For over 100 years, CIE has worked to fulfill its mission of making The University of Texas at Austin a resource for all people—in Texas and beyond. We do this to both transform individual lives and to promote economic development in Austin and across the state.

Economic Development

One of the few bright spots in the nation's sluggish economy is the continued resilience and power of Austin, Texas. Businesses continue to grow and workers are moving here from around the country dreaming of a better life. In 2010, Kiplinger's Personal Finance named Austin the number one city for business growth and a "hotbed of new business creation."

One of the main ways CIE supports this booming economic development is by working with state and local business leaders to develop non-traditional learning opportunities in response to growing workforce needs. CIE produces high-quality, affordable and accessible learning opportunities for Austin's growing population.

Helping Texas Workers Succeed

- To ensure that Texas' oil and gas industry has the workers it needs to survive an impending wave of industry-wide retirements, CIE's Petroleum Extension Service (PETEX™) has introduced innovative e-learning tools to better serve global workers.
- To meet the rising need for middle and high school teachers certified to teach advanced courses, CIE's Advanced Placement Summer Institutes (APSI) program trained 671 teachers in 2011.
- To address the need for more skilled healthcare workers in the Austin area, CIE has launched Pharmacy Technician and Medical Interpreter training programs. Additional Professional Development Center (PDC) programs are in the works.







Beating the Odds

CIE is committed to diversity and helping students from all economic and ethnic backgrounds overcome the odds and achieve their dreams. Two key CIE programs serve Texas' growing Hispanic population: LUCHA™ and the Migrant Student Graduation Enhancement Program.

Valedictorian Thanks LUCHA™ for Guidance and Support

At the age of 13, Eduardo Gonzalez moved with his family from Mexico to Texas. Who would have guessed that five years later he would be the valedictorian of his high school class and on his way to study international law on a full scholarship?

None of this would have been possible without LUCHA™. When Eduardo arrived at Donna High School, he spoke limited English and didn't have any friends. LUCHA staff members worked with Eduardo to ease his transition into American public schools. One way they helped was by making sure he was placed in the right level classes and got credit for classes he had already completed.

"LUCHA was a great resource for me. I needed guidance, and LUCHA and my teachers really helped. I also got to know the other LUCHA students. We became very close, almost like a family," Eduardo said.

Migrant Students of the Year Chase Their Dreams

High school students Eric Guajardo and Jessica Reyna were recently named "Students of the Year" at CIE's annual Migrant Student Recognition Ceremony. Both students received \$2,000 college scholarships funded by a gift from ExxonMobil.

For many years, Eric and Jessica worked in the fields with their families. Eric, who graduated first in his class, is now heading to Harvard University to pursue his dream of becoming a physician. Jessica, who graduated with a 3.7 GPA, plans to study pre-med at Baylor University.

Embracing the World

Although CIE calls Austin home, its programs and services have a global reach. And CIE continues to expand its global footprint by collaborating with faculty at The University of Texas at Austin to develop new programs in exciting destinations around the world.

New University Collaboration Offers Trip of a Lifetime

CIE has recently embarked on a new collaboration with the university's College of Fine Arts. At the center of this partnership is Casa Herrera, a university-owned teaching and research center located in the heart of Antigua, Guatemala and managed by Fine Arts.

Plans are in motion for several ongoing educational and cultural exchange events at the Casa through CIE's Professional Development Center (PDC). Recently, a group of travelers, led by CIE's Dr. Linda Glessner, traveled from Austin to Antigua to explore local points of interest such as gleaming cathedrals, sprawling coffee plantations and colorful artisan markets. University scholars were also on hand to lead historical walking tours and interactive discussions. PDC also recently piloted a professional development course at the Casa designed especially for professionals in Guatemala.

Students Earn U.S. Diplomas Halfway Around The World

The Nam My Private School in Vietnam has partnered with the University of Texas Online High School (UTHS) to help its students realize their dreams of earning U.S. diplomas and attending college in the United States.

"An international education helps me learn more about other countries and different cultures," said Tran My Liem, a Nam My student and UTHS graduate. "I hope to come to the United States to enter college. I want to study architecture, design or business."

The entire UTHS curriculum, wholly presented in English, is the first offering of its kind for Vietnamese students. The first cohort of Nam My/UTHS students recently graduated in a ceremony on the Nam My campus.

CIE is also "embracing the world" by offering training to overseas professionals. For example, in 2011 PetroChina, the largest oil company in China, sent a team of workers to PETEX's Learning and Assessment Center to learn about the U.S. oil and gas industry, PETEX developed customized classes that introduced PetroChina to Western-style management practices, structure and terminology, PETEX's expert instructors also shared case studies and engaged the team in discussions about different business models.

Innovating Solutions

Whether it's offering online Credit by Exams for high school students or training the next generation of oil and gas workers, CIE is all about fulfilling educational needs with timely, affordable and accessible solutions that transform lives.

PETEX: Changing the Face of Workforce Training

The Petroleum Extension Service (PETEX) is a shining example of what CIE does best—developing real solutions to real problems. One important challenge that PETEX is tackling head on is the oil and gas industry's desperate need for trained workers to take over operations from retiring workers.

No stranger to innovation, PETEX has developed several strategies to train the next generation of workers. One of these tools is the PETEX Learning Stick™, a portable USB device that contains customized e-learning modules, e-books, assessments and skills analysis that can be accessed with or without an Internet connection. This device is not only practical for use on oil rigs, where Internet connectivity is limited, but for anyone who needs or wants to access training materials anywhere, on any computer.

Online High School Offers Athletes Shot at the Top

The AESA Prep Academy, a small, private school located in Austin, was established to address the unique needs of elite student tennis athletes, many of whom require three or more hours a day of training to stay competitive. The school provides students with a more flexible learning environment to help them achieve their dreams—whether it's winning a scholarship, playing college tennis or playing professionally.

To provide her students with strong academics and ensure their success in college, AESA Prep Academy's Head of School Barbara Garza turned to the University of Texas Online High School. "Having the UT high school curriculum makes all of this possible. The curriculum is really rigorous. If you can make it through these courses and do well in these courses, you are totally ready for college," said Barbara.

PETROLEUM EXTENSION SERVICE (PETEX)

Since 1944, PETEX has been a leading educator and a trainer of choice for the oil and gas industry.

In addition to offering online learning, webinars and instructor-led training courses in Houston and around the world PETEX is a prolific publisher. Over the years, PETEX has published hundreds of textbooks, videos, presentations and educational materials, many of which have become industry classics.

UNIVERSITY OF TEXAS ONLINE HIGH SCHOOL (UTHS)

Fully accredited by the Texas Education Agency, UTHS was authorized by the Texas State Board of Education in 1998 to provide a complete online high school curriculum and to award diplomas. UTHS serves a diverse student population, including students with professional careers, athletes, home-schoolers, students living in remote or foreign locations, older students and students who want to accelerate their education.

Graduates of UTHS have been accepted by such prestigious universities as The University of Texas at Austin, the University of California at Los Angeles, Johns Hopkins University, the University of California at Berkley and Pennsylvania State University.

Turning Business Dreams into Reality

For years, Elayne Crain dreamed about starting her own business. When she was ready to make the big leap, she turned to University Extension (UEX). Although Elayne already held degrees in business, she wanted more practical guidance. She found both at UEX. "Taking Foundations of Entrepreneurship was instrumental to me achieving the goal of starting my first business," she said. The popular course covered everything from writing a business plan to marketing and accounting.

Today, Elayne is the proud owner of Austin Sugarworks whose products are not only sold at leading Austin retailers but also in New York City. "Taking the course is really an investment in your dream that will pay you back in more ways than any old book."

It's Never too Late to Follow a Dream

In December 2011, Rosie Mendez was among the first graduates of the Professional Development Center's (PDC) new Paralegal Certificate Program. "When I was growing up, I wanted to go to college and study law. But, I met my husband right out of high school, and we got married. Life took me in another direction," Rosie said.

At the age of 50, Rosie started researching different paralegal programs. When she discovered PDC's Paralegal Certificate Program, she knew it was the right fit. "It was always a dream of mine to study at the University of Texas," she said. "It was a bit overwhelming at first. But I jumped in."

Since earning her certificate, Rosie has worked at several law firms and sees a bright future for herself. "I'm on to bigger and better things. Why not try something new and follow that dream?"

UEX Helps Peace Corps Volunteer Change Careers

In 2009, Adam Fivenson was working a desk job in marketing, but never stopped dreaming of a career in international affairs. To make his dream a reality, Adam needed international experience and a master's degree. So he joined the Peace Corps, where he spent two years in Santo Domingo, the capital of the Dominican Republic. During that time, Adam took two UEX courses to deepen his understanding of the economic challenges he witnessed in the streets of Santo Domingo—and to prepare for graduate school.

"Both my experience as a Peace Corps volunteer and my two UEX economics courses were key to my graduate school application" he said. "Thanks to both, I'll be starting my master's in international affairs at Georgetown University this fall."

UEX Courses Prepare Military Hero for Next Step

Baron Barrera has big dreams. "I always wanted to go back to school and complete my education. Joining the military was a step in making that dream a reality," he said. Baron took six courses with UEX while on active duty with the U.S. Coast Guard. Because he was always on call, the flexibility of UEX online classes was the perfect fit. "By taking self-paced online classes, I gained a quality education despite my hectic work schedule," Baron said.

Baron will soon begin a highly selective joint bachelor's/master's degree program in environmental sciences at the University of Southern California. All six of his UEX courses transferred over. "I would not be prepared for this program if it weren't for my experience with the University of Texas."

Informal Classes

In the fall of 2010, Informal Classes was re-launched under the umbrella of CIE. Since that time, enrollment in classes has grown from 3,835 participants in 2010 to 4,437 participants in 2011, a 16 percent jump—in just one year. Considered a community treasure by many Austinites, the popular non-credit courses were even voted as "Best in Austin" in 2011 by Austin Chronicle readers.

Filling a niche in Austin's growing community for inexpensive personal enrichment classes, Informal Classes is eclectic by design and, for many, life-affirming—opening new doors and fulfilling life-long dreams. Whether participants dream of learning the Texas Two-Step or learning to speak a new language, Informal Classes is bound to offer a class that fits any need.


