

Katherine S. Newman, is the James B. Knapp Dean of the Krieger School of the Arts and Sciences and Professor of Sociology at Johns Hopkins University. She is the author or co-author of twelve books in fields of urban poverty, public policy, economic mobility, and school violence.

In 2004, Dr. Newman co-authored *Rampage: The Social Roots of School Shootings*, a landmark study commissioned by the National Research Council. She was recently featured among the experts in a PBS report "Mind of Rampage Killer" on February 21 and has appeared as an authority on ABC News, CNN and PBS.

Her most recent work, *The Accordion Family: Boomerang Kids, Anxious Parents and the Private Toll of Global Competition*, analyzes the increasing length of time young people are living with their natal families in response to difficulties in the labor market and high housing costs in Western Europe, Japan, and the US.

Previously Dr. Newman was the Malcolm Forbes Class of 1941 Professor of Sociology and Public Affairs and Director of the Institute for International and Regional Studies at Princeton University. She served as the Wiener Professor of Urban Studies and the founding Dean of Social Science at the Radcliffe Institute for Advanced Study at Harvard University. She was on the faculty of Columbia University for 16 years in the Department of Anthropology.
