John Dowell. A petition from John Dowell, attorney for Mrs.
Mrs. M. A. Evans M. A. Evans, requesting the Council to instruct
the City Assessor and Collector to receive \$13.75
for the back taxes and costs on certain
property, and permit the property to be
redeemed, was read, and, on motion, granted.

Alderman Jones presented a petition from citizens,
requesting that the gutter on the south side of
East Seventh Street, between Congress Avenue
and Braggs Street, be so repaired as to
improve the sanitary condition of the same.
Referred to the Street Committee.

A. R. Rosler. The Mayor presented a petition from
A. R. Rosler, who was recently fined
in the Reorder's Court for drunkenness,
requesting that the fine and costs be remitted,
owing to his old age and the injury confinement
would inflict upon his health.

The petition was approved by three aldermen
and the recorder, and, upon their recommendation,
the Mayor asked the Council to consent to the
remission.

On motion, the Council concurred in
the remission, on condition that the petitioner
leave the City.

Aldermen Schneider, Platt and Phillips came in.

C. E. Walworth The Mayor also asked the Council to remit the fine
and costs assessed in the Reorder's Court against

C. E. Walworth for using obscene and profane language,

because he believed the fine was improperly assessed from a want of knowledge of the true state of the facts). On motion of Alderman Fisher, the Council refused to remit the fine and costs.

St. Conte The Mayor also laid before the City Council E. Cherry St. Communications from the street committee to the City engineer, which the City engineer had afforded them for advice and instructions. They were, in substance, as follows:

First - Alderman Graham and Phillips, of the Committee, instructed the City engineer to notify Mr. Fisher, to whom the contract for widening the bridge on East Cherry Street, over Waller Creek, had been relet, by consent of the bidders of the former contractor, they having abandoned their contract, to begin work on the bridge on July 11, 1887.

Second - Alderman Schuster, Chairman of the Committee, instructed the City engineer to defer action on the matter, and refer the same to the City Council, for the following reasons: That travel on East Cherry Street would be impossible; that North Avenue bridge should be passable for travel before work on East Cherry Street should begin; that the reletting of the contract without a meeting of the street committee and City engineer was not, in his judgment, right; that after the contract was abandoned by the first contractors, it should have been relet to the lowest and best bidder, as the Ordinances of the City require.

Alderman Fisher moved that the City Council ratify and confirm the contract, and approve the action of the majority of the street committee and the ordering of the work to begin. Adopted.

Ald. Phillips. Alderman Phillips was excused from further attendance upon the meeting. The Mayor then read the following:

Greenwood Cemetery.

Gentlemen of the City Council:

- 1) I beg to call your attention to the fact that the obligation exacted in the name of the City

" of Austin, in favor of J. St. Patterson, for \$2000 falling due June 1, 1887, has not been provided for. This note has been presented and payment has been demanded. It is held by Messrs. James H. Raymond & Co. This matter demands some action at the hands of this body. If this transaction is to be repudiated, let it be done openly and publicly, so that the holder of the City's paper may know what to do for his own protection. At the very least, when the City has put its paper in circulation, and a respectable holder presents it and asks payment, he is entitled to respectful treatment. The City Council cannot afford to ignore this question. You all understand it, and it had just as well be disposed of now as postponed.

I suggest that the matter be referred a special Committee on to the Cemetery, with instructions to see all the parties interested, and to consider the matter in all its bearings, and to report at the next regular meeting of this Council with recommendations for final action by the City.

Please Park. The City engineer presented a report of the probable cost of fencing Please Park, placing the amount at \$197.50. No action was taken on this report.

N.S. Walton. The City attorney presented a report on a suit brought by Mr. N. S. Walton against the City of Austin for \$982.42, for Commissions alleged to be due him on fines collected while he was City attorney. The report states that the suit was duly tried, and, after being appealed to the Supreme Court, was virtually decided in favor of Mr. Walton; that, in view of the ultimate outcome of the case, he had proposed to Mr. Walton to compromise or settle the suit by paying to him \$741, less \$2.31.05 delinquent taxes due to the City by Maj. W. M. Walton, in full settlement of the suit, and that Mr. Walton had agreed to the terms of settlement. On motion, the report was adopted and approved.

Bawdyhouses. The City attorney also submitted a report on an ordinance confining bawdy houses to certain limits in the City of Austin which had been referred to him, and submitted as a substitute an ordinance punishing persons for renting houses to be used as houses of public prostitution within certain limits in the City of Austin.

The report and substitute were read and laid over until the next meeting of the Council.

Finances. The finance Committee, in compliance with a resolution which was recently adopted by the City Council, submitted the following:

Hospital.

The hospital Committee reported favorably on an Ordinance amending Articles 231 and 232 of chapter nine, title five, of the Revised Civil Ordinances of the City of Austin.

The Ordinance was then read a second time, after which Alderman Brush moved to strike out all of that portion of the ordinance which relates to the Chief engineer of the fire department adopted. The remainder of the ordinance relates to the length of the term of office of the matron of the hospital and the Resident Physician.
