to continue to devote their best energies to a rapid completion of this grand enterprise.

Resolved, that in view of the momentous importance of having the most minute details of the work scientifically and thoroughly done, the board of public works be, and they are hereby requested to officially pass upon and determine all matters of construction and to cause the same to be carried out under the superintendence and responsibility of skilled and competent civil engineers and superintendents appointed, by them, and two members of the board, in strict accordance with the official mandate of the board.

Resolved, that no defacing, erasing and all defacing of official notices to the rescue of individual dispositions by any member of the board, in the work of construction.

Resolved, that the city shall furnish a copy of these resolutions to each member of the board of public works, and that they be published in the proceedings of the city council.

By Alderman Raymond - An ordinance entitled "An ordinance to amend the ordinance creating the Board of Public Works, etc."

The ordinance provides that when any changes from the plans and specifications of the engineer has been employed to supervise the construction of any work connected with the construction of the power-house and water and light system of the city are proposed by the Board of Public Works or any member thereof, that such proposal shall first be submitted to the city council for its ratification, and that no changes in said plans shall be made without first procuring the consent and ratification of such changes by the city council.

Hills, Haigo & Co's expense (expenses prepaid) city of Austin

(\$1000) dollars each, \$5000.000 with accrued interest since.

Oct. 1, 1892. These bonds have been sold by the city to
Messrs. Edward Morton & Co., of 53 Broadway, New York,
at par and accrued interest, less five (5) per cent
commission. Upon payment of proceeds to you from
and interest less 5 per cent commission, deliver bonds
to Edward Morton & Co., but not otherwise. If payment is
made pass proceeds over your books to the credit of
J. S. Myrick, treasurer of the city of Austin, Tex. If
payment is not made, hold the bonds subject to our
order as agents of the city of Austin, Tex. Mine us in
either case.

Alderman Shelly moved that Mr. Henry Liller, deputy city assessor and collector, be granted leave of absence for about three weeks from the 16th inst., and the motion prevailed.

Alderman North moved that the question of increasing the sanitary force for the purpose of cutting weeds on the streets and public square of the city be referred to the Committee on Sanitation and Sewerage, and the motion carried.

Alderman Ketchum, by request, introduced a resolution reciting as a fact that the crossing of the Austin and Northwestern railway on East Sixth street is in bad condition and directing the city engineer to properly repair the same at the expense of said company unless said company shall, within five days, make such repairs.

The resolution was adopted.

Alderman Schneider presented the following:
"Whereas, it has been reported that the grandstand at the lake is not safe for a large gathering of people; therefore, be it

Resolved, That the city engineer be requested to examine the same and advise the mayor as to the safety of the structure. Likewise, and if the engineer so deems fit for a large gathering of people, that the mayor or city hall shall be requested to have the same demolished immediately."

The resolution was carried. It was to require the city engineer, in the event he considers the structure unsafe, to satisfy and report the present condition of the same to safely dismantle it.

Resolved, That the mayor make a fresh tender of the \$100 bonds mentioned in the letter of J. B. Raymond & Co., of Nov. 5, 1849, and accompany the same with a certified copy of the opinion of the attorney-general in the case of Gov. Nalle v. the City of Austin.

The resolution was adopted.

By Alderman Shelly - An ordinance is elicited "to ordain to prevent the destruction and to regulate the catching of fish in the Colorado, river within the corporate limits of the city of Austin, and providing a penalty for the violation thereof. It was read the first time, after which an ordinance was made to suspend the rules and place the same on the second reading, which prevailed by a two-thirds vote of the whole Board of aldermen. The ordinance was accordingly read and approved referred to the committee on ordinances.

The council then adjourned.
