Additional Backup Information				

In September 2011, the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development awarded the City of Austin a three-year Lead Hazard Reduction Demonstration grant in the amount of \$2.5 million. The grant is intended to protect children from potentially dangerous lead-based paint in their homes. With this grant the Neighborhood Housing and Community Development Office will evaluate and remediate lead-based paint hazards in approximately 180 homes and conduct outreach and education. To receive assistance, the following criteria must be met:

- homes must have been built before 1978;
- household income must be at or below 80 percent of median family income, currently \$60,700 for a family of four; and
- a child age six or younger must live in the home or visit at least six hours per week.

After a family qualifies for the assistance, the home is tested for lead hazards. Depending on the lead hazards found, a family may need to be relocated into temporary lodging.

Two extended stay hotels responded to the solicitation. If approved, these hotels will provide lodging for families being temporarily relocated while lead hazards are being addressed.
