PROPOSAL

Demolish a ca. 1928 house.

ARCHITECTURE

One-story, rectangular-plan, front-gabled frame bungalow with a partial-width, partiallyinset, front-gabled porch on plain, square, wood posts; single and paired 1:1 fenestration.

RESEARCH


The house appears to have been built in 1928 by Noble A. Baker, a meat cutter, who, with his wife, Helena, lived at 2914 Rio Grande Street. This house was apparently built as an investment property for them. The first occupants of the house were Irvin and Florence Stewart, who rented the house from 1928 until 1930, while he was teaching at the University of Texas. Mrs. Jimmie Matthews, a widow, with her two grown step-children, rented the house from 1930 to around 1932. A series of renters occupied the house through the remainder of the 1930s, including a dentist, Dr. Carless Andrews. By 1941, the house had been purchased by Wallace and Carrie Rucker. Wallace Rucker had been an abstracter in San Antonio in 1930, but had no occupation listed in the 1940 U.S. Census report nor in any Austin city directories. He passed away in 1944, and his widow, Carrie, continued to live in this house until the mid-1960s. The house was a rental unit in the late 1960s, and was listed as vacant in city directories through the early 1990s.

STAFF COMMENTS

The house is listed in the Comprehensive Cultural Resources Survey (1984) but without a priority for research.

STAFF RECOMMENDATION

Encourage relocation over demolition, and request that the applicant consider retaining the house and constructing an addition, if necessary. While the house does not qualify as an individually-designated historic landmark, it is a completely intact example of 1920s bungalow style and would be contributing to a potential historic district in the West Campus – Heritage neighborhoods, including Rio Grande and Salado Streets north of 29th Street.

BIOGRAPHICAL NOTES

Irvin and Florence Stewart (ca. 1928 - ca. 1930)

Irvin and Florence Stewart are listed in the 1930 U.S. Census as residents of Washington, D.C. Irvin Stewart was then 29, had been born in Texas, and was a university teacher. Florence Stewart was then 26, had been born in New York, and had no occupation listed. The couple had no children listed with them. They lived in what appears to have been a large apartment house in Washington.

Irvin Stewart, 91, Dies; Ex-Head of University

Irvin Stewart, a former president of West Virginia University who served in the 1940's as executive secretary of the Government agency that guided development of the atomic bomb, died Monday at his home in Washington. He was 91 years old.

His death was the result of a series of strokes, his wife, Florence, said.

Mr. Stewart was president of West Virginia University from 1946 to 1958. He then taught constitutional law at the university until 1967, when he retired.

He was also director of telecommunications management in the Federal Office of Emergency Planning in the 1960's. In recent years he was a consultant to the National Academy of Public Administration, which advises the President and Congress on government effectiveness.

In 1940 he became executive secretary of the National Defense Research Committee, later the Office of Scientific Research and Development, the agency involved with development of the atomic bomb.

Earlier, he helped draft the Communications Act of 1934, legislation that established the Federal Communications Commission, which guides Federal telecommunications policy.

Jimmie, Evelyn, and Garland Matthews (ca. 1930 – ca. 1932)

Mrs. Jimmie Matthews appears as the tenant of this house in the 1930 U.S. Census report. Jimmie Matthews was then a 47-year old widow who had been born in Texas and had no occupation listed. Garland Matthews was her 21-year old step-son; he had been born in Texas, and was the manager of a golf course. Edith E. (Evelyn) was her 19-year old step-daughter; she had been born in Texas and had no occupation listed. They had a roomer, 22-year old Philip Nolen, who had been born in Texas, and had no occupation listed.

Wallace and Carrie Rucker (ca. 1941 - ca. 1965)

Wallace and Carrie Rucker appear in the 1940 U.S. Census as the renters of a house at 203 W. 15th Street in Austin. Wallace Rucker was then 58, had been born in Texas, and had no occupation listed. Carrie Rucker was 59, had been born in Texas, and had no occupation listed. They had two daughters: Carrie, 15; and Eleanor J. Watkins, 26, a public school teacher. Both daughters had been born in Texas.

The 1930 U.S. Census shows the family living in a rented house in San Antonio. Wallace Rucker was an abstractor; no other family member had an occupation listed. The census report reveals that Eleanor Watkins was Wallace Rucker's step-daughter.

WALLACE CREED RUCKER Wallace Creed Rucker, Jr., 39, died in a local hospital Tuesday. Besides his parents, he is survived by a sister. Carrie Wallien Rucker, all of Austin. Funeral services were conducted at the Weed-Corley Funeral home Wednesday by the Rev. Joseph Harte. Burial was in Oakwood cemetery.
