Regular monthly meeting.

His Honor J. B. Wheeler in the Chair called the Council to order. The Roll being called. The following Aldermen answered to their names, to wit

Minutes of the months of May and June 1873 were read and adopted.

Report of the judges of Election, held on the 5th day of July 1873 for Aldermen of the 9th and 10th wards was read wherein it shows that A. H. Longley received the majority votes cast for Alderman of the 9th ward, and Scipio Thompson having received the majority votes cast of the 10th ward. On motion of Ald. Robinson A. H. Longley and Scipio Thompson were declared duly Elected. They were then sworn into office.

Petition of Messrs. H. Green & F. Richman asking privilege to retail spirituous Liquors not less than one quart, was read, and granted.

Petition of D. J. Tracy praying to have privilege to open a Meat Market on Mr Quate's lot fronting on Pecan

Stout in Block No 66, was read, referred to Market House Committee, and ^{made} report by next meeting.
 Petition of Joseph Hallam praying privilege to keep or to give dances in his Hall on the corner of Tescan & Brazos Street, was read, and on motion laid on the table.
 Report of City Sexton for the month of June 1873 was received and referred to Cemetery Committee.
 Report of City Physician was received and the reading dispensed with.

Petition of Joseph Howell praying to have issued to him a city warrant for one lost or stolen from him, as certified, was on motion granted.

Communication from Mrs. Biza Jackson offering her thanks for granting her the free use of the City Hall for the examination of her music class, was read, and on motion of Ald. Brueggelhoff ordered to be spread upon the Minutes.

Ald. Brueggelhoff offered the following Ordinance

Sec. 1st Be it ordained by the City Council of the City of Austin That an ordinance regulating the sale of Vegetables, passed March 3rd 1873, and approved March 4th 1873, shall be amended as follows, strike out 8 o'clock and insert 7 o'clock.

Sec 2nd That this ordinance shall be in force from and after its passage.

On motion of Ald. Hannig the rules were suspended, the ordinance read the second time. On motion of Ald. Robinson the rules were further suspended the ordinance read the third time, the yeas and nays being called the ordinance passed by the following vote.

Ald. Brueggelhoff offered an Ordinance to authorize the City Marshal to appoint two mounted policemen out of the present police force already appointed, as as a night police. Which Ordinance was read the first time, and on motion, further action postponed until the next meeting.

Ald. Brueggelhoff offered the following Resolution to wit.

Be it resolved by the city Council of the City of Austin that His Honor the Mayor and the Aldermen of the 3rd, 5th, 6th and 9th wards, are hereby appointed a special Committee to apportion the City into ten wards with instruction to report on Thursday Evening July 10th 1873. Which resolution was adopted.

Petition of Miss Aliza Wokke & Miss Von Schenk praying for the privilege to erect a female Academy on a certain Block in the city, set aside by the State of Texas for an Academy, was read, and on motion of Ald. Brueggerhoff, referred to a special Committee of three, whereupon His Honor, appointed Ald. Brueggerhoff, Longley, and Boardman.

Street Committee, to whom was referred the bill of John J. Miller for fixing part of a culvert on Bois De Ark Street, reported adversely to allowing said bill, whereupon motion of Ald. Longley the report of the Committee was adopted.

Ald. Robinson moved that the Mayor be authorized to sell enough warrants to pay the bill of C. J. Whittle for flooring the firemens building, and the same be charged to the Fire fund, which motion was unanimously carried.

Ald. Brueggerhoff moved that the Mayor be instructed to issue in favor of the Military Institute a warrant for the amount of two hundred ^{and fifty} dollars \$250⁰⁰ in obedience to an obligation made by a former administration, which motion was carried.

Ald. Brueggerhoff offered the following resolution to wit: By it resolved by the city Council of the city of Austin that the sum of two hundred dollars be and is hereby appropriated to defray the contingent expenses of the city Government to August first 1873.

On motion of Ald. Robinson the rules were suspended the resolution read the second time, on motion of Ald. Longley the rules were further suspended, the resolution read the third time, the yeas and nays being called the resolution passed by the following vote.
