Others Say: Urban farms

Sayle and others: Urban farmers try to be good neighbors

The Austin-American Statesman's attempt to vilify urban farms in its series of Viewpoints ignores the many ecological, educational, charitable and health benefits urban farms contribute to the Austin area. And they ignore the inclusive stakeholder process that many folks throughout the community participated in to help ensure that urban farms can peacefully and safely co-exist within urban neighborhoods.

As the Statesman is well aware, this community just completed an exhaustive visioning process that led to the Imagine Austin Plan. In that plan, a stated goal is to "make healthy and local foods accessible, particularly in underserved areas by removing barriers and providing incentives for the establishment of sustainable community gardens, urban farms, neighborhood grocery stores, farmers markets and farm stands." Urban farms in single-family areas fit squarely within the Imagine Austin goals and should not be up for debate.

As representatives of the major urban farms in Austin, we do recognize the need to come to the table to address some legitimate concerns raised by our neighbors. And that is why we spent the past eight months taking time away from our farms and our families to participate in this important work.

We care deeply about the community we live and work in. We are passionate about the land we cultivate and the food we grow. We love that the vegetables grown on our farms are served in homes and restaurants around Austin. When folks walk through our farms seeking inspiration and information about how to cultivate the land on their property, we celebrate. It is our joy to host children from area schools on field trips where they learn about farming, ecology and healthy eating. And when non-profit organizations seek out our farms to host gatherings — to raise awareness and funds — we jump at the opportunity.

As examples, Boggy Creek Farm has hosted an annual event for the past 15 years for Green Corn Project to support their work installing food gardens for elderly, low-income, and disabled community members. And just in the past year, our collective farms have been host to a variety of charitable organizational gatherings that have collectively raised over \$100,000. Much of this money supports efforts that directly benefit the east Austin community.

Today, East Austin public green spaces are sorely lacking. We hope that our urban farms help fill this gap by offering our neighbors a third place — a community space — to gather, to connect with nature, to break bread, to build community.

We recognize that to be good neighbors, compromises are necessary. We've made such compromises, and we support the proposal voted out of the Planning Commission and up for consideration on Thursday's council agenda.

We are not policy makers; we are farmers. We are also neighbors that aspire to create a welcoming environment where all members of our community can come together. Please, stand with us in support of urban farms.

Hi Paula!

I hope I can send some words that help Springdale Farm continue to grow great food and contribute to the neighborhood through hiring, hosting field trips, and partnering with organizations like the Sustainable Food Center that help make healthy, sustainable food options available for everybody. I understand that although the food that Springdale Farms isn't affordable for many of its neighbors, this isn't exactly Springdale Farm's fault, as it's really difficult to keep a small urban farm running and profitable. I understand that hosting weddings are part of how Springdale Farm supports itself, and I'm proud that my family could help in that effort by choosing to have my wedding there. The farm was relatively reasonably priced compared to other wedding venues, and my fiance and I much preferred the idea of supporting people we know who are doing good work rather than contributing to a "wedding factory" in the hill country.

This is honestly a tricky issue for me, as I'm a friend to members of PODER and generally support their work unconditionally. I have family who live and go to school near to Springdale Farm, and I've brought my own afterschool class students to visit the farm. I'm also a former CSA subscriber at Springdale Farm, and am proud to have had my recipes featured in the farm's newsletter :) I've found the farm to be a friendly and beautiful place to not just pick up food, but to build community. I'm connected to this issue in multiple ways, and I feel sad that the debate around it has become so divisive. It seems like there must be some kind of compromise that could be reached that would allow Springdale Farm to continue its good work, while also ensuring that long-time Austin residents aren't displaced from their homes, and that neighbors aren't subjected to unreasonable smells, etc. due to excess poultry processing (though I know that wasn't an issue at Springdale specifically). When I moved to Austin five years ago, I didn't know anyone.

Neighbors of my family from back home put me in touch with their cousin, Anne, and I spent the entire first summer out on her farm out in Manor fixing fences and painting her house. In the evenings, we would ride the horses through the woods and down by the creek. She always told me she had acquired the farm "by the grace of God and a man named Joe." The previous owner had become old and ill, and wanted to sell the land to Anne, whom he believed was the only person who could care for the land as much as he did. She had always told him that was her dream, to live on a little house on a 'lotta land. Anne couldn't afford the property, and the bank wouldn't give her a loan. Against the wishes of Joe's family, who wanted to break up the property and sell to developers, he told Anne he would owner-finance the farm if she could raise the money for the down payment.

For years, Anne lived on the brink of bankruptcy, barely able to cover the monthly mortgage payments, receiving collection calls and asking her horse boarder tenants for advances. Even after she was able to stabilize herself, she committed her land to be preserved forever, ensuring that the hill country would stay country. Now, with the tremendous growth that is taking place on highway 290 and beyond, it takes me twice as long as it took me five years ago to make the drive out to Anne's farm. Sometimes I feel like the farmland is getting farther and farther away, while at the same time our urban core is becoming more faceless.

I work at an architecture firm on 4th street, and this past weekend, the roads around our office were blocked off making way for FI's "Fan Fest". Clients could not come to our office during those days, product reps had to reschedule their meetings with us. Outside our office, people walked by throwing their beer cans at our doorstep. Then on Monday, I walked admits the desolate streets still blocked off, trash blowing in the wind...

I was sad. Sad because I feel that the greatest strengths of our city have suddenly become our greatest weaknesses, that we are consumed by the desire to whore our streets and parks out to visitors when we should instead be focusing on our urban communities as a product of progressive and sustainable growth. Today, we have that opportunity.

I first encountered Springdale Farm during a fundraiser for a friend that has cancer. I used to volunteer at the HOPE farmers market and one of the vendors, Coleen, told us the doctors had found a lump in her breast and she would have to go under radiation treatment and chemotherapy. Her health insurance was poor, if any; she sold pies to make a living. She would not be able to afford the high cost of treatment. My friend Elizabeth, who ran the HOPE market at the time and had developed a deep relationship with all who were a part of it, banded the community together to help raise money for Coleen's treatment. People from all over Austin baked pies, everyone volunteered time, energy, efforts. That night, while the pigs roasted and the bluegrass band played, we danced. We celebrated life and we celebrated each other.

They raised over \$20,000 for Coleen. Never before have I seen a community come together so quickly and so fervently for someone in need. Sure, I have heard about these things: I have given money and donated time to disaster relief efforts such as the flooding that recently took place in Onion Creek as well as in the Philippines, but it was Springdale Farm that evening that was the platform for an absolutely amazing outpour of human spirit. Paula and Glenn opened their arms to their neighbors and asked, like any of us would have done, "How can we help?" Springdale is more than just a farm. It is a catalyst for community love and growth, should people choose to embrace it.

I think that we tend to look at the world in black and white, of what we are for and against (change mostly), of what has been taken from us and of what we "deserve". Yet, like Anne, and like Paula and Glenn, we all strive to protect our livelihoods, but that does not mean it has to be in conflict with giving ourselves in service to our community. Anne gave her farm to all of us, and to our children, so that they may breath clean air and see the water flow in the creek for generations to come, that they may feel the high Texas grass upon their fingertips. Paula and Glenn lend their land to their community, they grow food while at the same time providing a meaningful space for others to in turn derive their greatest meaning.

In May, my fiancé and I will be getting married at Springdale Farm. I always thought it would be at Anne's ranch. But it's too far out now, too far disconnected from Austin's urban core. Will we continue to aid in the polarization of urban and rural? The biggest irony of all this is that the east side used to be fields of vast farmland...

As an architect, I believe in fair and diverse growth. I believe in urban density. I believe that mixed uses make a community better, more interesting, and more accepting of each other. I practice this in my work; my firm, Dick Clark + Associates, is currently working on the Capital Studios affordable housing project right here in downtown Austin. I am proud to engage in such works. Just as I am proud to stand here and say to you all, I stand with Springdale Farm – I stand with Paula and Glenn for what we believe to be the most beneficial and meaningful growth, for ALL.

My husband and I recently got married at Springdale Farm. We had been searching for a wedding site for awhile, and had not been able to find anything in Austin that fit what we love most about the city. We live in Austin because we love the fact that it is a unique space for individuals from all different backgrounds to come together, a place where small businesses can not only survive, but thrive and grow, a place where there is always and outdoor space provided, despite the season, and where all sorts of different businesses are accessible from, and found in, neighborhoods, where they become part of the community landscape. My husband owns a small business, and was particularly vehement about supporting small, local businesses in all of our wedding endeavors and expenses.
