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
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Women's Health

Over 9,000 patients served in 2012.

Do not track number of immigrants served.

57% of patients speak a language other than English. Primarily Spanish (56%).

Barriers in the provision of services to immigrants

Language- most clinical staff are bilingual (English/Spanish) and we have access to interpreter services via telephone for other languages but telephone interpretation can be difficult to work with.

Transportation- especially for those living outside the city core.

Lack of understanding of health care system- some are fearful about accessing health care and other social services, many don't understand their rights, don't know how to go about accessing care or obtaining identification cards.

Support needed by local government

Access to publically-funded health care coverage for all residents regardless of immigration status
