Restore Rundberg Program Background Information

- Reviewed citywide hot spot crime data
 - Concentrated criminal activity
 - Concentrated poverty
 - High unemployment
 - Low performing schools
 - Poor health
 - Limited infrastructure
 - Housing, social services, businesses
 - Disinvestment
- Rundberg Area only hot spot location to satisfy all of the grant criteria

Triple-T: Targeting, Testing & Tracking (Sherman, 2013)

- 1. Conduct and apply research to **target** resources on predictable concentrations of harm from crime and disorder.
- 2. Conduct **tests** of police methods to help choose what works best to reduce harm.
- 3. Once police use research to *target* their *tested* practices, **track** the daily delivery and effects of those practices.













- Perpetrators of Crime in Rundberg Hot Spots:
 - 91.5% are male
 - 84% of perpetrators are people of color



- Victims of Crime in Rundberg Hot Spots:
 - 80% are male
 - 84% of victims are people of color





Focus on five core areas:

- Persistent crime
- Physical and social disorder
- Community engagement (including cultural and linguistic barriers)
- Community's relationship with police
- At-risk youth

Development of central hybrid community center for neighbors of all ages:

- Health clinic
- Senior services
- Gardening
- Neighborhood civic and social services







After school programs for those 10 years and older (sports, arts, vocational, etc.)

Work with middle and high school counselors to define specific needs.

Define financial and mentoring resources for programs that may exist with city, county, and non-profits for reduced fees, etc.

Work with local businesses and individuals to raise resources and develop mentoring options.








Restore Rundberg Priority 3, Cont.

Accountability for Housing and Property Code Violations

There is a direct correlation between improving housing and surrounding property conditions and lowering crime rates.

Properties that display a sense of pride and care consistently deter criminal activity.

Homelessness and prostitution are problems that continue to impact families and communities leading to neighborhood decline.
