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


I. Executive Summary

Texas Pregnancy Care Network **The TX Alternative to Abortion Services Program** **Executive Summary**

Highlights for the First Quarter (Q1) of fiscal year (FY) 2007-08:

- Life Aid Hotline: During Q1, the 1-888-LifeAid hotline received 270 calls.
- Clients by Age: One thousand five hundred and sixty (1,560) clients were served during Q1. The most frequent recipients of services were clients of ages 20-24, followed by clients of ages 25-29 and 18-19, respectively. Clients served during fiscal year 2007-08, cumulated by month, are illustrated in Fig. 1 below.
- Visits by Age: Client visits during Q1 totaled 9,558, for an average of 6.1 visits per client served. Client visits occurring during fiscal year 2007-08, cumulated by month, are illustrated in Fig. 2 below.

It is shared for the limited purpose of illustrating the quality and scope of the Service Provider's work. The client has given her consent for her story to be included in this report, and her name has been changed to protect her privacy.***

The Executive Director shared the story of one of The Life Center's clients:

"Amy" found herself in a new and frightening situation, pregnant. Amy's boyfriend, who lived in California, was pressuring her to move there with him and abort the baby. He tried convincing her that neither one of them could afford a baby in their lives. His justification for abortion was that there was not a baby inside her yet, only tissue. Confused and scared, Amy turned to her mom for advice and support. Amy's mom called The Life Center. She asked for information regarding abortion and the Center's services. Amy and her mother were scheduled to come in and meet with a counselor. Amy was given a pregnancy test and this gave a positive result. Then she was provided information about adoption, abortion, and fetal development and she also received information about referrals. She was also told about the Center's services which include pre-natal classes and was informed what her body was going through at that specific time. She made the decision to parent the baby and to enroll in pre-natal classes. She was very eager to speak to the father of the baby and inform him of all she had learned.

During Amy's last visit to the Center, she shared that she had mailed the information she received to her boyfriend. He was overwhelmed with guilt and regret about trying to convince her to abort. He was just as astonished that there

was an actual baby growing inside her. Consequently, he supported her in her decision to carry the baby.

The client is now making regular prenatal visits to her doctor, taking prenatal vitamins, and doing very well. She is attending the Center's prenatal development classes and borrowed a pregnancy book from the Center's library. She is still attending high school and plans to graduate early. The Center encouraged her to pursue higher education and continue on the path that will lead to the achievement of goals that she is setting for her life.

VI. Conclusion

The Life Center is focused on providing pregnancy assistance, support, education, counseling and material assistance to pregnant women in need. They are well known within the Permian Basin region as a resource for women experiencing challenging pregnancy and parenting situations. The Life Center has a wide variety of educational programs, which include such topics as Parenting, Fatherhood, Sexual Health, and Relationships.



V. Client Success Story

It is shared for the limited purpose of illustrating the quality and scope of the Service Provider's work. The client has given her consent for her story to be included in this report, and her name has been omitted to protect her privacy.

The Executive Director shared the story of one of the House of Hope's clients:

Client came to House of Hope in February of 2007 for a free pregnancy test. She had two children and had recently gone through a divorce as a result of domestic abuse. During our conversation she disclosed that just had recently had an abortion in January and suffered greatly from her decision to abort, but she was giving serious thought to aborting again because she simply could not provide for another child.

Client was unemployed and had been in and out of public housing facilities trying to get back on her feet. As a single mother, she knew that having another child was not going to be easy. I shared with the client the types of services we could provide for her to lessen the financial burden of providing for three children. I explained to her that we wanted to support her both emotionally and financially to assist her during this time in her life. I let her know she was not alone. I explained to her that because she was pregnant, she would be eligible to enroll in our program, which would consist of seeing her on a monthly basis for classes at our center, and, if she attended classes, she would be eligible for material assistance every month. I also told her that our staff and volunteers serve as an extended family for women, offering emotional support during an unplanned pregnancy. She cried with me and said she could not go through the pain for aborting again, but would need ongoing support.

After she left our center, we followed up with her a week later. The first class she attended was our class on self-esteem. During her pregnancy she attended our six week program on self-esteem, classes on breastfeeding, classes on labor preparation and classes on sexual health. We continued to have regular contact with the client and began to see a transformation as the client became more certain of herself and her abilities to raise her three children.

She recently delivered in November. With a newborn in the house and two other children, House of Hope selected this particular client to provide Christmas gifts for the entire family. We provided clothing, food and presents for the family and will continue to work with client for the following year offering emotional support, classes and material assistance.

VI. Conclusion

The corrective actions for the deficiencies noted in sections III and IV of this report are deductions.

The House of Hope is focused on providing pregnancy assistance, education, counseling and material assistance to pregnant women in crisis pregnancies. The House of Hope offers life skills classes including topics such as parenting, breast feeding, pregnancy, and sexual health. The Center will soon offer limited ultrasound services to clients.



The Executive Director shared the story of one of the Seton Home's client:

"Ana" came to Seton Home when she was 4 months pregnant with her second child. Ana had a neglectful and dangerous early life since her mother was a drug addict and did not care for her children. After being placed in Child Protective Services custody, Ana and her baby daughter were living at a shelter in Kerrville for eight months before being placed at Seton Home in August of 2006.

At Seton Home, Ana found a safe and nurturing home to live with her daughter and to give birth to her new baby girl, who is now almost a year old. Throughout her stay, Ana received a host of services including prenatal care, health and nutrition counseling and education, childbirth instruction, food, clothing, diapers and all their baby needs. Ana also received individual and group counseling, drug and alcohol abuse counseling, parenting education and life skills training.

Most importantly, she is catching up on her education and is scheduled to receive her GED in early February. She has been able to attend classes knowing that her daughters are well taken care of in Seton Home's licensed on-site day care facility. Ana wants to become a registered nurse and is looking for a job in the health care industry to support herself while she attends college.

Ana has a mentor who visits her at Seton Home each week. She is grateful for all the assistance she received and for her new life. She has great hope for the future for herself and for her daughters. Ana said, "I have two beautiful daughters that love me. I show myself every day that I'm growing to be a better person. Seton Home is the best place that ever happened to me. It makes me feel safe to have people who care for me and who stand by my side. I'm glad the state of Texas has a place like Seton Home."



VI. Conclusion

Through counseling, she determined she could carry the baby to term and then place the child for adoption. She determined that she would be giving the child a gift by giving her life and then making sure she was loved and cared for, having an opportunity for the child to reach her full potential. She did make an adoption plan and has contact with the adoptive family through pictures, letters and some visits. This contact, as well as the grief and loss counseling, has helped her through the process, and she feels she made the right decision.



Eight counselors/mentors experienced delays in obtaining their clearances or were still waiting to receive their clearances. A possible breach of confidentiality occurred because a client form was misplaced.
- C. Corrective Action Recommended/Taken: Reimbursements made for services provided by counselors/mentors who did not have active background clearances will be deducted. Confidential record-keeping practices have been reviewed with the site personnel to ensure that client files are organized and secure in the future.

"Tania" visited the Center because her friends had told her that there was a "really pretty" pregnancy center in the Fifth Ward area and she wanted to see it for herself. She had already had two abortions and was pregnant again. She was counseled/mentored and given referrals.

Two months later she came back to the Center, she was still pregnant. She requested community referrals. The Director also took her to the Center's Closet to give her material assistance.

During a later visit, the Director and the client went to a shop to buy a car seat. A salesperson recognized the Director and started telling a coworker that that woman (Director) helped her during her crisis pregnancy, then took a picture of her baby and handed it to the Director. Tania was listening.

Recently, Tania visited the Center again and she did not have a picture to show but she brought her newborn baby girl for the Center's personnel to know her.

VI. Conclusion

The corrective action for the deficiencies related to clearances and reimbursement compliance noted in sections in III and IV of this report is deduction. The corrective action for the procedural or administrative deficiencies noted in section III of this report had been completed as of this report's date.





V. Client Success Story

****Note: The following paragraphs describe a case successfully managed by the Service Provider evaluated in this report since it joined the Texas Alternative to Abortion Services Program. It is shared for the limited purpose of illustrating the quality and scope of the Service Provider's work. The client has given her consent for her story to be included in this report, and her name has been changed to protect her privacy.***

The Executive Director shared the story of one of the Gabriel Project Life Center's clients:

When "Mary" first called us on a very cold January day, she was living out of her car. She had no job, no where to live, no driver's license, and no gas money. She did not even know how far along her pregnancy was. Over the phone, she told us that she needed maternity clothes, and diapers. The conversation was cut short too soon when we were disconnected because she ran out of minutes on her cell phone.

Our second contact with Mary occurred several days later when she visited the Gabriel Project Life Center. She spent time meeting with one of our mentors where she shared with us her situation, her concerns and her needs. It was at this visit that we learned how Mary became homeless. After becoming pregnant, her husband left her and began having an affair with a woman in California. She could not provide for herself alone. At this visit, we provided maternity clothes, shoes, toiletries, and children's clothing, as well as information on other agencies that could provide assistance. In her evaluation, she wrote that she liked the Gabriel Project Life Center because the staff "seemed truly concerned" for her and her children.

Over the next six months, Mary came numerous times to the Gabriel Project Life Center to talk with our mentors, to attend pregnancy and parenting classes, and to receive material assistance.

By March of that same year, Mary found an apartment and obtained a driver's license. Her husband was sending her financial support to pay for the apartment, but she was still jobless. On a sad note, at a doctor's appointment at that time, she learned that there were medical complications with her pregnancy. She was also under tremendous stress because her mother was diagnosed with brain cancer. In addition to emotional support, we provided her with more clothing, wipes, shampoo, and shoes. She told us that the staff at the Gabriel Project Life Center was "understanding" of her situation and hardships.

From May to July, Mary attended a total of 9 parenting and pregnancy classes, including "Stages of Pregnancy", "Age Appropriate Play" and "In the Womb". At the first class she attended, she told us that she really enjoyed the class and that she planned on coming to more classes. Her attendance at the educational classes allowed her to earn two brand new baby furniture items. She chose a swing and a bouncer for her baby.

Mary's last visit to the Life Center occurred on July 31 of the same year when she brought her newborn baby to the Life Center. She said that she loves the baby and that "he is just lovely". We listened as she told us her concerns about her marriage.

In December, she told us that she had stopped coming in because she found a job. She now holds a managerial position at a large department store. She told us that she appreciated all the help that she received from the Life Center, and that we were instrumental in helping her through her pregnancy. She also told us that if she comes across anyone who is in a crisis pregnancy that she will tell them how much we helped her, so that they too may reach out to us for help.



VI. Conclusion

A client tells her story in her own words:

The Source for Women has been a wonderful oasis and resource for me and my family. When I first came in, earlier this year, I wanted to terminate my pregnancy due to just having a baby in December 2006, marital problems, and the pressure involved in raising my other children without much support.

I came in and I was able to cry, let some of these heated and pent up emotions out, and talk about my options. I wanted someone to listen, and not preach to me, and my prayers were answered. The staff members, classes, and material resources available have been such a great relief to me.

Sometimes I still feel stress. But at least I know I have a place where I can go to get the help I need.

I have decided to keep my new unborn child. The staff at The Source has supported me in my decision and has even helped me with my 10 month-old daughter. I have a great sense of reassurance because I feel that every staff member is giving me her best.

I have never been judged by anyone at the Source for Women. They have gone over and beyond my expectations.

VI. Conclusion

The corrective action for the deficiencies related to reimbursement compliance noted in section IV of this report is deduction. The corrective action for deficiency included in section III and IV of this report related to a misplaced client form is review of confidential file management and has been finished prior to this report's date.

The Source for Women of Houston Galleria Center is heavily focused on providing pregnancy assistance, education, counseling and material assistance to pregnant women in need. They are well known within the central area of Houston as a resource for women experiencing challenging pregnancy and parenting situations. The Galleria Center has a variety of educational programs that are delivered in-house. English and Spanish language courses topics as Parenting Skills, Childbirth, Nutrition and Cooking, Life Skills, Relationships, among others.





Since then, the volunteer and Phyllis have been meeting regularly, and Phyllis has decided not to abort.




The Executive Director shared the story of one of The Life Center's clients:

"Amy" found herself in a new and frightening situation, pregnant. Amy's boyfriend, who lived in California, was pressuring her to move there with him and abort the baby. He tried convincing her that neither one of them could afford a baby in their lives. His justification for abortion was that there was not a baby inside her yet, only tissue. Confused and scared, Amy turned to her mom for advice and support. Amy's mom called The Life Center. She asked for information regarding abortion and the Center's services. Amy and her mother were scheduled to come in and meet with a counselor. Amy was given a pregnancy test and this gave a positive result. Then she was provided information about adoption, abortion, and fetal development and she also received information about referrals. She was also told about the Center's services which include pre-natal classes and was informed what her body was going through at that specific time. She made the decision to parent the baby and to enroll in pre-natal classes. She was very eager to speak to the father of the baby and inform him of all she had learned.

During Amy's last visit to the Center, she shared that she had mailed the information she received to her boyfriend. He was overwhelmed with guilt and regret about trying to convince her to abort. He was just as astonished that there

was an actual baby growing inside her. Consequently, he supported her in her decision to carry the baby.

The client is now making regular prenatal visits to her doctor, taking prenatal vitamins, and doing very well. She is attending the Center's prenatal development classes and borrowed a pregnancy book from the Center's library. She is still attending high school and plans to graduate early. The Center encouraged her to pursue higher education and continue on the path that will lead to the achievement of goals that she is setting for her life.

VI. Conclusion

The Life Center is focused on providing pregnancy assistance, support, education, counseling and material assistance to pregnant women in need. They are well known within the Permian Basin region as a resource for women experiencing challenging pregnancy and parenting situations. The Life Center has a wide variety of educational programs, which include such topics as Parenting, Fatherhood, Sexual Health, and Relationships.



The client has given her consent for her story to be included in this report, and her name has been omitted to protect her privacy.

The Executive Director shared the story of one of the House of Hope's clients:

Client came to House of Hope in February of 2007 for a free pregnancy test. She had two children and had recently gone through a divorce as a result of domestic abuse. During our conversation she disclosed that just had recently had an abortion in January and suffered greatly from her decision to abort, but she was giving serious thought to aborting again because she simply could not provide for another child.

Client was unemployed and had been in and out of public housing facilities trying to get back on her feet. As a single mother, she knew that having another child was not going to be easy. I shared with the client the types of services we could provide for her to lessen the financial burden of providing for three children. I explained to her that we wanted to support her both emotionally and financially to assist her during this time in her life. I let her know she was not alone. I explained to her that because she was pregnant, she would be eligible to enroll in our program, which would consist of seeing her on a monthly basis for classes at our center, and, if she attended classes, she would be eligible for material assistance every month. I also told her that our staff and volunteers serve as an extended family for women, offering emotional support during an unplanned pregnancy. She cried with me and said she could not go through the pain for aborting again, but would need ongoing support.

After she left our center, we followed up with her a week later. The first class she attended was our class on self-esteem. During her pregnancy she attended our six week program on self-esteem, classes on breastfeeding, classes on labor preparation and classes on sexual health. We continued to have regular contact with the client and began to see a transformation as the client became more certain of herself and her abilities to raise her three children.

She recently delivered in November. With a newborn in the house and two other children, House of Hope selected this particular client to provide Christmas gifts for the entire family. We provided clothing, food and presents for the family and will continue to work with client for the following year offering emotional support, classes and material assistance.

VI. Conclusion

The corrective actions for the deficiencies noted in sections III and IV of this report are deductions.

The House of Hope is focused on providing pregnancy assistance, education, counseling and material assistance to pregnant women in crisis pregnancies. The House of Hope offers life skills classes including topics such as parenting, breast feeding, pregnancy, and sexual health. The Center will soon offer limited ultrasound services to clients.



"Ana" came to Seton Home when she was 4 months pregnant with her second child. Ana had a neglectful and dangerous early life since her mother was a drug addict and did not care for her children. After being placed in Child Protective Services custody, Ana and her baby daughter were living at a shelter in Kerrville for eight months before being placed at Seton Home in August of 2006.

At Seton Home, Ana found a safe and nurturing home to live with her daughter and to give birth to her new baby girl, who is now almost a year old. Throughout her stay, Ana received a host of services including prenatal care, health and nutrition counseling and education, childbirth instruction, food, clothing, diapers and all their baby needs. Ana also received individual and group counseling, drug and alcohol abuse counseling, parenting education and life skills training.

Most importantly, she is catching up on her education and is scheduled to receive her GED in early February. She has been able to attend classes knowing that her daughters are well taken care of in Seton Home's licensed on-site day care facility. Ana wants to become a registered nurse and is looking for a job in the health care industry to support herself while she attends college.

Ana has a mentor who visits her at Seton Home each week. She is grateful for all the assistance she received and for her new life. She has great hope for the future for herself and for her daughters. Ana said, "I have two beautiful daughters that love me. I show myself every day that I'm growing to be a better person. Seton Home is the best place that ever happened to me. It makes me feel safe to have people who care for me and who stand by my side. I'm glad the state of Texas has a place like Seton Home."






Two months later she came back to the Center, she was still pregnant. She requested community referrals. The Director also took her to the Center's Closet to give her material assistance.

During a later visit, the Director and the client went to a shop to buy a car seat. A salesperson recognized the Director and started telling a coworker that that woman (Director) helped her during her crisis pregnancy, then took a picture of her baby and handed it to the Director. Tania was listening.

Recently, Tania visited the Center again and she did not have a picture to show but she brought her newborn baby girl for the Center's personnel to know her.

VI. Conclusion

The corrective action for the deficiencies related to clearances and reimbursement compliance noted in sections in III and IV of this report is deduction. The corrective action for the procedural or administrative deficiencies noted in section III of this report had been completed as of this report's date.

The Pregnancy Help Center is heavily focused on providing pregnancy assistance, support, education, counseling and material assistance to pregnant women in need. They are well known within the Fifth Ward area of Houston as a resource for women experiencing challenging pregnancy and parenting situations.





V. Client Success Story

****Note: The following paragraphs describe a case successfully managed by the Service Provider evaluated in this report since it joined the Texas Alternative to Abortion Services Program. It is shared for the limited purpose of illustrating the quality and scope of the Service Provider's work. The client has given her consent for her story to be included in this report, and her name has been changed to protect her privacy.***

The Executive Director shared the story of one of the Gabriel Project Life Center's clients:

When "Mary" first called us on a very cold January day, she was living out of her car. She had no job, no where to live, no driver's license, and no gas money. She did not even know how far along her pregnancy was. Over the phone, she told us that she needed maternity clothes, and diapers. The conversation was cut short too soon when we were disconnected because she ran out of minutes on her cell phone.

Our second contact with Mary occurred several days later when she visited the Gabriel Project Life Center. She spent time meeting with one of our mentors where she shared with us her situation, her concerns and her needs. It was at this visit that we learned how Mary became homeless. After becoming pregnant, her husband left her and began having an affair with a woman in California. She could not provide for herself alone. At this visit, we provided maternity clothes, shoes, toiletries, and children's clothing, as well as information on other agencies that could provide assistance. In her evaluation, she wrote that she liked the Gabriel Project Life Center because the staff "seemed truly concerned" for her and her children.

Over the next six months, Mary came numerous times to the Gabriel Project Life Center to talk with our mentors, to attend pregnancy and parenting classes, and to receive material assistance.

By March of that same year, Mary found an apartment and obtained a driver's license. Her husband was sending her financial support to pay for the apartment, but she was still jobless. On a sad note, at a doctor's appointment at that time, she learned that there were medical complications with her pregnancy. She was also under tremendous stress because her mother was diagnosed with brain cancer. In addition to emotional support, we provided her with more clothing, wipes, shampoo, and shoes. She told us that the staff at the Gabriel Project Life Center was "understanding" of her situation and hardships.

From May to July, Mary attended a total of 9 parenting and pregnancy classes, including "Stages of Pregnancy", "Age Appropriate Play" and "In the Womb". At the first class she attended, she told us that she really enjoyed the class and that she planned on coming to more classes. Her attendance at the educational classes allowed her to earn two brand new baby furniture items. She chose a swing and a bouncer for her baby.

Mary's last visit to the Life Center occurred on July 31 of the same year when she brought her newborn baby to the Life Center. She said that she loves the baby and that "he is just lovely". We listened as she told us her concerns about her marriage.

In December, she told us that she had stopped coming in because she found a job. She now holds a managerial position at a large department store. She told us that she appreciated all the help that she received from the Life Center, and that we were instrumental in helping her through her pregnancy. She also told us that if she comes across anyone who is in a crisis pregnancy that she will tell them how much we helped her, so that they too may reach out to us for help.




I came in and I was able to cry, let some of these heated and pent up emotions out, and talk about my options. I wanted someone to listen, and not preach to me, and my prayers were answered. The staff members, classes, and material resources available have been such a great relief to me.

Sometimes I still feel stress. But at least I know I have a place where I can go to get the help I need.

I have decided to keep my new unborn child. The staff at The Source has supported me in my decision and has even helped me with my 10 month-old daughter. I have a great sense of reassurance because I feel that every staff member is giving me her best.

I have never been judged by anyone at the Source for Women. They have gone over and beyond my expectations.





The counselor spent time with her addressing her concerns and scheduled a follow-up appointment. The next day Phyllis sent an e-mail thanking the volunteer for her time. Since then, the volunteer and Phyllis have been meeting regularly, and Phyllis has decided not to abort.




It appeared Mandy was pregnant, and began to cry. She explained to us that she already had a baby and one more, she felt, would be too much for her. Mandy said she didn't feel like she could financially support another baby. "My only way out is to terminate this pregnancy," she said.

We shared with her all our services and how we could help her with the new baby as well as the baby she already had. We explained to her that we provide pregnancy/parenting classes and could help her receive baby items. Mandy seemed to listen intently to everything we had to offer her and her family.

About a month later, Mandy came back in to see us. She explained that she thought about abortion more and just couldn't see herself moving forward with that decision. She told us that she had decided to keep this baby and would like to continue receiving services.


Mandy came by at least twice a month, during her pregnancy. Mandy has recently given birth to her new baby and seems to be extremely happy.

Cindy was referred to Marywood through Posada Esperanza, a women's shelter for displaced women and their children. She left the drug-addicted father of her children on Christmas Day at four months of pregnancy with little more than the clothes on her back. She became a client in January in hopes of receiving outside help for herself, her children, and boyfriend. Cindy followed through with appointments each month and embraced learning opportunities presented about the newborn, discipline, and relationships. She gave birth to a beautiful

healthy baby girl in June. She remained in close contact with her boyfriend and offered support and resources acquired through Marywood's Lifeline Program to help with his addiction. He soon began attending Narcotics Anonymous regularly and together they slowly tried to work at repairing their relationship. The man conquered his addiction and the couple got married later in the year. Cindy commented that with Lifeline's support she was able to overcome her desperate situation.




The Director shared the story of one of the Shelter's clients:

When the client came to the Shelter, she was 28 weeks pregnant and had a 4-year old daughter. She relayed to me that coming from the homeless shelter over to OLAMS maternity shelter has made a difference in her life in several ways. Here is the client's perspective of her stay at OLAMS thus far in the client's words: "First of all, I've been feeling a lot better physically, here at OLAMS, a dentist was provided for my molars to be extracted which helped a lot! In turn, I have been able to utilize more of my time towards starting my parenting classes. I also have been able to attend my daughter's school activities at her school. At OLAMS there is flexibility which allows me to get more things done. Here it feels like a home environment. I have access to a computer and Internet and I like that OLAMS has a security alarm. Due to OLAMS' faith-based character I know the staff/volunteer members will always use appropriate language around my daughter. It is quiet, and this helps me and my daughter to sleep and rest better than where I was, and I do not feel pressured. All these differences have

impacted my life in a positive way. I was grateful to have a place to stay at the homeless shelter but now, I feel that at OLAMS, I have been given the opportunity to get my goals accomplished in a better, more nurturing setting. Furthermore, OLAMS obtains extra clothing for me if I need it, or am referred to the partnering resources that serve my needs".

VI. Conclusion

The corrective action for the deficiency noted in section IV of this report is deduction. The corrective action for deficiency noted in section I is the installation of a smoke detector and fire extinguisher at the materials storage building.

Our Lady of the Angels Maternity Shelter is heavily focused on providing pregnancy assistance, shelter, education, counseling and material assistance to pregnant women in need. Their residents benefit from one-on-one counseling regarding their status in their goal process of obtaining housing, food stamps, WIC assistance, life skills, parenting, and relationships. 

I. Facility

General Observations: Counseling areas, office space, equipment, lavatories, safety features (including fire extinguishers and smoke detectors, with the exception below), and pantry/storage areas were inspected.

At the time of the visit, the conference room's fire extinguisher had been last inspected in January 2006. The boutique did not have a fire extinguisher and did not have installed a smoke detector.

II. Program Profile

General Observations: It was determined through interviews that the Center is open Monday through Thursday from 10:00 AM to 6:00 PM, and Friday from 10:00 AM to 4:00 PM. The Center accepts clients with appointments and as walk-ins, and no clients are met outside office hours. The Center has a voicemail system to capture calls received outside working hours.

Hope Women's Resource Clinic provides all its services free of charge. The Center receives referrals from the Medicaid office, Catholic Charities, and other social service agencies. They make referrals to 211, Texas Department of Health, Food Stamps, Texas Housing, Salvation Army and other agencies of assistance.

III. Corporate Administration

General Observations: Program records storage were reviewed and found to be in compliance. Copies of the Confidentiality, Grievance, Client Non-Discrimination and Standard Release of Information policies and forms are readily available at the Center. Material Safety Data Sheets were stored at the Center for ready reference.

IV. Program Highlights

General Observations: Hope Women's Resource Clinic is heavily focused on providing pregnancy assistance, support, education, counseling and material assistance to pregnant women in need. They are well known within the

Beaumont area as a resource for women experiencing challenging pregnancy and parenting situations.

Hope Center has a variety of educational programs that are delivered in-house. Courses include such topics as Parenting Skills and Relationships.

****Note: The following paragraphs describe a typical case successfully managed by the Service Provider evaluated in the report prior to its enrollment in the Texas Alternative to Abortion Services Program. It is shared for the limited purpose of illustrating the quality and scope of the Service Provider's work prior to its participation in the Program. The client has given her consent for her story to be included in this report, and her name has been changed to protect her privacy. The services described in the Success Story were not provided with Program funds.***

Client Story in the Client's Words:

I was 22 years old when I found out I was pregnant. At the time, it was devastating news to me. I was finally back on track with school and trying to get my life together. I could not see myself as capable of raising a child, abortion was my only option (that is what I thought). I told my mother my plans and she suggested I should go to the Hope Center to get some more information. I was scared and nervous to go there. But I went and listened and talked to the counselor (mentor). They made my visit comfortable and easy to talk to them about my fears concerning having a baby. At that time, my mind was made up, I was going to do what I believed I had to do. That night I took a time to think and meditate, I knew then that having this baby was what I had to do. Life is too precious, and I have never regretted it. Grown up actions require grown up decisions and it has been hard, very hard sometimes just down right, difficult. But through each struggle I became stronger and wiser, when things were at their worst, they were never really that bad, and the times are sweeter. I have two beautiful boys now. I am still going to school, and I thank God everyday for gifting me with such a bounty.

- V. **Corrective Actions Taken:** The Service Provider confirmed that as of February 12, 2008, the fire extinguishers at the conference room and boutique had been inspected and made ready to use, a smoke detector was installed in the boutique.






It is shared for the limited purpose of illustrating the quality and scope of the Service Provider's work. The client has given her consent for her story to be included in this report, and the names mentioned have been changed to protect their privacy.***

The Office Manager shared the story of one of the Center's clients:

When "Misty" and her mother "Martha" visited our Center for the first time, they were evidently distraught. The first thing we did was to have Misty take a pregnancy test. We also got to know a little about each other while filling out her confidential client intake form. According to our birth date calculator, Misty was well into her second trimester. We then joined her mother in the sitting room to discuss her options. We also watched the video "Life Begins" explaining the fetal development of her baby. I also explained the different adoption options available to choose from. I gave them information to review at home regarding

some Texas maternity homes, and explained the help that Living Alternatives could offer, should they choose to parent.

Afterwards, Misty and Martha went home to read a copy of the "A Woman's Right to Know" booklet, which explains a woman's options and the related risks.

We spoke several times during the next few days. I went with them to a local maternity home for an interview and tour. After looking over the different scenarios, they decided that she would stay home and parent with her family's help. Our office supplied them with the necessary paper work to file for Medicaid, and provided referrals for local resources such as WIC, the nearest Department of Health and Human Services office, and area doctors that accepted Medicaid.

When Misty needed maternity clothes, she came to us; when they found out that Misty was having a boy, they called us. Martha was so proud that they chose life for Misty's baby; it was to be their first grandson. Misty attended our Texas Safe Riders car seat class and received a new car seat for her baby at no cost. We supplied her with assorted baby items as she drew nearer to her delivery date. When Misty went into labor, her mom called to let us know and I went to visit Misty and her new son at the hospital.

Misty is still attending high school and is determined to graduate. She wants to join the medical field and work part-time to help support her son. They still come in to visit and donate baby items that their baby has outgrown. "Michael" is a beautiful little boy and his mama and grandma's eyes glow when they talk about all the things he has learned to do. Misty admits that it is very hard sometimes keeping up her grades at school, working, and taking care of her son, but she cannot see her life without him now. She and her mother have both told me that if they had not come to Living Alternatives that day, Michael would probably not be here today.

VI. Conclusion







The Director shared the story of one of the Center's clients:

One of A Woman's Haven's phone mentors received a call from "Jennifer." Jennifer stated that she was eight weeks pregnant but that she couldn't have this baby; she was too young and was still in school. She spoke about how her parents would "kill her" if they found out. Utilizing her training skills and professional but caring and gentle voice, the mentor began asking a few questions to better understand her situation. She was able to establish rapport with Jennifer, and the more she listened and responded to her questions and concerns, the more Jennifer opened up and shared her story. It became apparent that Jennifer really did not want an abortion, but desperately needed someone to listen to her

and help her sort out her difficult situation. Jennifer agreed to come to A Woman's Haven to talk some more.

When Jennifer arrived, the same mentor greeted her with the same warmth given to her when she called. Jennifer was made to feel welcome and comfortable, and received non-judgmental guidance and learned about abortion risks, fetal development, and alternatives to abortion. Knowing her options, Jennifer felt more hopeful and positive about her pregnancy. The mentor provided ongoing follow-up and made several community resources and referrals available to her. When Jennifer's parents were told, they were quite upset and disappointed, but after the initial shock, they were very supportive. Jennifer attended parenting classes and was able to remain in school. Soon after graduating, Jennifer gave birth to a beautiful baby girl. She plans to continue her studies and graduate from college.





"Lyn" came to CFI when she was six months pregnant. She was feeling overwhelmed by the pregnancy. She already had one three-year old child and she was not sure if she was capable of taking care of another child. She was 18 years old and dropped out of school in the 10th grade. She lives with her parents who were disappointed in her second pregnancy. She had begun to work and considered going back to school when she got pregnant. She contacted CFI to consider her options.

CFI provided Lyn with counseling to help her understand her options to parent or place her child for adoption. Also, CFI helped her to develop a plan to set goals to get her GED and communicate more effectively with family. Referrals were made for community resources for maternity and baby clothing, education, child care, and food. Lyn had her baby and decided to parent with the assistance of community resources. Lyn stated she could not have gotten through the pregnancy without the comfort of knowing she had choices. She knew if she had the baby she would have the option of placing her child for adoption. Knowing her child had a place to go after he/she was born was a comfort to her.



"David" and "Emily" started with the parenting program in January 2007 when they were expecting their first child at the end of the month. When their educator met them for the first time, David has just dropped out of high school, and Emily was starting the last semester of her senior year, leading Emily to feel very unsure about her situation and incredibly vulnerable.

David was soon working two jobs to provide for his family. They were living with his parents to make ends meet. David and Emily stayed in the program and were getting useful information from the parenting classes. When their son "Jacob", was about four months old, they stopped participating in parenting classes. Their educator had already closed their file when she received a call in January of this year from Emily. Emily wanted to be back in the program, she and David were expecting their second child very soon.

The educator scheduled a visit right away. They were still living with David's parents and were both working any shift they could at a local fast food restaurant to save money up for an apartment on their own. Their oldest son Jacob was doing well developmentally, so they wanted him back in the program, but they also wanted to enroll the child they were expecting.

Soon after having their daughter "Jenna", David and Emily moved into their own apartment. Visits continued with both parents until David was hired to work at a bank. Soon they were able to afford renting a house close to Emily's parent's house, which actually helped them to save money.

During the last visit, the educator found out that Emily had just been hired at a store at one of the malls. Jenna and Jacob are both growing up in a loving household and are meeting their appropriate developmental milestones.

"Lorain" came to live at Guadalupe Home in 2006 when she was waiting for her son's birth. She said she was very surprised when life circumstances caused her to be homeless. Coming from a different country, Lorain had some difficulties at first adjusting to a lifestyle of living with other homeless women and sharing the space. An unplanned pregnancy and a strained relationship with the father of the baby added to the tension.

Because her innate uplifting spirit and love for God, she was determined to make it work. It was not long before she felt comfortable at the Home and when she shared her story with other residents, she became a role model for them, teaching some how to cook and clean and guiding other young mothers how to nurture their child. During the months before her son's birth, Lorain worked on getting her life in order by completing her education and finding employment, and she was determined to find her way to acquire her own apartment. When her son was six months old, she was able to move into her own apartment. The friends that she made along the way helped her get the necessary furniture, linens, and dishes she needed to make her apartment comfortable and homey.

Lorain is quick to tell everyone that it was because of the love, guidance, and support that she received from the staff while she lived at the Guadalupe Home, she was able to gain her independence and stayed motivated. Now, at every Christmas and Mother's Day, Lorain calls to wish me a blessed holiday and says "Thank you, Ms. Suzanne, for all you (and the other staff) did for me and my children. If it was not for Guadalupe Home, I don't know what I would have done during that difficult time in my life." Lorain says she keeps Guadalupe Home in her prayers and hopes that other homeless women and babies who live at the Home will work the program and benefit the way she has.

Client Success Story in the Director's words:

"Janie" experienced many challenges during her formative years, yet, because of all the life experiences she had during her pregnancy, her son, Bobby, was born to a mother who was ready to love and nurture him. Here is Janie's story:

When Janie was a teenager, she had a very destructive lifestyle. Due to this, she did not have a good relationship with her family and had not seen them for several years. She was drinking, taking street drugs, and was involved in a very bad relationship with a man who was emotionally, physically, and sexually abusive to her. Over the years Janie had been lucky to not get pregnant and was beginning to think that she could not conceive. But when she started feeling a little different, she stopped drinking and smoking, and she took a pregnancy test and was very surprised when it showed "positive" – she was pregnant. Immediately she stopped using drugs. She also started to reexamine the relationship with the baby's father and realized that the relationship was not good or healthy and she had to get out and she needed help.

Although Janie had not talked to her mom for years, she called her for help. What she heard was not what she expected. Because of the fact that Janie had done drugs during the early weeks of the pregnancy and the relationship with the boyfriend was so abusive, they thought about terminating the pregnancy because they felt it "was not fair to baby" because the baby may have had a deformity due to the drugs. Janie always considered herself to be against abortion but was so confused and felt that her "mind was twisted" and she was not sure what she thought. She considered placing the baby for adoption but her mother still wanted her to get an abortion. She then decided that because she found out early in the pregnancy and stopped the abusive behavior, the baby would be okay so she decided not to terminate.

She knew she had some outstanding warrants and wanted to get that matter resolved so she turned herself in to the police and spent the next few weeks in jail. When she got out of jail she was about 3 and a half months pregnant. She then connected with San Antonio Birth Doula (SABD). Once she got into a program that had required classes for her to attend to help her get her life back in order, she began to think clearer and started making better choices in her life. She realized that the childbirth education classes that she took with her doula at the SABD office helped her to start bonding with her baby – even before he was born. Janie is grateful to her doula because she helped her to understand and cope with the guilt about her thoughts about terminating her pregnancy. She is very glad that she made the right decision to keep her baby. The childbirth education classes helped her learn more about the pregnancy, her body, and her baby's brain and body, and she started to feel safer and knew she was doing the right thing and was making better life choices.

Janie feels that doulas are a great idea for all women, and especially for young women who are in great need of support, guidance, and mentoring, like her. Janie said that her doula, "helped her to learn how to love her pregnancy." She definitely feels that she bonded with her son before he was born. If she plans to have another baby in the future, she wants to have a doula to help her again. "The nurturing that I got from my doula helped me learn how to nurture," said Janie. "It's like I was surrounded with calmness."

Today Janie is a wonderful mother to a healthy 10 month old son. It is a mutual love affair!

The services described in the Success Story were not provided with Program funds.***

Client Success Story in the Director's words:

"Kristen" had been out of prison only three days when she became pregnant. At first, she was really scared as she was already struggling with the one child she had. She did not know what to do but she was sure that raising another child would be very difficult. Despite her feelings, she thought her child's father would be excited. That idea was shattered when she told him about her pregnancy. His only encouragement was that he would support her if she would get an abortion. Kristen knew that her family would also be upset about the pregnancy and might encourage her to have an abortion. Kristen had already traveled down the abortion road years earlier and soon after realized that it was too difficult to handle. She did not really want to do that again. But, how would she raise a child without the support of her boyfriend and her family. With so much stress and worrying, Kristen soon found herself back in the world of crack cocaine at three months pregnant. She was so lost, confused and caught in a web of poor decisions. She had to talk to someone that would understand what she was going through. She had heard about a parenting program offered at the Pregnancy Help Center of Lufkin from an acquaintance but first wanted to talk to her priest. He offered so many words of encouragement that Kristen walked away feeling strong in her decision not to terminate the pregnancy. But, she knew it would not be easy. She still felt as though she could not trust her family not to pressure on her to abort, so she continued to keep the pregnancy a secret.

Since her relapse at three months pregnant, Kristen found it difficult to lay down the drugs. This clouded her judgment and she never made it to the Pregnancy Help Center for the parenting program. She took her last hit right before walking into the hospital to give birth - just 48 hours before her son would be born.

Kristen says, "Despite what I was doing to myself, God saw to it that this precious gift was protected from my poor choices. I had to get my life right with God and the first matter of business was getting off the drugs". When her son was released, weighing only 4 lbs. and 7 oz., she checked herself into a recovery program that allowed mothers to have their children live with them.

While going through treatment, Kristen was reminded of the Pregnancy Help Center of Lufkin. Kristen made an appointment with Ms. Paula. She recalls that day, "My first visit to the Center was a very positive one. I found Ms. Paula to be very warm, caring and offered me encouragement and hope. I felt as if she really cared and really wanted to help me. She introduced the Learn to Earn Parenting Program and everything seemed so simple. I found it hard to believe there was a

place that would not only help me learn how to be the best mom I could but that would also allow me the opportunity to get the things I need for my baby . . . and it is all free to me. I regretted not contacted them earlier"

When Kristen first came to us in February 2005 she had an obvious low self esteem and continually beat herself up for her poor choices. Because of this she was not very confident in her ability to be a good parent. After several mentoring sessions with Paula, Kristen began releasing a lot of guilt and shame regarding her previous abortion and poor lifestyle choices. We could see not only physical changes but emotional ones as well.

Kristen claims, "The biggest benefit I have received from the Pregnancy Help Center of Lufkin is the promotion of my self-esteem. I continue to go to the center because the entire staff and volunteers make me feel good about myself and what I am able to do for my son. It feels really wonderful to know that I can earn vouchers to take care of my son's needs and improve myself at the same time."

Kristen's son is now three years old and, though she no longer qualifies for the Learn to Earn Parenting Program, we still often hear from her. We celebrated with her when she recently completed certification requirements to be a teacher. Then, we celebrated all the more when she won the hearts of the school board and was awarded a contract for teaching the 2nd grade in 2008-2009.

Kristen is a wonderful example of how a little investment of time, talents and encouragement in the life of another can make all the difference in their world and the world around them.






Her biggest concern was providing for a child and giving a child a positive future. Fetal development education and relationship counseling was provided in the initial intake counseling session. At a later date, she called and seemed distressed about her pregnancy. Her counselor encouraged her not to give up and reminded her of the parenting classes and other resources available through the center. She was also encouraged to continue working and make an appointment with her doctor and WIC. The counselor made routine follow up calls and Julie seemed to be handling the pregnancy better and with more enthusiasm. She began attending the parenting classes. She stated that she eagerly awaited classes and the opportunity to visit the Baby Boutique. She attended all the prenatal classes and is looking forward to having the father of the baby come to the fatherhood classes. She and the father of the baby are looking forward to the baby's arrival and plan to get married.

They say every day you learn something new and this program has proven that to me.






The client has given her consent for her story to be included in this report, and her name has been changed to protect her privacy.

The Executive Director shared the story of one of the Center's clients in her words:

I have been married for four years. My relationship with my husband started getting rough last year and we separated. I thought my whole life was over. But later we reunited. My husband wanted to try and have another child right away. I felt skeptical at first, but later decided that I needed to trust him.

At the end of December, my husband told me that he was going to San Antonio to "get away and relax" for a few days. My gut feeling told me something different, but once again, I decided to trust him. During the weekend that he was gone I missed my cycle and took a pregnancy test. I was excited to learn that I was pregnant, and to know that my husband would be extremely happy was well.

I called him all day on Saturday and Sunday, but he never picked up the phone. I became really worried about him, and even called hospitals in San Antonio. Finally, on Monday morning, he called and told me that he was very sick and needed more rest. After we hung up, I emailed my husband, writing that I had a "surprise" for him when he returned home, and that I missed and loved him very much.

Then, to my surprise I received a response, saying that the trip made him realize he no longer wanted to be in a relationship with me. Once again, my world fell apart. My immediate impulse was to have an abortion, reasoning "I can't bring a baby into this world without a father". I was so afraid of disappointing my parents, with whom we were living. I felt as though I had already disappointed them the first time that my husband and I separated. Now it was happening again and I was pregnant. I felt so scared and alone.

I knew having an abortion was wrong, but my circumstances seemed so terrible. I went to the Fifth Ward Pregnancy Help Center (FWPHC) for a pregnancy test, hoping for a negative result. While there, I met two staff members. They were like two guardian angels offering me caring help during my time of crisis. I cried in front of complete strangers, and they comforted me like best friends.

The following Monday morning I woke up with pain in my stomach. I called FWPHC and they sent me to the emergency room, where various tests were run. Afterwards, the doctor said, "The babies are perfectly fine". I just stood there for a moment before stammering, "I'm sorry... you must have made a mistake... you said 'babies'". He responded with, "Congratulations, you are having twins!" I was in complete shock. I mean, it was bad enough thinking about aborting one baby... but two? I thought about that all night. In the end, I decided to have faith in God and have my babies.

With time, my heart began to heal and my tears slowly stopped. Nevertheless, I still worry about work sometimes, knowing my temporary assignment would end in March, and I couldn't afford to become unemployed. Whenever I started feeling anxious, I simply prayed, believing that God would help me. I worked as

hard as I could, even at minimum wage, because I wanted to do my best "as unto the Lord".

Meanwhile, I started attending the pregnancy classes offered at FWPHC. I felt encouraged by the group support, the helpful information and the beautiful baby items. It was during this time that I received the answer to my prayer. I was hired permanently by the company I was working for, and given a very generous raise! As I sit back and remember where I was three months ago, compared to where I am today, my heart is full of gratitude-to God, my family and friends at FWPHC. The pregnancy center made a huge impact in my life. I can't thank the people there enough for showing me genuine love and helping me to accept the miracle of my babies. They are due in September, and I can't wait to meet them!





Sara's counselor explained how the adoption process could work and encouraged her to research it more on her own. Since Sara was not very far along in her pregnancy she explained to her how much time she still had to make a decision. Her counselor encouraged her to do more research on abortion and really think about which choice was best for her.

Sara wanted to come back in a week to visit with us more. The morning of her appointment Sara walked in with a distinctively different look in her eyes. As she sat down with her counselor she said these words with a smile on her face, "The abortion appointment is scheduled for tomorrow and there is no need for it because I have decided to keep the baby." Her counselor asked her what changed her mind. She responded with "I appreciate all you have done and all you have told me." That was her only explanation.

Sara called the last week in June of 2008 and informed us that her baby was born, a beautiful baby girl. She came in to pick up her baby basket full of baby items for her and her baby. She was very excited and she may continue to remain with us in Parenting Classes.

Abby initially came to us for baby items and maternity clothes and quickly realized the counselors/mentors at the Good Samaritan Life Center were also here to provide her with emotional support as well.

As the counselor/mentor met with Abby for the first time, we learned that Abby was very worried being pregnant for several reasons. First, she was concerned she would not be able to work since wouldn't be able to afford child care. Second, and of greater trouble to Abby was her relationship with the father of the baby. She had been dating him for over a year, and he did not want a baby. Upon hearing of the pregnancy, the father of the baby left her which left her feeling very sad and alone. After her first visit, Abby said that she liked Good Samaritan because the counselors/mentors are friendly; they listen and are not judgmental. They help everyone who asks for help."

During her pregnancy, Abby came to Good Samaritan about once a month to talk to her counselor/mentor about her situation and her feelings. After the birth of the baby in December Abby continued to visit us. Shortly after the birth she was able to return to work. Again she was without the help of the father or family members and needed emotional and material support. During her visits, Good Samaritan provided her with diapers and baby cloths for her newborn. She frequently shared with the staff of Good Samaritan that she felt overwhelmed with being a single working mom in an environment without family support. During her visits, the counselor/mentor spent time listening to her concerns and offering her encouragement.

In March, Abby started attending parenting classes and earned enough credits to pick out a diaper bag stocked with baby items and a pack-n-play for her baby. In addition to receiving baby items, Abby met other women in difficult situations and has since formed several close friendships with other clients. She also found someone to baby-sit for her while she goes to work. We still see her every few weeks when she needs someone to talk to or additional baby items. During the time that Abby has been receiving assistance, she has referred at least five new clients to Good Samaritan.




The Executive Director shared the story of one of the Center's clients in her words:

"Lori" contacted Annunciation Maternity Home (AMH) in October, 2007, seeking help. An abusive relationship and other difficulties led her to ask for assistance in stabilizing her life so she could be reunited with her two older children. Shortly thereafter she was hired for a weekday job that offered her excellent benefits, a great improvement over the sporadic schedule of her previous job at a call center. Her hope of creating a financially secure future for herself and her three children was finally becoming a reality. Lori persevered through the repeated car repair bills and frustrations of paying off previous debts, keeping her eyes focused on her goals and the hope of a better future.

Four months later, Lori gave birth to her newest child. In addition, she had saved enough money to purchase a minivan which will accommodate her three children and their accompanying car seats. Lori has completed the paperwork to apply for housing and plans to move in March. Now she is progressing through the steps to bring her older two children back into her care very soon so she and her children will be a family. Her successes at AMH have helped her to build a foundation upon which she can continue to move toward making her hopes for the future become realities.

Annunciation Maternity Home in Georgetown is a maternity home that provides comprehensive services to its residents. 



The Director shared the story of one of Marywood's clients:

There is a warmth and enthusiasm when "Rosie" speaks. She is excited about her future and that of her children. Rosie did not always feel this way. A few years ago, Rosie had a toddler and a newborn to care for but with little support and resources available to her.

She was in the WIC office when the case worker there suggested she check out Marywood's web site and Rosie discovered the program services of Lifeline. Rosie did not know that this would change her life and the lives of her children. Hope has replaced despair.

Rosie and her Marywood's caseworker formed a strong bond since they first met. Rosie thinks of her caseworker as a friend, one who has listened, guided, and supported her through some major life transitions. Through networking, Rosie has found a home, stabilized her relationship with the father of her children, has found quality childcare, a job, and she is being trained for a successful career in the medical field.

When Rosie began this path, she was frightened, felt alone, and felt her problems were overwhelming. She was frustrated and angry, often taking this out on her toddler. Through discussion, videos and demonstrations, she learned to refocus her frustration, to share her time with both of her daughters, and to enjoy her role as a mother. She was able to receive needed supplies for her young family, from diapers to formula, baby blankets, and clothes.

Rosie has three wishes beyond her dreams for her family: "I wish there were more programs like Marywood; I hope my friend, who has a four month old will come to Marywood; and I hope Marywood can start support groups for moms who have older children."

We will do our best for Rosie and her friends.

Marywood Children and Family Service's Lifeline Program is focused on providing pregnancy assistance, education, counseling and material assistance to pregnant women in need. Marywood has been operating for over 85 years.





The Director shared the story of one of the Shelter's clients:

Our story begins with our former resident having spent the night at the bus station thirty minutes away from here since she had no place to go and was four months pregnant and with a six-month old son. Her living arrangements with her

baby's biological father did not work out since they both lost their jobs and could not afford to pay their rent. Then, she went to stay at the nearby shelter and stayed there for a short time. Later, she came to OLAMS. She experienced a difficult pregnancy and was practically bed ridden. She could not pick up her other child and shortly after, she left with her stepmother to her home about forty-five minutes from here. Her stay there shortened when her stepmother informed her to vacate the premises by the time she came back from work.

She was admitted back to OLAMS after having been gone for four months and when her baby was due in a couple of weeks. The reason she gave for her return was that she already knew the house parents (sisters) and her son related to them. He would not have to get readjusted. The frequent counseling sessions helped her to get over her relationship crisis.

She then had hopes of re-establishing a place for her and her baby's father in Temple, once she delivered her baby and recuperated. But later, her boyfriend changed his mind, and after her baby was born, she was left here to fend for herself. She delivered a precious baby girl.

She had mixed feelings since her situation had changed. The daily counseling helped her sort out her emotions and directed her to resources to help her get into an educational program. Through counseling, she became empowered to believe in herself and regain control of her situation and move forward with her life.

Arrangements were made for her to transition to the Waco transitional housing program where she and her two children could live in a furnished apartment and they would provide some childcare and transportation to assist her in finding a job. There she could stay for a while and pay a percentage of her paycheck to stay there while she gets on her feet.


The birth mother began receiving services approximately four months ago. She was referred to CFI by her case manager at another community organization. She is a very motivated young lady who currently attends college and her goal is to receive a Bachelors degree in International Business. The birth mother faithfully attended the classes necessary to become more educated on pregnancy and being a parent. She planned on attending the scheduled childbirth classes in order to be more prepared for labor and delivery, but two days before the classes were to begin she went into premature labor. She contacted CFI to see if a counselor could meet her at the hospital so that she could at least have an idea of what to expect. The counselor shared the information about childbirth, breastfeeding, and basic parenting techniques. The birth mother did not have any family support present in the delivery room with her and asked her counselor to stay with her until she delivered. The counselor used this time to support the birth mother and answer any general questions that she may have had. The birth mother delivered her baby with minimal stress and could not thank her counselor enough for being there for her during this exciting but scary time. Because of the Texas Alternative to Abortion Services Program funding, this birth mother had an opportunity to enjoy the birth of her baby by being able to access a resource that otherwise may have been unavailable to her.




The Director shared the story of one of the Center's clients:

"Heather" came to A Woman's Haven about a year ago and was abortion-minded. She explained that the previous week she had taken two pregnancy tests and that both were positive. She made an appointment for an abortion but was unable to go through with it because she had always been against abortion. However, she was still undecided. She requested another pregnancy test hoping that the result would be different. It was positive. Heather shared that she already had three children, ages three, two and one and that she wouldn't be able to handle a fourth. She was tired of caring for three babies and not being able to go anywhere because the children were too little. She always felt tired and stressed, and could not see an end to her daily challenges. Her mother helped as best she could and the father of the baby helped financially when he had a job. She couldn't count on her siblings either. She lived with her mother and several other siblings who had their own problems. Heather was concerned that her mother would be very upset at the knowledge of her fourth pregnancy. Her own mother had had eleven children.

Heather seemed to feel very comfortable at A Woman's Haven. She was open and willing to share her story. She cried, she laughed, and was comforted. She

remained for about 90 minutes talking about her life, her plans for the future, her family, her children and her boyfriend, "Shaun."

It became clear that a support group could be especially beneficial to Heather. She could talk with other moms facing similar challenges and find resources and emotional support. When asked what she currently needed to relieve some of the tension and concerns she was currently facing, her immediate response was, "a twin stroller!" This small item would give her some of the freedom and mobility she so desperately wanted and needed. She said with a big smile, "I could even ride the bus!" The twin stroller was the first of many areas of help that A Woman's Haven was able to provide. She was also referred to Habitat for Humanity for her housing needs, to pre-natal care, and to child care information.

When I followed up with her a few days later, she told me that she had decided to keep the baby and that when she told her mother about it, that her mother said, "I knew it all along." They then began making plans for the "new arrival".

After some time, Heather experienced some complications, and was hospitalized. The doctors in the hospital told her that they were attempting to keep her pregnant until at least twenty-eight weeks. They also were afraid that the baby might have brain damage. As Heather cried on my shoulder, she told me how sorry she was that she had thought about aborting her baby whom she now loved so much and how she wanted him to be okay and not hurt in any way.

Her baby was eventually born after thirty-four weeks, with some physical complications. He has daily therapy at home. He has a pulmonary problem and has to be fed with a feeding tube. The baby weighs thirteen pounds and, according to Heather, "he is a good baby." "I love him...he's wonderful. Now that I have him, I ask myself, 'how could I ever have thought about aborting him?' I'm so glad you were there to help me."

I spoke with Heather recently, and, before hanging up the phone, we talked a little about her plans. "Well, she said, I now have my own apartment and a car. I don't have much furniture, but who cares. We're together, my babies and I, and we're happy. Sometimes it gets a little tiring especially because I have to take the baby to the doctor several times a week, but I manage. Now I want to concentrate on getting my GED and going to school. I would like to be a nurse or a teacher. But my first choice would be to design women's shoes!"

At A Woman's Haven, we have no doubt that, with everything Heather has gone through and how strong she has become, she will be able to accomplish all her goals.





General Observations: Counseling areas, office space, equipment, lavatories, safety features (including fire extinguishers and smoke detectors), and storage areas were inspected and found to be in compliance

II. Program Profile

General Observations: It was determined through interviews that Gladney Center for Adoption is open Monday through Friday from 8:30am – 5:00pm. The Center accepts clients with appointments and as walk-ins. Clients are frequently met outside office hours and are routinely met off-site. The organization has a hotline which is manned by a live person and is available from 5:00pm – 10:00pm daily. Voicemail is available for the remaining hours in the day.

Gladney provides all its services free of charge. Gladney receives referrals from multiple social service agencies, medical professionals, and non-profit organizations. Gladney makes referrals to the Housing Authority, Westside Workforce, and other social service agencies, doctors, hospitals, and churches.

III. Corporate Administration

General Observations: Program records storage and educational materials were reviewed and found to be in compliance. Copies of the Confidentiality, Grievance, Client Non-Discrimination and policies and forms are readily available at the Center. Material Safety Data Sheets were not readily available for reference.

IV. Program Highlights

General Observations: Gladney is heavily focused on providing adoption support, education and counseling to pregnant women in need. This location has on site a 25 person residence which provides assistance with pregnancy related needs such as housing, medical needs and emotional support. Services are available to the residents 24 hours a day.

"Melissa" is a young woman who has had an extremely difficult life. She has experienced loss after loss after loss. Melissa hasn't had anyone who has really been there for her in her life until coming to Gladney. While living in the dorm she made life long friends with other young women planning adoption and has felt true unconditional love from the dorm staff.

With all her struggles, and with a very broken heart, this woman who has experienced so much loss in her life voluntarily chose adoption. Knowing she couldn't provide what her twin girls would need, she made the choice to plan a better life for them.

The adoptive parents were incredible to Melissa. There were some difficult moments during this match but they handled them all with compassion and understanding. Their sensitivity and respect for her reinforced that her decision to plan adoption is what's best for her babies.

General Observations: Counseling areas, office space, equipment, lavatories, and safety features (including fire extinguishers and smoke detectors, with the exception below) were inspected and found to be in compliance. This facility will not provide materials assistance services due to its close proximity to the South Hampton Road location. At the time of the visit, more than one year had passed since the conference room's fire extinguisher had last been inspected.

II. Program Profile

General Observations: It was determined through interviews that Children and Family Institute – North Hampton is open for client services on Thursdays from 8:30pm – 5:00pm and Monday, Wednesday, Thursday and Friday by appointment only. Clients are occasionally met outside office hours. The phone is answered at the South location Monday through Friday from 8:30am to 5:30pm.

Children and Family Institute – North Hampton provides all its services free of charge. They receive referrals from WIC, Housing Authority, Dallas County Health Department, Head Start and other social service agencies, doctors, and churches.

III. Corporate Administration

General Observations: Program records storage and educational materials were reviewed and found to be in compliance with the exception below. Spiritual materials are adequately identified and separated from the non-spiritual materials.

At the time of the visit, copies of the Confidentiality, Grievance, Client Non-Discrimination and Standard Release of Information policies and forms were not yet readily available at this location. Material Safety Data Sheets were not stored for ready reference with the cleaning supplies used in the facility.

IV. Program Highlights

General Observations: Children and Family Institute – North is heavily focused on providing pregnancy assistance, support, education and counseling to pregnant women in need. They are well known in South Dallas as a resource for women experiencing challenging pregnancy and parenting situations. They are very dedicated and innovative in securing support and assistance as they grow and expand their programs.

Children and Family Institute – North Hampton has a variety of educational programs that are delivered in-house. Courses include such topics as Parenting Skills and Childbirth.

Client Story in the Executive Director's Words:

Tom and Belinda only speak Swahili and French, and language barriers have been quite a problem for them. Belinda had been receiving prenatal care from a local hospital. They voiced concern about the problem and were getting frustrated to the point of reconsidering trying to get prenatal care. The couple was referred to Children and Family Institute. A Social Worker who speaks Swahili was assigned to the couple. The Social Worker knew an OBGYN doctor who speaks Swahili. The Social Worker contacted the doctor. The doctor said he was not accepting new patients but decided to take them. The clients were so grateful. The couple continues to need help with other ESL issues and resources and Children and Family Institute's Social Worker is working with the couple to meet their needs despite limited community assistance for refugees. It is a challenge for Social Worker as there are limited resources and policy restriction for assistance to refugees.

The organization makes referrals to Center for Families and Children, Samaritan Counseling Center of West Texas and other social service agencies, doctors, and hospitals.

III. Corporate Administration

General Observations: Program records storage and educational materials were reviewed and found to be in compliance. Copies of the Confidentiality, Grievance, Non-Discrimination in Client Services and Standard Release of Information policies and forms were readily available at the organization. A few months after "Leann" and "Jeffrey" placed a son for adoption, they found themselves without jobs and pregnant again. They were shocked, still grieving and in an even worse position to parent this baby. They were upset with themselves and each other. They made the difficult decision to place for adoption again.

Jeffrey encouraged Leann to live at Gladney's maternity residence in order to receive the counseling and support she didn't receive during her first adoption through another agency. He worked three jobs during Leann's pregnancy in order to pay their bills. He also made time to visit the dorm and attend the face to face meetings with the adoptive parents, nursery visits and of course, placement. Gladney provided Leann with counseling in hopes of alleviating her anxiety so that she could hold and enjoy her time with her baby before the placement. Leann and Jeffrey were so strong for placement. When they did cry, it was in response to seeing the adoptive parents' genuine tears of joy in finally holding their baby.

They both agreed that Leann should remain in the dorm for the six weeks post placement in order for her to be "whole" again. Leann felt it was important to receive all the counseling and support she could from the houseparents and residents.

FCC provides all its services free of charge. The organization receives referrals from the Dallas Independent School District, Child Protective Services, multiple social service agencies, medical professionals, and non-profit organizations. The organization makes referrals to the Housing Authority, Texas Workforce Commission, and other social service agencies, doctors, and hospitals.

III. Corporate Administration

General Observations: Program records storage and educational materials were reviewed and found to be in compliance. Copies of the Confidentiality, Grievance, and Standard Release of Information policies and forms were readily available at the organization. The Non-Discrimination in Client Services and Material Safety Data Sheets were not readily available for reference.

IV. Program Highlights

General Observations: FCC is heavily focused on providing in-home crisis counseling, parent education, and counseling to pregnant and parenting women in need. Support is offered through case management, referrals and educational programs.

Client Success Story in the Case Manager's Words:

I worked with a 17 year old young lady that was pregnant during her senior year in High School. The father of the child was incarcerated and the young lady did not have very much family support. She lived in several foster homes, before moving in with her step-father. Her step-father was only providing shelter, but refused to provide food and clothing. The young lady managed to locate part-time employment with a local department store.

When I was assigned this case, the young lady was confused and did not have plans for the baby. I spoke with her about her feelings for the baby and the medical treatment received. She had taken an over the counter test, but never visited with a physician to confirm the pregnancy. I escorted the young lady to the Physician's office and it was confirmed that she was a little less than 3 months pregnant and was considering abortion. I discussed some choices of adoption with her and she decided to keep her child. Following her decision, I began to cover pre-natal parenting and assisted with her goal setting. She had plans of going to college and becoming a teacher. I provided her information for a college campus that provided single-parent programs. I assisted her with completing her FAFSA application. She decided to attend a women's university in North Texas. I escorted her to the college for a tour and to meet with a counselor. She is now in her second year and her baby girl attends the childcare on campus.

- V. Corrective Actions Taken:** The client Non-Discrimination in Client Services and Material Safety Data Sheets were located and are now readily available for reference. The Fire Extinguisher has been inspected and approved for use. The organization confirmed that the Smoke Detector is now functioning.


