Additional Backup Information	

The applicant is requesting approval under section 25-8-651 (Relocation of the Shoreline between Tom Miller Dam and Longhorn Dam) of the Land Development Code, in order to complete nine abutments and level trails in eight areas for the Boardwalk Trail at Lady Bird Lake project. City Council approval is required to modify the shoreline and relocate existing earth material in the Lady Bird Lake floodplain. The proposed relocations will all be within City property or easements.

This proposal will not endanger a public water supply, water supply system, storm or sanitary sewer system or any other public utility facility; it will not create a hazard to swimming or navigation; it will not cause any hazard to the operation or maintenance of a dam, bridge or other structure; it will not materially and adversely affect the enjoyment of Lady Bird Lake.

If similar applications were granted for similarly situated properties, the water storage and flood capacity of the Colorado River basin would not be materially reduced.

Staff recommends approval of the request. The site plan will meet all other conditions of the Land Development Code.
