To the Members of the Board of Aldermen of the City of Austin:-

Gentlemen:- I herewith return to your honorable body with my approval an ordinance entitled,-

"An ordinance appropriating the sum of \$1745.00 for the purpose of remaking Fifth street bridge across Waller Creek and removing iron bridge now over Waller Creek on Fifth Street and place the same over Waller Creek on First Street.

It has been so short a time since I presented to your honorable body my objections to an ordinance similar in its provisions to the one now under consideration, that I deem

it unnecessary to again present them at length, but shall feel that my duty has been performed when I state that the condition of the general fund of the city, recently presented to your honorable body, will not warrant this expenditure. Furthermore, I am informed by the City Engineer that the iron bridge sought to be removed from Fifth to First street is only 95 $\frac{1}{2}$  feet in length in the clear, or between the abutments, and that the creek at First Street runs diagonally across the street, thereby requiring a bridge 75 feet in length to properly span it. Should the bridge now on Fifth Street be placed at First Street, it would be necessary to extend the wing walls and construct abutment walls 20 feet from the banks of the stream, which would, as your honorable body will readily perceive, close up 40 feet of the channel, check the flow of water, and in time of high water, probably destroy the bridge, and damage other property in the vicinity.

The City Engineer also informs me that the iron portion of the bridge now over Waller Creek, on Fifth Street, is in good condition, and that with a small expenditure for straining and flooring it can be placed in a thoroughly safe condition, capable of bearing the weight of any of our city traffic. I therefore cannot see any reason for removing the same.

But in conclusion, I beg leave to state that while I deem the objections other than that of want of finances complete to justify my action in returning this ordinance to your honorable body without my approval, the lack of funds is my chief objection.

I therefore request your honorable body to reconsider the vote by which the ordinance was passed.

It was read the first time, after which motions were made to suspend the rules and place the ordinance on its second and third readings, and that it do now pass, each of which were adopted by the following vote:-

Yea - 21 - Aldermen - Anderson, Arsmann, Dawson, Fisher, Glass, Hancock, Jackson, Ketchum, Sinn, Miller, Pittschke, North, Platt, Pawell, Raymond, Schneider, Schuber, Shelley, Taylor, Townsend, Wernath.

By Alderman Raymond:-

A resolution instructing the City Engineer to inform the Lewis-Mercer Construction Company, or its agents, that the provision of the franchise requiring the said company to properly and promptly repair all streets placed in a rough condition by reason of the excavations made by said company, must be strictly complied with.

Adopted.

By Alderman Shelley:-

A resolution granting the Austin Fire Department the right to place a streamer across Congress Avenue, at such point as may be selected, during the annual convention of the State Firemen's Association, which meets here May 10, 11, and 12.

Carried.

By Alderman Ketchum -

An ordinance appropriating the sum of \$150.00 for the purpose of building a stone culvert on South Congress Avenue just North of the entrance to Fairview Park.

It was read and referred to committee on streets and alleys.

By Alderman Raymond -

A resolution providing for the appointment of a committee of three "to examine the franchise and investigate the laying of sewer pipe by the Mercer construction company upon the streets of the city, where and when it's practicable to lay said pipes in alleys, and that the City Engineer be instructed to assist said committee in their labor."

Alderman Platt moved to amend the resolution by adding thereto, "and be it further resolved that said company shall be required to strictly comply with the terms of its franchise." The amendment was accepted, and the resolution was adopted.

Aldermen Raymond, Platt, and Glass were appointed as the committee.

The election of a Porter being next in order, Alderman Stitschke moved that three tellers be appointed to canvass the ballots. The motion prevailed, and Alderman Stitschke, Hancock and Dawson were appointed.

The names of the following persons were then placed in nomination for the position:-

The motion prevailed and the chair called for a second ballot, which being duly cast and canvassed was reported as follows:

There being no election it was moved that after each ballot the persons receiving less than two votes be dropped from the next ballot.
