BASIS FOR RECOMMENDATION:

The ca. 1907 house is an excellent example of Queen Anne architecture and is associated with August W. Brill, one of Austin's foremost saddle-makers and leather dealers; his son Arno also grew up in this house – Arno was one of the most famous leather holster craftsmen in the Southwest.

Architecture:

One and a half story wing and gable plan Queen Anne style frame house with cutaway corners and brackets on the tri-partite bay window in the projecting front

gable and clipped side gables of the main roof of the house; a partial-width hipped-roof independent porch with turned posts and balusters, a large, central front-gabled dormer with fishscale imbrication; 1:1 fenestration. The house has a two-story addition to the rear which was constructed in 2002; the addition is complementary in style, materials, and massing to the original part of the house.

Historical Associations:

The house was built in 1907 for August W. and Ida Brill, who moved here from 604 W. 9th Street. The house was one of the first on this section of W. 9th Street; the 1900 Sanborn map does not detail this area of the city at all, and city directories show only a few houses at the time the Brill House appears. Deed records indicate that August and Ida Brill purchased this property from G.M. Brass and wife (the Brasses lived across the street) in 1906, and then contracted with F.O. Blomquist in 1907 to construct this house, as evidenced by a mechanic's lien.

August W. Brill was born near Welcome in Austin County, Texas in 1872, and died in Bandera County in 1954. Brill began his career in leatherwork as a clerk for William T. Wroe and Sons, manufacturers of saddles, harnesses, horse collars, buggies, carriages, and road wagons, with offices and salesrooms in the 400 block of Congress Avenue and a factory in the 100 block of E. 5th Street. By 1913, Brill had set up his own company in the 200 block of E. 6th Street; Wroe was still in business on Congress Avenue. The 1912-13 city directory lists Brill as a manufacturer and dealer in saddles, harnesses, saddlery hardware, leather shoe findings, horse collars, buggies, road and spring wagons, or almost exactly the same business as W.T. Wroe and Sons. Brill moved from 204 E. 6th Street to 218 E. 6th Street by 1918, and to 302 E. 6th Street by 1930, where he was still in business at the time he moved from this house to 3212 Gilbert Street in West Austin around 1945. August and Ida Brill had 3 sons: Arno, who became very well known throughout Texas as a leather holster-maker (and whose daughter, Idanell, became Mrs. John Connally), Lionel, who worked as a salesman for his father's leather business, and Virgil, who was a geologist for an oil company in San Antonio. August W. Brill had one of the most successful and prominent leather businesses in Texas, transitioning from manufacturing harnesses and saddles to carrying leather goods and shoe manufacturers' supplies.

August Brill sold the house to his son, Lionel, in 1944. Lionel Brill then sold the property to H.A. and Wilma Jamison in 1945. The Jamisons sold the property to Charles A. and Edna Duffy in 1946, who then sold it to Hardeman (Hardy) Roberts later that same year. Hardy Roberts sold the property the same day he bought it to his son, Ben Hardeman Roberts, and his wife Audrey. Ben Roberts was a contractor and carpenter, and is listed as the owner of the property through the late 1950s. Werner Winter, an associate professor of linguistics at the University of Texas, and his wife Ingrid are listed as the owners of the house in the early 1960s; from the mid-1960s through the late 1908s, John M. and Sandra K. Weinstock owned and occupied the house. John Weinstock is a professor of Germanic languages and Scandinavian studies at the University of Texas. The Weinstocks sold the property to the current owner, Nicolas Shumway, who is a professor of Spanish language and literature at the University of Texas, with special emphasis on the history and culture of Argentina, Brazil, and Mexico.



1906-07 The address is not listed in the directory. August W. Brill is listed as a clerk for William T. Wroe and Sons and lived at 604 W. 9th Street.

NOTES:

August Brill appears in the 1880 U.S. Census as the 8-year old son of Henry and Louise Brill who lived in Welcome, Austin County, Texas. Henry Brill, then 36, was born in Prussia and listed his occupation as a farmer. Louise Brill, then 31, had been born in Texas to Prussian-born parents; her stated occupation was "keeping house." August Brill was born in Texas.

The 1900 U.S. Census shows A.W. and Ida Brill residing in Precinct 5 of Austin County, Texas. A.W. Brill was then 28 years old; Ida Brill was then 25, and had been born in Texas to Germanborn parents. They had been married for 5 years and had 2 sons: Arno, age 3, and Lionel, age 2. A.W. Brill listed his occupation as a saddler.

The 1910 U.S. Census shows August W. and Ida Brill living at 1109 W. 9th Street. August W. was then 37 years old; Ida was then 35; they had been married for 14 years. By the time of this census report, son Virgil had been born; he was 4 years old; Lionel was 11, and Arno was 13. August W. Brill listed his occupation as the manager of a saddlery.

The 1920 U.S. Census shows August W., Ida, and Virgil Brill at this address; Lionel and Arno had moved out of the house by that time. Brill was listed as a saddle and harness maker with his own store.

The 1930 U.S. Census shows August, Ida, Lionel, and his wife Mary Brill at this address. August Brill as listed as the proprietor of a leather shop; Lionel Brill was listed as a salesman for a leather shop. Arno Brill, his wife, Kathleen, 5 children, and a live-in maid were listed as living at 901 West Avenue. Arno's occupation was listed as a leather wholesaler. Virgil Brill, his wife Carrie, and 2 children were living in San Antonio, where he worked as a geologist for an oil company.



The early career of Arnold W. Brill was as a Saddle Maker and Leather Worker In his own small business in Austin, Texas in 1932 – 1933. This short attempt at opening his business this shortly after the depression was ill advised and by the mid 1930s it is believed that Arnold W. Brill was working at the S. D. Myres Company, in their Border Patrol Equipment Division. Acquiring the much needed knowledge of hoister making and design was probably greatly enhanced working at S. D. Myres Company known for their quality materials and workmanship. By the 1940s A. W. Brill was sought out by many lawman, military, competitors and gun enthuslasts to design and make their gun leather. It was at this time through the 1940s and 1950s that A. W. Brill produced gun leather as good or better than you could get anywhere and he ran a very successful business as well as he acquired fame in the industries related to his products.
