PROPOSAL

Demolish a ca. 1951 house.

ARCHITECTURE

One-story, U-plan, side-gabled frame house with two projecting front-gabled bays on each side of the central, recessed entry porch, which has ornamental metal posts; rock veneer on the central, recessed section of the house and the right projecting front-gabled bay; single and paired 6:6 fenestration.

RESEARCH


The house was built in 1951 by Will Biggs, a local building contractor. The first owners and occupants were Charles and Frances Leidy, who lived here from the time of construction in 1951 until around 1954. Charles Leidy was the proprietor of a service station at 1900 E. 6th Street when he and Frances moved into this house; he later was an orderly at Seton Hospital. From the mid-1950s until around 1963, the house was owned and occupied by Samuel and Mary L. Dwyer. Samuel Dwyer was still in school at the University of Texas when he purchased this house; prior to his marriage to Mary L. Dwyer, he had lived in the UT student apartments. Samuel Dwyer became an instructor at the University of Texas in electrical engineering; in 1963, he moved to the University of Missouri in Columbia, where he taught electrical engineering and bio-engineering until 1978. He also taught at the Kansas University Medical Center in Kansas City, the University of California at Los Angeles, and at the University of Virginia. He died in 2008 in San Antonio, Texas. The house was vacant in the early 1970s, and has been a rental unit since that time.

STAFF COMMENTS

The house does not appear in any City survey.

STAFF RECOMMENDATION

Release the demolition permit. The house has neither the architectural nor the historical significance to warrant individual designation as a historic landmark, and has been architecturally modified (possibly with the addition of the left front gable) so that documentation of its current appearance is not justified.


