Additional Backup Information

The proposed ordinance amends Chapters 25-2 to create a new Lake Austin (LA) District zoning overlay that would apply to all property within 1,000 feet of Lake Austin and preserve the environmental protections of the LA District regardless of the zoning of the individual parcels. The ordinance was developed in response to Council Resolution 20130829-113 directing staff to implement in part recommendations from the Lake Austin Task Force (<http://www.austintexas.gov/latf>) final report published in August 2013. The ordinance preserves the conditions of the current LA District except the front and side yard setbacks for which the setbacks of the base zoning would apply within the overlay.

The Lake Austin Task Force identified as a consensus recommendation the need to address the problem of homeowners exempting themselves from the environmental restrictions of the LA District by upzoning. Upzoning

created inconsistent development requirements between adjacent lakeshore property owners and lessened environmental protections necessary to preserve the quality of Austin's drinking water supply and a critical regional recreation resource.
