

Regular Meeting of City Council
April 1st 1845

Council called to order at 7.45 P.M.
Mayor DeGress in the chair

Roll called and the following members
answered

Aldermen Brown, Brookler, Millett, Platt
Buckham and Strong. Absent Alderman
Metz and Hall. Quorum present

The Journals of the meetings of February 13th
15, 16, 22, 23, 28, and March 4, 6, 8, 19 and 21 were
read and approved

This Honor the Mayor appointed Alderman
Brown, Platt and Brookler as Tellers to open and
examine the election returns for Alderman in the
4th Ward held March 23rd 1848 and in the 5th Ward
held March 30th 1848 to fill vacancies.

The tellers after opening and examining the
returns reported the following as the vote cast, to wit,
For Alderman in Ward No 4 E Raven 35[—]
Frank Bottom 1. For Alderman in Ward 5th
D E Vaughan 84 F Scheiffer 35.

On Motion of Alderman Brookler, E Raven
and D E Vaughan were declared elected Aldermen
for Wards No 4 and 5.

Aldermen Raven and Vaughan were then
qualified and took their seats.

This Honor the Mayor appointed Aldermen Brown
and Platt as Tellers to open and examine the
returns of an Election held March 18th 1848 for
Officers of the Fire Department, who after examining
the returns reported the following as the vote cast
for the several Candidates to wit, For Chief of Fire
Department Jas A Payle 101, F H Robinson 9
Scattoring 2. For Assistant Chief of Fire Department
to F Millett 67, F Hulkes 40, Scattoring 2.

For Recorder of Fire Department D Rushman
105. D Brown 13 Scattoring 1.

The Council then by Ballot unanimously
confirmed Jas A Payle as Chief to F Millett as
assistant chief and D Rushman as Recorder of the
new Fire Department.

Petition of No. 13 - two lots asking to be

refunded the sum of \$845 said amount being in excess of what is required by ordinance and which was fair by petition to the City for license to sell butcher meat for three months.

On motion of Alderman Platt the Petition was received and granted.

Petition of Austin Gaslight Company, asking that Gaslight be established along the lines of their pipes instead of the Kerosene lamps now used by the City.

On Motion of Alderman Crooker the petition was received and referred to the Street Committee.

Petition of Drs J H McLaughlin, R McSwaine, Dr McNamee and J J Tofin stating that they have established an institution for the treatment, care and relief of the sick, and making provisions for the care and treatment of the indigent sick which the City is compelled to provide for.

On Motion of Alderman Crooker the petition was received and referred to the Charity Committee.

Petition of Lily Water Company asking that payment be made them for the rent on use of 67 fire hydrants and three Stock Balancing Fountains for the Quarter ending March 31, 1878 amounting to \$400.

On Motion of Alderman Platt the Petition was received and referred to the Finance Committee.

Petition of Thomas Johnson Police Officer stating that he is in bad health and asking a leave of absence for two weeks.

On Motion of Alderman Vaughan the petition was received and granted.

Petition of J F Dignan stating that some years ago the City Authorities changed the course of the water flowing from the hills south of the Methodist Church from its natural channel, and stating that it had caused considerable injury to his property and asking that the damage be repaired.

On Motion of Alderman Crooker the petition was received and referred to the Street Committee.

The following petitions for permission and license to retail spirituous liquors in quantities less than one quart, were presented:

John Sherrill on lot #1 Block #19 on Congress Avenue in Ward #1. A Dublure on lot #4 Block #25 in Ward #1 John Gordon Black #1 Div "U" in Ward 7 & 9

On motion of Alderman Platt the petitions were received and granted

Petition of Alfred Smith for permission to deposit wood upon his lots in the first and second blocks on West Pecan Street was presented

On motion of Alderman Kinnar the petition was received and referred to the Fire Committee

Petition of J. H. Schenck together with a proposition to supply the City with Lamp posts and lights for street purposes

On motion of Alderman Platt the petition was received and referred to the Street Committee

Petition of Alfred Johnson asking Authority to transfer his license as retailer of liquors at the place known as the Bridge Saloon

On motion of Alderman Killell the petition was received and referred to the City Attorney for his opinion as to the authority of Councils granting such petition

Petition of Mrs Mary Duffau asking that the assessment on her property for the year 1844 be reduced from \$1400 to \$2300

On motion of Alderman Platt the petition was laid on the table

The following petitions for the establishment of Markets for the sale of butchers meat outside of Market limits were presented.

To E Beckat #13 on corner of Cherry and Colorado streets Opp J C Hamel on Red River about J C Galt on West Pecan Street Peter Schmidt on corner of Guadalupe and Magnolia Avenue

On motion of Alderman Killell the petitions were received and granted

Petitions from 136 citizens and Taxpayers asking for the erection of a Marshal House on Block No 59 near Pecan Street City of Austin

On motion of Alderman Groves the petitions were received and referred to the Committee on Marshal House

Petition of Mrs Mary Ramsey asking

payment in the sum of \$25.25 for damage done to clothing etc at the time of the shooting of Mr. Williams at her house on the 8th of March 1848

On Motion of Alderman Platt the petition was received

On Motion of Alderman Platt the report was received and accepted

Now Hon the Mayor then called Alderman Loring to the chair and then stated, that his name had been connected with the Ordinance providing for the erection of the Pecan Branch Market house

he deserved in justice to himself and for the information of the people of the City, to go over the action of the City Council on said ordinance. The ordinance was introduced at the meeting of Council held March 8th and read first time, a motion was made to suspend the rules and put the ordinance on its second reading. This motion was lost by the following vote. ~~P~~res Alderman Miller Miller
Metz, Wall, Platt, and ~~Strong~~, ~~Strong~~ Alderman Brown and Harkley. On motion the ordinance was then referred to the ordinance Committee.

At a meeting of Council held March 11th the ordinance was reported back with a verbal statement from the Chairman of the Committee, Alderman H. A. H. Miller, that the Committee could not agree upon any report. The ordinance was then read the second time. Alderman Harkley moved to lay the ordinance on the table which motion was lost.

The Council then adjourned but was immediately re-convened for the purpose of considering a communication, from the Assessor and Collector, after which the Council adjourned. The Council was re-convened at 7.30 P.M. same day by the Mayor at the request of three Aldermen, Brown, Harkley and Sheehan. Upon the convening of the Council, Alderman Harkley states that as he was one of the members who had requested this call, he had done so for the purpose of taking further action upon the market ordinance. Alderman Brown offered a resolution that the Mayor be requested not to bring this ordinance before the Council until the next regular meeting. A point of order was raised that the resolution was contrary to the provisions of the Charter and could not be entertained. The Chair sustained the point of order but informed the Council that he would pay due consideration to their wishes. The Mayor then stated that the ordinance had been acted upon in the usual manner and as required by the rules regulating the proceedings of the Council, and asked whether any Alderman could speak for or against as to their action when the ordinance came up for amendment, rejection or committal which was then in order. As far as he was concerned he had not told any body what his action would be in case the ordinance

was passed and came to him for approval or veto
The vote upon the suspension of the rules was the only vote
ordered by the Council by Year and Days. He then asked
that the Council order all the proceedings had on this ordinance
published so that the people could judge intelligently
upon the action of the Council.

Alderman Platt rose to a question of privilege and
stated that his name had also been used in connection with
this ordinance. He referred to his minority report on the first
Market house ordinance, and stated that he as well as Mr. Ball
were opposed to the limits presented in said ordinance,
and that both of them were in favor of free markets whenever
the people desired them, that he had made a motion to exclude
the 9th and 10th wards from the operation of said ordinance
which motion was lost.

Alderman Platt moved that all the proceedings re-
lating to the market ordinance be published, but it re-
ceived no second.

It is from the Mayor resumed the chair and made
the following appointments on standing committees of the
Council.

Market House which passed its second reading March
11th 1848. Carried

Alderman Shuckaw moved that the ordi-

of Twenty five and 25/100 dollars be and the same
is hereby appropriated for the payment of the
account presented by Mrs Ramsey against the
City for damage done to her furniture and clothing

Alderman Grooker moved to suspend the
rules and put the Resolution on its second
reading.
