PROPOSAL

Demolish a ca. 1946 house.

ARCHITECTURE

One-story rectangular-plan side-gabled stuccoed frame house with a central, partial-width front-gabled overdoor hood; single and paired 1:1 windows.

RESEARCH

The house was built in 1946 by Wesley H. Wunneburger, a local building contractor; he is listed as the owner of the property on the 1946 building permit. Wunneburger is listed as a resident of the house in the 1947 city directory; he listed his occupation as a carpenter. Along with Wunneburger lived Walter and Ruth Wilde, also listed as renters. Walter Wilde was a draftsman for local architectural firm Page, Southerland, and Page, and was the son of piano tuner Ernest Wilde and his wife, Irma; he grew up in Austin. Wunneburger and the Wildes lived in the house for only a short period of time – by 1949, Gerald and Hermine Van Eck were listed as the owners and occupants of the house. Hermine Van Eck was the daughter of Paul and Hermine Wilde; he was the manager of Becker Lumber Company, and the cousin of Walter Wilde, who was the first occupant of the house, and possibly its designer. Gerald Van Eck was a linotype operator; they lived here from around 1948 to 1953; the house then became a rental unit and has remained so to this day.


STAFF COMMENTS

The house does not appear in any city survey.

STAFF RECOMMENDATION

Staff must recommend the release of the demolition permit; the house does not appear to have the requisite architectural or historical significance to warrant individual designation as a historic landmark, but staff strongly urges the applicant to either incorporate the house into development plans for the site, or to relocate the house rather than demolish it. The house was completely rehabilitated several years ago and appears to be structurally sound.



BIOGRAPHICAL NOTES:

According to the 1930 U.S. Census report, Walter Wilde was the 10-year old son of piano tuner Ernest Wilde and his wife Irma. They lived at 1412 W. 9th Street, a designated city historic landmark. Hermine Wilde Van Eck was the daughter of Paul Wilde, the manager of Becker Lumber Company, and the cousin of Walter Wilde, who is listed as the first resident of the house. Hermine Wilde Van Eck was born in 1924, and married Gerald Van Eck; they lived in the house from around 1948 to around 1953. The Wilde and Becker families were very closely intertwined – the Ernest and Irma Wilde lived next door to Francis Becker, the book-keeper for Becker Lumber Company, on W. 9th Street. The homes of both Ernest Wilde and Paul Wilde are city historic landmarks.
