HISTORIC LANDMARK COMMISSION APRIL 27, 2015 DEMOLITION AND RELOCATION PERMITS HDP-2015-0291 2007 E. 12TH STREET

PROPOSAL

Demolish a ca. 1910 house.

ARCHITECTURE

One-story, rectangular-plan, hipped-roof, frame house with board and batten siding, a partial-width inset porch on plain, square wood posts, and a variety of windows in single and double configurations, including what is likely the original 4:4 windows on the side of the house, and a pair of 6:6 windows on the front.

RESEARCH


The house appears to have been built around 1910, and appears on the 1922 Sanborn map with its current configuration. The first known occupants were Tobe and Jessie Bryant. At the time they moved into this house, Tobe Bryant was the assistant manager of a family business, Bryant and Franklin, furniture movers, which was located at 2001 E. 12th Street. He soon thereafter became a blacksmith, and by the mid-1910s, he and his brother Lee had Bryant Brothers, a blacksmith shop, at 302 W. 14th Street. In 1918, according to his World War I draft registration card, he was a self-employed blacksmith. However, the 1920 city directory shows him working for the Tips Foundry and Machine Company, a fact that is confirmed by the 1920 U.S. Census report. He had been married to a woman named Jessie when he built this house, but by 1930, according to city directories and the census report, his wife's name was Rhoda. Tobe Bryant was listed as a stone mason in the 1930 U.S. Census, but city directories do not list his occupation for that time period. He and Rhoda moved out of this house around 1935, and by 1940, the house was a rental property. One of Tobe Bryant's sons, Euless (listed as Urless in the census report) was among the renters of the house in the early 1940s, and the large family of James and Bessie Washington are listed at 2007½ E. 12th Street – but it is not clear whether this was a separate structure, or an apartment within the house itself. In the mid-1940s, the house was the home of an African-American social club, the Lone Eagle Club, while it also had apartments that were rented. The house has remained a rental unit since the ownership of Tobe Bryant.

STAFF COMMENTS

The house is listed with a high priority for preservation in the Historic Resources Survey of East Austin (2000).

STAFF RECOMMENDATION

Postpone to May 18, 2015 to further consider alternatives to demolition. This house is remarkably intact, and has a significant history as the early home of an African-American entrepreneur, Tobe Bryant, who was involved in a family furniture moving business, as well as a family blacksmith business in the 1910s. This house is also on a large piece of property, although a large portion of it is a swale, and could serve as a centerpiece for a proposed development on the site. However, careful consideration needs to be made of the context of this house – this section of E. 12th Street was a center of the African-American community in Austin for many years – a house just down the street to the east was the home of a prominent religious leader in Austin, and it was in that house that a large African-American Baptist congregation was formed in the 1920s.

BIOGRAPHICAL NOTES

Tobe S. and Jessie Bryant; Tobe S. and Rhoda Bryant (ca. 1910 – ca. 1935)

According to his 1918 World War I draft registration card, Tobe Bryant was 44 years old, and lived at 2007 E. 12th Street. He was a self-employed blacksmith with his shop at 302 W. 14th Street. Jessie Bryant is listed as his wife.

Tobe and Jessie Bryant appear as the owners of this house in the 1920 U.S. Census. Tope Bryant was 48, had been born in Texas, and was a mechanic at a foundry. Jessie Bryant was 42, had been born in Texas, and had no occupation listed. They had no children listed with them. The 1930 U.S. Census shows Tobe and Rhoda Bryant as the owners of this house, which was worth \$1,600. Tobe Bryant was 54, and worked as a stone mason. Rhoda Bryant was 57, had been born in Texas, and had no occupation listed.

There is a Tobe Bryant listed in the 1900 U.S. Census for Taylor, Texas, whose age is the same as the Tobe Bryant who eventually lived in this house. He was a day laborer on a farm. He had a wife named Georgia, and 4 children.

There is no death record for Tobe Bryant, Jessie Bryant, or Rhoda Bryant, and none of them were buried in a city cemetery. At the time of their probable deaths, the Austin newspapers did not publish obituaries of African-American citizens.

The 1940 U.S. Census shows Robert Hearne, Walter Mitchell, and Frank Phillips as the renters of this house, with Urless Bryant and his family renting 2007½ E. 12th Street. Robert Hearne was 32, had been born in Texas, and was a porter for a state department. Walter Mitchell was 30, had been born in Texas, and was a waiter in a hotel. Frank Phillips was 29, had been born in Texas, and was a porter for a dormitory. Urless Bryant was 26, had been born in Texas, and was a cook in a dormitory. His wife, Mary was 30, had been born in Texas, and was a maid in a private home. With them lived Urless' sister, Ethel, 31, also a maid in a private home. Also at 2007½ E. 12th Street was the large family of James and Bessie Washington. James Washington was 49, had been born in Texas, and was a construction laborer. Bessie Washington was 46, had been born in Texas, and was a cook for a private family. They had 7 children: Bernice, 22, a maid for a private family; Mattie, 17; Lula, 15; Merron, 13; Viola, 11; Valley, 9; and Frank, 8. There was also a grandson in the home, Bobby Fowler, 1.
