Alderman Nitschke moved a call of the council which was duly seconded and adopted.

2nd Roll call

At 8:14 p.m., the council was again called to order and the roll called which resulted as follows:

Petitions

E. Ave. x E. 5th Sts
for electric light

The following petitions were introduced:
From citizens residing near East Avenue and East 5th Street, requesting the City Council to erect an electric light at the corner of said streets. It was referred to the committee on water and light.

W. R. Bacon
for fine

From W. R. Bacon, asking the City Council to remit a fine of \$10.00, which was assessed against him in the Recorder's court on May 1st. On the recommendation of the Mayor the council remitted the fine.
From citizens stating that in consideration of the

small amount of money available for street improve-
-ments for the balance of the fiscal year, they modify
their demands made in a former petition to the council
to have East Avenue between Seventh and Sixth, Sixth
and Fifth, Fifth and Fourth graded and macadamized
and ask now for the construction of a fifty feet roadway
in the center of said East Avenue, between Seventh
and Fourth streets, which will fully respond to all
the requirements and accommodate the travel of that
portion of the city.

East Avenue
bet 7th & 6th, 6th & 5th & 5th & 4th
streets, for roadway.

E. 6th St. Cong Ave
to W. 4th be repaired

This also requested that East Sixth Street, from Congress
Avenue to the intersection of the Houston and Texas
Central, be repaired and a course of gravel carried
thereon from East Avenue to the Houston and Texas
Central railroad track.

The petition was referred to the committee on streets
and alleys.

By Alderman Glass: A petition from the citizens of
Austin and taxpayers of the Third Ward, asking the
City Council to open Fourth Street from Comal, its
present terminus, to — street, which runs in a north-
-westerly direction into Fifth Street.

It was read and referred to the committee on streets
and alleys.

By Alderman Kehring: A petition from J. M. Burgaz
requesting the council to allow him to complete an addition
to building immediately back of the building on
the northeast corner of Congress Avenue and Sixth
Street, the character of the material used being contra-
-ry to the fire regulations.

After a communication from Geo. A. Brush, asking
the council to decide the matter at once.

Alderman Kehring moved that the petition be not
granted.

Alderman North moved to amend the motion by adding
thereto, "and that the City Marshall be instructed to see
that the improvements be taken away." The amendment
was accepted and the motion as amended prevailed.

D. Lotis to
erect platform Cor 4th
& Colorado Sts.

By Alderman Porcell: A petition from D. Lotis,
asking permission to erect a platform on the
south side of his building on the corner of Colorado
and Fourth Streets.

Alderman Porcell moved to grant the petition.

Alderman Shelley moved to refer it to the committee
on streets and alleys.

Alderman North moved to amend the motion made
by Alderman Porcell by adding thereto, "provided,
that the platform may be moved, at any time, by
order of the City Council."

Accepted.

The motion made by Alderman Shelley was then
rejected and the aforesaid motion as amended,
was accepted.

Young Men's Recreation
Assoc as to Court House
square.

By Alderman North: A petition from the Young Men's
Recreation Association for permission to use what
is known as the old court house square as a recreation
ground, pledging to repair and put in first-class
condition, the fence around said square, to maintain
said fence in first-class condition and to prevent
the use of profane or vulgar language on said
grounds and the playing of ball on Sunday as
now practiced, to keep the weeds down and grass
cut so that the place will be attractive and can
be used by ladies or children without danger of
being hurt or mortified by the rough ground that now
use it.

Granted.

5th & 1st Street
bridges on Waller for

Alderman Kitchke, for the street committee, to
whom was referred an ordinance appropriating
the sum of \$1745 for fixing the Fifth and First
street bridges over Waller creek, submitted a report
thereon, which states: "We have examined said
bridges and find that the Fifth street bridge over
Waller is a very light structure and unfit for
the heavy traffic for which it is now used and is
continually out of order and liable to give way.
And that the First street bridge over Waller is un-
-safe and liable to cause the city a heavy sum
for damages at any time and should be replaced
as stated in above ordinance. We recommend
that the above ordinance do pass, believing the
same to be of vital importance.

The report was adopted by the following vote:

Alderman Kitchke, for the committee on streets and
alleys, to whom was referred a resolution directing
the city engineer to cut West Tenth street to its
established grade, etc, presented a report thereon
which states: "To cut, grade and properly gravel
West Tenth, and intersecting streets would take
the entire city force at least three months, and
as the street is at present in a passably good
condition we do not think it advisable that the
resolution be complied with at present, but would
recommend that the city engineer be instructed
to repair West Tenth street from Colorado to
Larosa street, and from Grand Lake street to West

N. 12th street as to
grade etc.

Avenue as early as practicable,"
The report was adopted.

\$2000 for hose.

Alderman North, for the committee on finance, to whom was referred an ordinance appropriating the sum of \$2000. to purchase 2000 feet of hose for the fire department, offered a report thereon recommending the passage of the ordinance. Report adopted.
