<u>SUMMARY STAFF RECOMMENDATION</u>: Staff cannot recommend the proposed zoning change from Commercial Business District (CBD) combining district to Commercial Business District – Historic Landmark (CBD-H-) combining district zoning.

Although the house, as a very good representative example of a bungalow with simple Craftsman style details, and meets the criteria of embodying the distinguishing characteristics of a recognized architectural style, it does not meet a second criterion for historic zoning as is required by code.

Additionally, a study of the condition of the existing house by a structural engineer indicates extensive rot, structural failure and termite damage. Therefore rehabilitation of the existing structure would likely require significant reconstruction. In the Staff's opinion the expense and amount of reconstruction that would likely be needed to accomplish a rehabilitation that would result in a sound structure is not reasonable. The proposal to deconstruct and reuse materials in a compatibly designed new structure is sensitive to the character of the Rainey Street National Register District. Therefore, Staff supports the applicant's proposal to deconstruct the existing house and construct a new building with a similar façade design using salvaged materials.

QUALIFICATIONS FOR LANDMARK DESIGNATION:

<u>Architecture</u>: A very good example of a one-story frame bungalow with simple craftsman architectural features.

<u>Historical Associations</u>: Associated with Bertie Bell, widow of Burt Bell and wife of Fred Siegeler. Bertie Bell lived in the house from 1935 to the early 1950's. Paul Guerra, a restaurant kitchen worker, and his wife Juanita lived in the house from the early 1950's to the mid 1970's.

<u>HISTORIC LANDMARK COMMISSION ACTION</u>: October 24, 2011: Initiated a historic zoning case.

<u>DEPARTMENT COMMENTS</u>: The house is listed as a Priority 2 for research in the Comprehensive Cultural Resources Survey (1984), and is listed as a contributing property in the Rainey Street National Register District.

Architecture:

The existing residence, built c. 1935, is an approximately 1,500 square foot, one-story wood frame, rectangular-plan bungalow, with Craftsman detailing. The house has a front-gabled roof over the main body of the house and a separate front-gabled roof over the partial width front porch. Both have exposed rafter ends and decorative braces under the gables. The porch roof is supported by battered wood columns decorated with trim that sit upon stuccoed piers. There are decorative box-pattern wood railings between the piers. The house is sided with narrow profile, lap siding. There are two pairs of double windows on the front façade, both with double-hung wood sashes. The front door appears to be original, with 4:2 glazing in the top third.

Historical Associations:

Permits and city directory research indicate the house was built c. 1935. Burt Bell submitted an application for a sewer connection at 77 and 79 Rainey Street in 1919. However, it appears that the parcel addressed as 77 Rainey Street was subdivided to create 79 Rainey Street sometime between 1922 and 1933 when Mrs. Burt Bell applied for a water service permit. City directories indicate the property was owned by Mrs. Bertie Bell, the widow of Burt Bell. Bertie Bell is likely the same Bertie later listed as the wife of Fred W. Siegeler and living at this address in the 1944-45 city directory.

Fred W. and Bertie Siegeler lived in the home until 1952, at which time they moved to 2106 Oxford Avenue. Paul Guerra, a laborer and kitchen helper, and his wife Juanita, then lived in the house until 1976.



The 1930-31 city directory shows Burt Bell, a fireman for City Water Light & Power, living at 77 Rainey Street, and Clarence Bell (a relative?) and his wife Ethel living at 78 Rainey Street. Burt Bell applied for a sewer connection for 77 and 79 Rainey Street on 8/1/1919 and for a water service connection for 79 Rainey Street on 5/31/1933.

Burt and Bertie Bell show up in the 1930 U.S. Census as living at 77 Rainey Street; along with Bertie's son, Edgar Wallace. They owned the house; he was 39, Bertie was 51, and Edgar was 15. All had been born in Texas. He was a fireman with the City Water and Light Department; she had no occupation, and Edgar is listed as a plumber's helper. The 1910 U.S. Census shows Burt as the 19 year old son of L.W. Bell a city engineer and his wife, Clara. They lived at 500 Walsh Street. Burt was the delivery boy for a butcher shop.

Burt Bell died at his home on 77 Rainey Street in 1933 after a long illness.

He is survived by his widow, Mrs. Bertie Bell, his mother, Mrs. Clara Bell, and six step-children, Mrs. C. E. Reckart of Kansas City, Mo., Mrs. J. D. Tannehill, Jr., Mrs. Claud Bible, Mrs. H. S. Sandal, H. S. Wallace and Edgar Wallace all of Austin. Funeral services will be held from the family residence, Thursday at 2:30 p. m. with the Rev. H. C. Morrison officiating. Interment will Oakwood cemetery. Pallbearers will be Arthur Woody, C. R. Sjoburg, Otto Eilers, H. E. Bradley, Oscar Kunz and Frank Beyer.

Fred W. Siegeler appears in the 1930 U.S. Census as married to a woman named Rebecca; they rented a house at 57 Comal Street. Fred Siegeler had been born in Arkansas and worked as a city laborer. He was then 43 and Rebecca was 28. They had five children. Fred W. Siegeler died in Travis County in 1955.




