An Un-Elected Board for Austin Energy would be less accountable

- We would lose direct accountability to the public
- RISKS: Puts our green programs and low-income programs at risk, and risks funding for our streets, parks, libraries, clinics and public safety.
- Austin Energy is our city's largest asset, worth \$3.9 billion and it is owned by citizens.
- The accountability we have now has helped get lower electric rates and has helped delay rate increases - since energy efficiency allowed us to avoid building another coal plant
- Why risk losing accountability?

Public Hearing & Vote Needed

- A public hearing was promised on Valentine's Day.
- Please honor this promise
- In fact, hold public meetings around town to explain to take public input
- Then allow citizens to vote on whether to change to an un-elected board.
- Don't support bills that cut out the public vote (Charter Amendment)

Real Analysis of Impacts Needed

- Only a cursory study has been done a "make-believe study" –that is a compilation of data, but has no analysis as to what impacts could result from changing to an un-elected board
- This is reckless, especially with our city's largest asset at stake.

Voices That Have Been Heard - and Haven't been Heard

- The Kahn report interviewed former utility managers who think an "independent" board is a good idea
- They said things like I might have been able to get more nuclear power for Austin if we'd had an "independent board."
- Not a single city council member or any citizen from a utility with a similar board

Major Problems with Ordinance

- Lacking ethics provisions
- Lacking procedure for future replacement of Board members
- Lacking guarantees to keep current level of transfer to the general fund
- Very high level can be approved by Board \$100 million
- No penalties if the board performs badly or acts against policies
- ▶ 15 + conflicts with City Charter

Vote NO on the ORDINANCE

- Keep Accountability for Austin Energy and Don't Create an UN-ELECTED BOARD
- Then improve things by:
- Improve utility performance with monthly meetings
- Allow competitive salaries so we can attract and retain the best management possible
