# HISTORIC LANDMARK COMMISSION FEBRUARY 25, 2013 DEMOLITION AND RELOCATION PERMITS 1907 RIO GRANDE STREET HDP-2013-0026

#### **PROPOSAL**

Demolish a ca. 1917 house.

#### ARCHITECTURE

One-and-a-half story, rectangular-plan side-gabled stuccoed frame bungalow with a partial-width, front-gabled independent porch on plain, square, stuccoed wood posts; single, paired, and triple 1:1 fenestration; false-timbering in the tympanum of the front porch gable; front-gabled dormer to the left of the front porch; gabled dormer in the center of the rear slope of the roof. There is also a two-story, rectangular-plan, side-gabled frame garage apartment to the rear of the house with a central, front-gabled, independent porch on wood posts and wooden false-timbering details in the tympanum of the porch gable; 6:6 fenestration.

#### RESEARCH


The house appears to have been built in 1917 – a city sewer connection application was made for this address in that year. The first occupants were Paul W. and Brazzie Jeffrey, who rented this house until around 1926, when they moved to Houston. Paul W. Jeffrey was an attorney with a general practice; his office was in the Scarbrough Building. The next occupants of the house were John L. and Sue Fomby, who are listed as the owners in city directories and census reports. John L. Fomby was a former traveling salesman for a sewing machine company; by the time he and Sue moved into this house, he was a traveling salesman for the Continental Gin Company, which manufactured cotton gin machinery. John L. Fomby died of an accidentally-self-inflicted gunshot wound in 1933; Sue Fomby continued to live in the house until the mid-1980s with her daughter, Marion, a schoolteacher. Sue Fomby died in 1984 at the age of 101. After Mrs. Fomby's passing, the house became a rental unit.

#### STAFF COMMENTS

The house is listed in the Comprehensive Cultural Resources Survey (1984) but without a priority for research.

#### STAFF RECOMMENDATION

Release the demolition permit upon completion of a City of Austin Documentation Package, consisting of photographs of all elevations, a dimensioned sketch plan, and a narrative history of the house for archiving at the Austin History Center.

#### **BIOGRAPHICAL NOTES:**

## Paul W. and Brazzie Jeffrey (ca. 1917 – ca. 1926)

The 1920 U.S. Census shows Paul W. and Mrs. Paul W. Jeffrey as the renters of this house. Paul W. Jeffrey was then 36, had been born in Texas to Arkansas-born parents, and was an attorney. Mrs. Jeffrey was then 34, had been born in Texas, and had no occupation listed. The couple had a son, Billy, 7, who had been born in Texas.

The 1930 U.S. Census shows Paul and Brassie Jeffrey living in a rented house on Fanning Street in Houston with their son, William, who was then 16. Paul W. Jeffrey is listed as a lawyer in general practice. Paul and Brassie Jeffrey remained in Houston until their deaths; Brassie Jeffrey died November 22, 1951 in Harris County, Paul Jeffrey died April 30, 1966 in Harris County.

Paul Wayland Jeffrey's World War I (1918) draft registration card shows that he was living in this house in Austin; he was a self-employed attorney with an office in the Scarbrough Building. He was married to Brazzie Jeffrey.

## John L. and Sue Willie Fomby (ca. 1926 – ca. 1990)

The 1940 U.S. Census shows Sue Willie Fomby as the owner of this house, which was worth \$8,000. Sue Fomby was a 57-year old widow with no occupation listed. She lived with her daughter, Marion, a private school teacher.

The 1930 U.S. Census shows John L. and Sue W. Fomby as the owners of this house, which was worth \$10,000. John L. Fomby was then a 50-year old native of Louisiana who was a traveling salesman for a gin machinery company. Sue Fomby was then a 47-year old native of Louisiana with no occupation listed. They had two children: Marion, 25, was a public school teacher, and James, 22, had no occupation listed. Marion had been born in Louisiana; James had been born in Arkansas.

The family appears in the 1920 U.S. Census as the renters of a house at 600 Henderson Street in Austin. Lovett J. Fomby (James L.) was a traveling salesman for a sewing machine company. Sue Willie Fomby had no occupation listed. The two children were teenagers; neither had an occupation listed in the census report.

The 1900 U.S. Census shows John L. Fomby as a boarder on the farm of Edd Ryan in Claiborne Parish, Louisiana, along with his three brothers, Henry, Richard, and Volney. All of the Fomby boys were in their 20s, and all listed farming as their occupation. The 1900 U.S. Census also shows Sue Willie Knightson as the 17-year old daughter of William and Ludie Knightson, farmers in Claiborne Parish, Louisiana.

John L. Fomby died on July 14, 1933 of an accidentally self-inflicted gunshot wound, in the garage of this house. He is buried in Homer, Claiborne Parish, Louisiana,

#### Accidental Death

Justice J. M. Griffith, who conducted the inquest said Fomby's death "was due to accidental gunshot wound inflicted by decedent himself."

Justice Griffith said Fomby had planned to go hunting earlier Friday with his son and had but the shotgun in the car, but that when his son, James, failed to return home, Mr. Fomby decided against going hunting on account of the heat and presumably went to the garage to get the gun from the car. The gun evidently was discharged as Mr. Fomby was removing it from the vehicle, Justice Griffith stated.

#### Gin Company Representative

The charge entered the front portion of Mr. Fomby's neck, severed a jugular vein, and emerged from the back of his neck, Justice Griffith said.

At the time of his death, Mr. Fomby was representative of the Continental Gin company. He was well known here and had been active in the affairs of the First Methodist church for a number of years. He had served as member of the board of stewards and as its head usher for several years. He and his ramily had been residents of Austin for about la years, coming here from Homer La.

Mrs. J.L. Fomby, age 101, died November 5, 1984.


She was born March 14, 1883, in Minden, Louisiana.



The 1935 Sanborn map shows the house in its current configuration, but gives no indication that the frame house was stuccoed. The map also shows the two-story garage apartment to the rear of the house. The map shows that the building originally had a one-story addition to the north (top of the map), which is no longer standing.



The 1961 Sanborn map shows the house with the same configuration as shown on the 1935 map above, but with the notation that it was a stucco house. The garage apartment with its one-story addition is shown – there is no indication that it was stuccoed, and remains a frame building to this day.
