HISTORIC LANDMARK COMMISSION DECEMBER 15, 2014 DEMOLITION AND RELOCATION PERMITS HDP-2014-1053 3310 WINDSOR ROAD

PROPOSAL

Demolish a ca. 1953 house.

ARCHITECTURE

One-story, irregular-plan, hipped-roof, stone-veneered, mid-century modern house with banks of metal-framed casement windows, and a small, inset entry with ornamental metal posts and railings.

RESEARCH

The house was built in 1953 by Roland Freund, who had operated an auto garage in the 1940s, and by the 1950s, was building houses. The first owners and occupants of this house were Joe and Mena Bonura, who moved here from Port Arthur, Texas, where they had run a café. Their son, Matthew, was an assistant manager at a personal loan business here in Austin. Joe Bonura died in 1955; by 1958, Mena had moved back to Port Arthur. She died in Houston in 1986.

The house was then purchased by Enrico and Edith Volterra. Enrico Volterra was an Italian-born professor, who, after teaching at several other European and American technological universities, came to the University of Texas in 1957. He was the son of one of Italy's most famous physicists and mathematicians, who had to leave Italy during the rise of the fascist regime under Benito Mussolini. Enrico Volterra taught aerospace engineering at UT, and wrote over 100 papers on the subject. His fields of expertise were the theory of vibrations, the strength of materials, and the mathematical theory of elasticity. He taught in both France and Israel while on the faculty of the University of Texas. After his death in 1973, his widow and two daughters continued to live in this house for several years.


STAFF COMMENTS

The house is not listed in any City survey, and there is no indication of an architect associated with the design of the house.


STAFF RECOMMENDATION

Encourage rehabilitation and re-use of the house, which is a nice example of conservative mid-century modern style with its banks of metal-framed casement windows and 1950s-styled stone veneer. However, if rehabilitation is not feasible, then recommend completion of a City of Austin Documentation Package, consisting of photographs of all elevations, a dimensioned sketch plan, and a narrative history, for archiving at the Austin History Center, prior to release of the permit.

BIOGRAPHICALNOTES

Joe and Mena Bonura (ca. 1953 – ca. 1957)

Joe and Mena Bonura are listed in the 1940 U.S. Census as the owners of a house in a nice section of Port Arthur, Texas. Joe Bonura was 49, had been born in Louisiana, and was a cook with his own business. Mena Bonura was 43, had been born in Louisiana, and had no occupation listed. Their son, Matthew, was 9, and had been born in Texas. Joe Bonura's 1955 death certificate shows that he was born in Italy in 1892, and was a retired café operator. He was living in this house at the time of his death. Mena Bonura died April 2, 1986 in Houston, Texas.

JOSEPH BONURA

Joseph Bonura, 62, a resident of 3310 Windsor Road, died in a local hospital Friday. He was a retired cafe owner of Port Arthur and had been a resident of Austin for five years. He was a member of St. Austin's Catholic Church.



Enrico and Edith Volterra (ca. 1958 -)



He was born in Rome in 1905. the son of Senator Vito Volterra, a mathematician and physicist. After earning a doctoral degree in civil engineering at the University of Rome, he studied at Cambridge University in England. Dr. Volterra taught at the University of Rome, Illinois Institute of Technology in Chicago and the Rensselaer Polytechnic Institute in Trey, N.Y. Since 1957, Dr. Volterra had been a professor in the College of Engineering at UT. He published numerous professional works. **Dr.** Volterra taught in France in 1967 and in Israel in 1969. During World War II his work included research for the British Admiralty, and he later conducted research for the U.S. Office of Naval Research. He is survived by his wife, Mrs. Edith Volterra; and two Miss daughters, Virginia Volterra and Miss Angelica Volterra, all of Austin.

IN MEMORIAM

ENRICO VOLTERRA

Enrico Volterra, professor of aerospace engineering, died on June 29, 1973. He was 68.

Professor Volterra was born on June 11, 1905, in Rome, Italy. He received his first degree from Rome University in 1928. He earned a PhD from King's College, Cambridge University, in 1941.

Dr. Volterra conducted research for both the British Admiralty and the U.S. Office of Naval Research during World War II. He taught at Rome University, Cambridge University, the Illinois Institute of

Professor Volterra specialized in the theory of vibrations, strength of materials, the mathematical theory of elasticity, and experimental stress analysis. He held a National Science Foundation grant to study vibrations of curved bars. He was also awarded a Fulbright fellowship, which took him to the Technion-Israel Institute of Technology to lecture. Professor Volterra published nearly 100 papers.

Enrico Volterra papers

Born in Rome in 1905, the son of one of the finest scientists and mathematicians Italy ever

produced, Enrico Volterra earned his first degree from the University of Rome in 1928, and continued to study and do research there with the help of several assistantships, including a five-year stint with renowned mathematician and professor mechanics, Tullio Levi-Civita.


After the Mussolini regime promulgated the 1938 racial laws, which prohibited Jews from teaching, Enrico lost his position. The following year, he left Italy for Cambridge, England, where he earned a PhD in engineering. When Italy entered World War II on the German side, Enrico was imprisoned in an internment camp on the Isle of Man, where he learned of his father's death. Released through the efforts of wellplaced British scientists notably Archibald V. Hill, Enrico spent the rest of the war years in England, working on plastic and rubber materials under G. I. Taylor and for the British Admiralty.

The assistance of both Theodore von Kármán and Tullio Levi-Civita in Enrico's search for a permanent position is documented in their and in the latter's papers. Enrico's extensive correspondence with Levi-Civita traces his mentor's attempts to secure a teaching position in Argentina for his protégé. In the end Enrico chose the path offered by Von Kármán, which in 1948 took him across the ocean to the Illinois Institute of Technology in Chicago.

Enrico spent the rest of his life in the United States. He soon moved to Rensselaer Polytechnic Institute in Troy, New York, and in 1957 to the University of Texas at Austin as a professor of aerospace engineering. He specialized in the theory of vibrations, in the



strength of materials, and in the mathematical theory of elasticity. He died in 1973.

Enrico felt keenly his father's scientific legacy. Frequently the source for historical information about his father, Enrico composed an extensive scientific-biographical manuscript around which Sir Edmund Whittaker built the obituary notice on Vito Volterra for the Royal Society. Enrico took advantage of his visits to his mother in Italy to look after his father's famous library, now deposited at the Huntington Library in San Marino, California. The papers include an interesting exchange of letters between Enrico and fractal pioneer Szolem Mandelbrojt regarding the editing of some of Vito's unfinished manuscript material. The Enrico Volterra papers also include many photographs of his father as well as a collection of autographs of

distinguished scientists such as Giovanni Schiaparelli, George Ellery Hale, Max Noether, Sophie Kowalevski and Felix Klein, among others
