Regular Meeting of City Council

March 4th 1848

Council called to order at 8.10 P.M.
Mayor DeSpur in the chair

Roll called and the following members
answered. Alderman Brown, Brookner, Miller Mallett
Markley, Metz, Talle, Platt and Shuckard

Absent Alderman Strong. Quorum present
Alderman Miller moved a call of the Council
call sustained and the Marshall was directed to
bring in the absents.

On motion of Alderman Miller the call of the Council
was suspended

Alderman Strong came in and answered
the Journals of the meetings of February 4th, 6th, 8th, 9th
and 12th 1848 were read and approved

On Motion of Alderman Brown the further reading
of the Journals was dispensed with

Petition of L. L. Stotski stating that he was ap-
pointed City Surveyor December 1st 1843. That he has never
received any compensation for services performed
from the time of his appointment to the 16th day of
March 1844. That the City of Austin is indebted to
him for three and one half months salary, and asks

that the City Council grant authority for the payment of his claim.

On motion of Alderman Miller the Petition was received and referred to Committee on Cemetery.

Petition of John Holtzinger stating that he deposited with the City Assessor and Collector \$25⁰⁰ for License for one year for selling butchers meat and filed his Petition for the privilege of conducting said business. That he did not know at the time that license could be obtained for less period, but as license is granted for three months he asks that his license be granted for that time, and that he be refunded the sum of \$18⁷⁵ it being the amount paid in excess for the amount prayed for in petition.

Petition of L. B. West asking that Boys & Ore Streets between San Antonio and Bruce Streets be improved.

On motion of Alderman Strong the Petition was received and referred to the Committee on Streets.

Petition of a number of citizens asking that Charles Olsen a citizen of Austin be granted a license to retail liquors in the City without license as he is a poor blind man with a large family dependent on him for support.

On Motion of Alderman Crooker the Petition was received and referred to the Committee on Charity

✓ Petitions of citizens asking that the City Council rescind their action on the report made by a special committee appointed to examine the Reservoir constructed by the City Water Company, or that the Council appoint a new committee to investigate the matter anew and suggesting that it might be well to appoint an advisory committee of citizens not members of the City Council.

On Motion of Alderman Miller the Petition was received

Report of City Marshal, City Physician and City Doctor for the Month of February were read and received

Petition of City Doctor, stating that he had made certain improvements at the City Cemetery, and had planted a lot of Trees and Strawberry at his own expense and asking that he be remunerated for the same

On Motion of Alderman Miller the Petition was received and referred to the Committee on Cemetery

Alderman Hartley of the Committee appointed February 8th, 1878 to wait upon the officers of the R. H. G. L. of the I. O. O. F. and inform them of the action of the City Council in leasing to them a Public Square in the City and an Appropriation of \$5000 - to aid them in the construction of their grand temple. Report it that the Committee had discharged the duty assigned them. That the donation from the City had been accepted and that the Committee was requested by that honorable body to present the thanks of the organization to the City Council for their munificent gift.

On Motion of Alderman Miller the report of the Committee was received

By Alderman Miller. Resolved by the City Council of the City of Austin, That the Resolution passed by

the City Council adopting the report of the Committee recommending that the Reservoir constructed by the Water Company be not received by the City of Austin be and the same is hereby rescinded and repealed.

On Motion the resolution was referred to a special Committee of three.

Alderman Miller, Brook or. and McMillen were appointed on the Committee.

Communication from the Austin Gaslights and Coal Company, proposing to furnish gas for Street lamps at \$5.40 per lamp per annum if the number of lamps is increased to 444, and for every increase of four lamps will make a reduction of \$1.00 per lamp per annum. Should the number of lamps reach 100 the price to be permanently fixed at \$4.00 per ^{Lamp} annum. The Company to light and keep in repair all lamps, and will reimburse the City for all Lamp Posts now owned by it, provided the City enters into contract for a term of years.

The above rates are based on current funds.

On Motion of Alderman Miller the communication was received and referred to Committee on Streets.

An Ordinance appropriating \$12.00 - for the improvement of Streets and Bridges in Ward 1, 2, 3, 4, 5, 6, 7 and 8, which passed its second reading February 15th was taken up and read the third time.

Alderman Brook or moved that the ordinance do pass.

The following Veto Messages were presented by His Hon the Mayor
Mayors Office Austin Texas

February 6th 1848

To the Hon Board of Alderman City of Austin
Gentlemen

I have the honor to return herewith the
Resolution reducing the number of Oil Street Lamps
to not exceeding twenty five passed by your honorable body
February 4th 1848 with my objections thereto.

Rule 5 of the rules of Order of the City Council
requires all resolutions of a general character to be read
on three several days unless two thirds of a full board shall
vote a suspension of the rule.

The above cited resolution was only read once and passed
without a suspension of the rule. This not being in accordance
with our rules is therefore in my opinion Void.

There is now before the Street Committee petitions from
Wards One, Two, Three, Four, Seven, Eight Nine and Ten,
and a resolution from Ward Five, asking for additional
lamps. Aldermen who presented these petitions and resolution
must certainly have done so at the request of their constitue-
nts. and the people should be heard in this matter, before
hasty legislation is resorted to.

I am unable to find that any lamps have been
established in the City except upon the petition of the people
through their Aldermen, and as stated before, petitions from
Eight Wards are now before the Council from Citizens, asking
additional lamps. Some Wards having no lamps of any
kind.

Every portion of the city should enjoy the same privileges
and I cannot, even if this resolution had been passed in
accordance with law, give my approval to a measure
which would deprive a large majority of the citizens of
the benefits enjoyed by people living on two or three Streets.
