- Budget:
  - \$1.012 Trillion Continuing Resolution ends December 11
  - Congress scheduled to return for Lame Duck after November 11
- Sequester:
  - \$1.012 Billion cut for FY2014 Budget
  - Estimated \$1.013 Billion to \$1.145 Billion for FY2015 FY2021

- Provide a solid safety net for economically vulnerable populations, and
- Recognize the challenge of climate change and the need to develop economically sustainable ways to address it.
