PROPOSAL

Demolish a c. 1917 contributing house and garage.

RESEARCH

The existing house was constructed c. 1917. The first residents were the tenants Walter F. Tetts, a watch-maker, and his wife Catherine, who only lived in the house for a short time. Actually, the occupancy history of the house indicates a number of short term tenants and owner occupants up until the mid-1930's when Samuel J. and Alma (a.k.a Mary A.) Cox purchased the house after being tenants for a few years. Mr. Cox was a night watchman at a wholesale grocery, likely retired in the early 1940's, and then passed away in 1950. After which Mrs. Cox remained living at the home until her death in 1962. After this period the house was remodeled into a duplex.

PROJECT SPECIFICATIONS

The existing c. 1917 house is an approximately 1,400 sq. ft., one-story Neoclassical cottage with a hipped roof that has deep, open eaves with exposed rafter ends. The partial-width, inset front porch projects from the main house and has a separate hipped roof supported by round, unfluted classical columns set on a low wall. The flared foundation is clad with wide, horizontal siding and the walls of the house are clad with what appears to be asbestos cement shingles. There double-hung 1:1 windows.

There is a detached garage/shed accessed from Pressler Street at the rear that was likely built between 1935 and 1961 according to Sanborn maps. It has a gable roof, vertical wood siding and double doors at the rear.

The applicant proposes to demolish both the house and garage to allow for redevelopment of the parcel.

STANDARDS FOR REVIEW

The existing property is contributing to the West Line National Register Historic District. Applicable general design review guidelines state:

- The distinguishing original qualities or character of a property and its environment shall not be destroyed. Removal or alteration of any historic material or distinctive architectural features should be avoided.
- All properties shall be recognized as products of their own time. Alterations which have no historical basis and which seek to create an earlier appearance shall be discouraged.
- Changes which have taken place in the course of time may have acquired significance in their own right, and shall be recognized and respected.
- Distinctive stylistic features or examples of skilled craftsmanship which characterize

a property shall be treated with sensitivity.

- Deteriorated architectural features shall be repaired rather than replaced whenever possible. In the event replacement is necessary, the new material should match the material being replaced in composition, design, color, texture, and other visual qualities. Repair or replacement of missing architectural features should be based on accurate duplications of features, substantiated by historical, physical, or pictorial evidence.
- Contemporary design for alterations and additions to existing properties are appropriate when such alterations and additions do not destroy significant historic, architectural, or cultural material and are compatible with the size, scale, color, material, and character of the property, neighborhood, or environment.
- Whenever, possible, new additions or alterations to structures shall be done in such a manner that if such additions or alterations were to be removed in the future, the essential form and integrity of the structure would not be impaired.
- The installation of protective or code-required mechanical systems shall be concealed whenever possible so as not to intrude upon or detract from the property's aesthetic and historical qualities except where concealment would result in the alteration or destruction of historically significant materials or spaces.

The house is good examples of a simple Neoclassical Cottage and retains a good level of historic architectural integrity. Therefore, demolition does not meet the guidelines. Additionally, with nearly all the houses that were present by 1935 still standing and retaining their historic appearance, this block of the West Line National Register District retains a very high level of integrity and would be eligible for Local Historic District zoning. Loss of this house, and the one at 507 Oakland, being located in the middle of the block, would adversely impact this area of the District.

STAFF RECOMMENDATION

Postpone releasing the permit and encourage the applicant to consider alternatives to demolition.


CARL and MINNIE HYLTIN (ca. 1919 - ca. 1921)

The 1920 U.S. Census shows Carl and Minnie Hyltin as the renters of this house. Carl Hyltin was then 30, had been born in Texas to Swedish-born parents, and was a book-keeper at a bank. Minnie Hyltin was then 28, had been born in Texas to Swedish-born parents, and had no occupation listed. They had a 1-year old son, Arthur.

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Carl Hyltin's World War I draft registration card shows that he was born in 1888 in Hutto, Texas, and was living there in 1917 at the time of his draft registration. He was a grocer in Hutto, in business for himself, and was married.

The 1930 U.S. Census shows Carl and Minnie Hyltin living in a rented house at 206 W. 16th Street in Austin. Carl Hyltin was the credit manager for a dry goods store. The couple had a son, Hartley, 12, and two daughters, Marjorie, 9, and Frances, 1.



"before going into the funeral home business, was a member of the Austin Chamber of Commerce, the Optimists Club, Mary Rebekah Lodge No. 117, BPO Elks No. 201, Degree of Honor Protective Association No. 22, Modern Woodman of the World, Independent Order of Odd Fellows and the Gethse mane Lutheran Church, where he was a member of the board of administration,

Born Dec. 4, 1888, in Hutto, Hyltin came to Austin in 1918 when he became associated with the old State National Bank.

He is survived by his widow, two daughters, Miss Frances Ann Hyltin and Mrs. Marjorie Gillespie, both of Austin; one son Hartley Hyllin of Austin: three sisters Miks. amie Hyltin, and Mrs. Ella Ahlgren of Hutto and Mrs. Edith Mueller of Austin; and three brothers. 1 artin Hyltin of San Marcos, Walter Hyltin of Houston and Riot Hyltin of Austin.

The body is at the Hyltin Funeral Home pending completion of funeral arrangements.

SAMUEL and MARY "ALMA" COX (ca. 1934 - ca. 1962)

Samuel J. and Mary A. Cox appear in the 1940 U.S. Census as the owners of this house, which was worth \$2,600. Samuel J. Cox was then 68, had been born in Texas, and was a night watchman at a wholesale grocery business. Mary A. Cox was then 60 and had been born in Texas. Their daughter, Isabel, 20, was a saleslady in a department store.

The 1930 U.S. Census shows Sam and Alma Cox as roomers in the home of Mina Sussdorf, at 1423 Canterbury Street in Austin. Sam was then 58, Alma was 50, and their daughters, Mary Eva, 17, and Isabel, 10, all lived with them. Sam Cox is listed as a night watchman.

The 1920 U.S. Census shows Samuel J. and Alma M. Cox living on a rented farm in Blanco County, Texas with their children: Lena, 17, Samuel G., 14, and Mary Eva, 6. All had been born in Texas. Samuel J. Cox is listed as a farmer growing general crops.
