PROPOSAL

Demolish a house of unknown vintage.

ARCHITECTURE

One-story, L-plan house with a prominent front-gabled section containing a recessed segmental-arched entry and a battered exterior chimney, all clad in stone veneer; single and paired 1:1 fenestration.

RESEARCH

There are no listings in city directories for this address prior to 1955, but there is a water service permit for this address dating from 1948. It is clear that the house is older than a 1950s construction date would suggest, and could date even from the late 1920s, judging from its architectural style and details. Further research will be necessary to determine the history of this house prior to its listing in city directories.

From the mid-1950s through the mid-1970s, the house was owned and occupied by Tex and Margaret ("Margie") Vanzura. Tex Vanzura was an accountant, and had previously played baseball for Texas A&M University. In the late 1960s, he opened the Pink Lizard Lounge on Guadalupe Street. He and Margie divorced in 1969, and the 1973 directory shows Margaret Vanzura as the owner of the house. She worked as a mail clerk for the Texas Rehabilitation Commission. In the mid-1970s, the house was owned and occupied by the Vanzuras' daughter, Brenda, and her husband, Bobby Brady, who was a switchman for the telephone company.

STAFF COMMENTS

The house does not appear in any City survey, and Sanborn maps through 1962 do not show this area of the city. In the interim between the June meeting and today, staff has not been able to determine anything further about this house and its history prior to 1955.

STAFF RECOMMENDATION

Release the permit upon completion of a City of Austin Documentation Package consisting of photographs of all elevations, a dimensioned sketch plan, and a narrative history, for archiving at the Austin History Center. While there is an unknown history to this house prior to 1955, from what staff has gathered so far, the house does not qualify as a historic landmark.
