

One of the most preventable types of childhood deaths is that of small children left in a hot car. According to Safe Kids USA, Texas leads the nation in these deaths and has been identified with other states (California, Florida and Arizona) for state-focused campaigns to prevent hyperthermia deaths.

The Emergency Medical Services Department (EMS) reaches a large number of people in our community as a medical first responder and a health educator. As a medical first responder, we provide standby services at major events such as concerts, athletic events, and festivals. As a health educator, we train citizens on the subjects of CPR, First Aid, child passenger safety, and infant safe sleep practices. Through these public interactions, we will be able distribute information to parents and caregivers on the dangers associated with leaving a child alone in a car.

The acceptance of these funds will allow EMS to purchase printed hyperthermia prevention materials to be distributed at community events and public education classes.

All department grant application requests are reviewed by the Budget Office prior to submission to ensure that the grant minimizes the financial impact to the City. The General Fund will not be required to contribute to this grant.
