PROPOSAL

Demolish a ca. 1936 house.

ARCHITECTURE

One-and-a-half story rectangular-plan cross-gabled frame Tudor Revival-styled cottage with a "catslide" roof over the partial-width inset porch; single and paired 1:1 fenestration; small front-gabled dormer containing an attic vent in the main part of the side-gabled section of the front roof.

RESEARCH

City utility permits indicate that the house was built in 1936 for R. James Fields, who is listed as the owner and the occupant of the house until his death in November, 1959. Fields was born in Texas, and the 1920 U.S. Census report shows him as the son of R.W. Fields, who was a general laborer. R. James Fields was also a general laborer in the 1920 census report, but by 1930, he was married and worked as a chauffeur for a private family. His wife, Metra, worked as a laundress for a private family. Until building this house, R. James and Metra Fields lived in the 1900 block of E. 17th Street, just around the corner from this house. Metra Fields died in 1945; James remarried around 1950. His second wife was named Dura, and they lived here until James' death in 1959. James had several jobs after his stint as a chauffeur as reflected in the 1930 U.S. Census. He listed his occupation as chef in the 1939 city directory and as a cook in the 1944-45 city directory, with intervening and later work as a porter and warehouseman at Davidson Sash and Door Company, which was located at E. 5th and San Marcos Streets. After James' death in 1959, the house was vacant for a time, then became a rental property owned by Dr. Sidney White.


STAFF COMMENTS

The house is not listed in any City survey.

STAFF RECOMMENDATION

Release the demolition permit. The house appears to be in very poor condition, and lacks the requisite architectural and historical significance to warrant individual designation as a historic landmark.

BIOGRAPHICAL NOTES

R. James and Metra Fields (ca. 1936 - ca. 1945)

R. James and Dura Fields (ca. 1950 - ca. 1959)

James and Metra Fields appear in the 1930 U.S. Census living in a rented house at 1906 E. 17th Street. James Fields was then 23 years old, had been born in Texas, and worked as a chauffeur for a private family. Metra Fields was then 22 years old, had been born in Texas, and worked as a laundress for a private family. The couple had two daughters and a son, all under the age of 8. The 1920 U.S. Census shows James Fields as the son of R.W. Fields, a laborer who lived at 1900 E. 8th Street. R.W. Fields had no wife listed in the census; James was 13 and not married, but worked as a laborer as well.

Metra Fields died in November, 1945; James Fields died in November, 1959. Neither had an obituary in the Austin newspapers. There is no record of death for Dura Fields in Texas, nor any record of her marriage to James Fields after Metra passed away.
