Around 1977, my wife and I decided that it was time to quit paying rent and buy a house of our own. We wanted a good neighborhood to raise our two little daughters in, and began looking at homes in the Crestview and Wooten areas.

Our real estate agent told us about a beautiful home for sale at the corner of Woodrow Avenue and Richcreek Road -- the address was 1501 Richcreek Road. The asking price of \$42,500 was somewhat above what we were shooting for, but we decided to look at the house at our real estate agent's prompting.

The lot, landscaping, and architecture made the house a real showplace. But, I will never forget walking into that beautiful home. It was so spacious and inviting with a charm that was unique. One feature that stood out to me, and still does to this day, was the firewood storage box built in next to the fireplace. It had an outdoor access, so you could fill it from outside the house, and it could also be used for additional seating -- I wish I had that feature in my current home.

Ultimately, my wife and I decided that \$42,500 was about \$10,000 more mortgage debt than we wanted to take on, so we settled on a modest two-story home in Allandale Estates.

I've always had a bit of regret that we didn't choose to purchase the McKown House, and even more so now that there is the potential to lose that beautiful Crestview icon -- I pray that it doesn't happen.

The Manor House by Laura Smith

Though my interaction with the McKown House has not been with the owners, it has felt like it has been with people. When my husband and I moved to the neighborhood in 2006, we walked beside the McKown House as part of our circuit every night, jokingly referring to it as the "Manor House". The way that the trees, shrubs, and landscaping emulated the symmetry of stately architecture made us proud of the neighborhood's variety.

We would comment that most neighborhoods do not have the vitality from the different eras - the modern styles mixing next door to 1950 Craftsmen styles; and how this house did not fit into either category, but still belonged. The care put into the development obviously showed a person's love for a home, an ideal, and a promise for the future.

During the summer of no rain, and the subsequent years of disuse, the property showed signs of deterioration. This was beyond depressing for me and my husband; it felt like watching an older relative die. This bastion of style and twentieth century progress began looking sad, unwanted, and sick. Even the flagpole drooped. The place we once referred to as the Manor House began to represent a concern for our own property with the subsequent months of no rain, and no relief in sight.

I have never been into the McKown House. I have never met the owners - neither the current developers nor the people who lived there. I am not against progress in the neighborhood, either, but I know that this house was designed to be lived in and enjoyed, and could be lived in and enjoyed if it was allowed to be. Please allow this house to be bought by someone who wants to live in this house and appreciate it as an architectural symbol of hope for all of us in the neighborhood.
