# HISTORIC LANDMARK COMMISSION OCTOBER 28, 2013 DEMOLITION AND RELOCATION PERMITS HDP-2013-0763 4106 RAMSEY AVENUE

#### **PROPOSAL**

Demolish a ca. 1940 house.

#### ARCHITECTURE

One-story, wing-and-gable plan, minimal traditional style frame house with an attached one-bay garage; partial-width, shed-roofed entry covering integral with the gable; scalloped and board-and-batten detailing in the tympanum of the front gable; 1:1 fenestration.

#### RESEARCH


The house was built in 1940 by McNeeley Contractors of Austin. The first owners and occupants were Norman J. and Minnie M. Kanely, who lived here for the rest of their lives. Norman Kanely was a native of New York City; he had worked in electrical supply houses and for a radio manufacturer in Waco before moving to Austin and this house. While in Austin, he worked in real estate for a short period in the early 1940s, then as a plumber. For the vast majority of the time he occupied this house, he either had no occupation listed or was listed as retired. When he died in Jun, 1987, there was a death notice in the Austin newspaper, noting that services were pending, but there was no later obituary. Minnie Kanely lived until 1996; she had only a death notice, and no full obituary, in the newspaper.

#### STAFF COMMENTS

The house is not listed in any City survey.

#### STAFF RECOMMENDATION

Encourage relocation over demolition, but release the permit upon completion of a City of Austin Documentation Package, consisting of photographs of all elevations, a dimensioned sketch plan, and a narrative history, for archiving at the Austin History Center. The house has neither the architectural nor the historical significance to warrant individual designation as a historic landmark.

#### **BIOGRAPHICAL NOTES**

### Norman J. and Minnie M. Kanely (ca. 1940 - ca. 1996)

Norman J. Kanely appears in the 1920 U.S. Census as the 18-year old son of Wilhelmina Kanely of New York City. Wilhelmina Kanely was a 39-year old Swedish-born widow. Norman Kanely worked for an electrical supply house, and had a younger brother, Duval. The 1910 U.S. Census shows Wilhelmina's husband. James Norman Kanely, as a Swedish-born printer in New York City.

A Nelson Kanely appears in the 1920 U.S. Census for Austin, as a 19-year old lodger in the home of Charles and Nannie Weigel, at 208 W. 9th Street. This Nelson Kanely was also born in New York, and was a helper at an electrical supply house here. It is probable that the "Nelson" Kanely appearing in this census report was Norman Kanely.

The 1930 U.S. Census shows a James M. Kanely as a lodger in the home of James C. and J.C. Smith on Austin Avenue in Waco, Texas. This James M. Kanely is the same age as the Norman Kanely shown in the 1920 U.S. Census report, and had been born in New York. He was a salesman for a radio manufacturer.
