SUBJECT: Historic Cemeteries Master Plan

The Parks and Recreation Department (PARD) will present a briefing on the Historic Cemeteries Master Plan to the Environmental Board on June 17, 2015. PARD was pleased to partner with PARD Forestry and the Urban Forest Replenishment Grant Fund for a comprehensive GIS-based tree inventory and conditions assessment, which included the identification and assessment of the condition of all trees, large shrubs, snags (standing dead trees), and stumps within all open portions (157.1 acres) of each of the cemeteries as well as approximately half of the densely wooded areas that are found along the properties' peripheries (9 acres; 166.1 acres survey area total). 






Urban Forestry Board Recommendations

- Place the irrigation proposal for all the cemeteries in Priority 1.
- Include in the General Maintenance Guidelines and each individual cemetery plan: Application of compost and mulch as well as supplemental watering of trees during periods of insufficient rainfall.
- No tree planting should be lower than a Priority 2 in the plan.
- Change Page 402 of the Cemetery Master Plan, which speaks to care of "private trees" to care of "commemorative trees."
