HISTORIC LANDMARK COMMISSION APRIL 27, 2015 DEMOLITION AND RELOCATION PERMITS HDP-2015-0200 2208 E. 13^{TH} STREET

PROPOSAL

Demolish a ca. 1911 house.

ARCHITECTURE

One-story, wing-and-gable plan, frame house with a clipped gables at the front and sides; partial-width inset porch on brick piers; single a, double, and triple 1:1 fenestration. It appears like the house may have had a new roofline in the 1920s – clipped gables were not in fashion at the time the house was built in 1911, and the house was listed as vacant in the 1920 city directory, perhaps because of the possible construction.

RESEARCH

The house appears to have been built around 1911; the first occupants were Frank and Cora Tarver, who lived here until around 1913. Frank Tarver was a carpenter. Henry W. Walker, a contractor, is listed as the occupant of the house in the 1914 city directory; the house was then apparently rented to Benjamin and Nell Graham until around 1919. From around 1923 to around 1936, the house was owned and occupied by James and Rose Gilbert. James Gilbert worked for the City Sanitation Department.

Ira and Mattie Coleman owned and occupied the house from around 1936 until around 1970. Ira Coleman was a porter for Carl Mayer, a jeweler on Congress Avenue. Mattie's mother and sister also lived with the Colemans in the mid-1940s. Ira Coleman was in the military, and in 1945, he and Mattie were living in Galveston; when he returned, he became an agent for the Excelsior Life Insurance Company with offices on Rosewood Avenue. He is then listed as a porter for Carl Mayer, until he died in 1959. Mattie Coleman continued t live in the house until around 1970. It has been a rental unit since that time.

STAFF COMMENTS

The house is listed as a high priority for preservation in the Chestnut Neighborhood Historic Resources Survey (2001).

STAFF RECOMMENDATION



BIOGRAPHICAL NOTES:

Frank and Cora Tarver (ca. 1911 – ca. 1913)
Frank and Cora Tarver appear at 2206 E. 14th Street in the 1910 U.S. Census. Frank Tarver was 38, had been born in Texas to Tennessee-born parents, and was a house contractor. Cora Tarver was 28, had been born in Texas, and had no occupation listed. They had a son, Thomas, 4 months.

James and Rosa Gilbert (ca. 1923 – ca. 1936)

Jim and Rosa Gilbert appear in the 1920 U.S. Census as the owners of the house at 2004 E. 13th Street. Jim Gilbert was 44, had been born in Texas, and did sanitary work for the City. Rosa Gilbert was 39, had been born in Texas, and had no occupation listed. They had 3 "lodgers," all children, one of whom is listed as his "adopted son" in the 1930 census.

The 1930 U.S. Census shows Jim Gilbert as a 50-year old divorced man, and the owner of this house, which was worth \$800. He was a laborer doing odd jobs. He had 2 female lodgers, one of whom was a cook in a fraternity house. In addition, he had an adopted son, Boyd McNeil, 18, who had no occupation listed.

There is no known record of James Gilbert's death in Texas; he is not buried in a city cemetery.

Ira and Mattie Coleman (ca. 1936 – ca. 1970)

Ira and Mattie Coleman appear in the 1940 U.S. Census as the owners of this house, which was worth \$2,000. Ira Coleman was 44, had been born in Texas, and was a porter in a retail jewelry store. Mattie Coleman was 47, had been born in Texas, and was a cook for a private family. With them lived Mattie Coleman's mother, Annie Harrison, a 70-year old widow who had been born in Texas, and had no occupation listed; and Mattie's sister, Amy Belle Harrison, 27, who had been born in Texas, and was a school teacher.

Funeral services for Ira Colesman, 61, who died Thursday, will be held Sunday at 1 p.m. at the Ebenezer Baptist Church with the Rev. Robert L. Rowe, officiating. He was a veteran of World War I. Burial will be in the Evergreen Cemetery under the drection of Phillips and Upshaw Funeral Home.

He is survived by his wife, Mrs. Mattie Coleman; one daughter, Helen Louise Coleman; four aunts, Mrs. Carolyn Allen, and Miss Jennie Coleman of Austin, Mrs. Ellen Horn, Washington, D. C. and Mrs. Tellie Earls, Round Rock, four uncles, John Coleman and Jones Blackburn of Austin, Harry Coleman, Corpus Christiand Walter Coleman, Dallas.
