The Homeless Emergency Assistance and Rapid Transition to Housing Act of 2009 (HEARTH Act) became law on May 20, 2009 and consolidated several homeless assistance programs administered by the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) and revised and renamed the former Emergency Shelter Grants program to the Emergency Solutions Grants (ESG) program. The ESG program is designed to be the first step in a continuum of assistance to help clients quickly regain stability in permanent housing after experiencing a housing crisis and/or homelessness.

On December 1, 2011, the City of Austin received notification from HUD about the availability of a second allocation for Fiscal Year 2011-2012 ESG funds in the amount of \$185,896. In order to receive the funds, a Substantial Amendment to the City's 2011-2012 Action Plan and Community Development 2011-2012 Program must be submitted to and approved by HUD. If approved, the Substantial Amendment allows the City of Austin to apply, receive, and administer additional ESG grant funds.

In the Substantial Amendment, the City proposes to utilize ESG funds to provide Rapid Re-Housing services to assist homeless persons in obtaining and maintaining permanent housing. The City of Austin's Neighborhood Housing and Community Development Office, in coordination with the City's Health and Human Services Department, seeks public comment on the proposed activities outlined in the Substantial Amendment, which is due to HUD on or prior to May 14, 2012.
