Housing First as a Program Model

Housing First, is a relatively recent innovation in human service programs and is an alternative to a system of emergency shelter / transitional housing progressions.

Rather than moving homeless individuals through different "levels" of housing whereby each level moves them closer to "independent living", Housing First moves the individual immediately from the streets or homeless shelters into their own apartments.

Housing First is rooted in the concept that a homeless individual first and primary need is to obtain stable housing, and that other issues that may affect the household can be addressed once housing is obtained.

In contrast, many other programs operate from a model of "housing readiness" — that is, that an individual must address other issues that may have led to the episode of homelessness prior to entering housing.
