Mission Statement


The purpose of SMBR is

- to administer the MBE/WBE Procurement Program; and
- provide development opportunities and resources for small businesses so they can have affirmative access to city procurement opportunities and show productive growth.





Organizational Overview







What is Certification?

- Determination of a business owner's eligibility to participate in the Minority-Owned and Women-Owned Business Enterprise (MBE/WBE), Disadvantaged Business Enterprise (DBE) or Airport Concession Disadvantaged Business Enterprise (ACDBE) Procurement Programs
- Certification is a designation for eligible business owners that allows their participation to be counted towards meeting the goals on City of Austin projects/procurements.





Certification Criteria

- Business must be at least fifty-one percent (51%)
 OWNED, MANAGED and CONTROLLED by a socially and economically disadvantaged individual
 - Social Disadvantage based upon Presumed Groups:
 - Minority
 - Asian-American
 - African-American
 - Native American
 - Hispanic
 - Women
 - Economic Disadvantage based upon Personal Net Worth





Certification Division's role

- SMBR's Certification Division verifies that the Minority, Women and/or Disadvantaged Owned Business applicant owns, manages, and controls the day-today operations of the for-profit business in compliance with our Code of Ordinances.
- Program eligibility is determined by reviewing the certification application and backup documentation for ownership, management, and control by socially and economically disadvantaged business owners

- Firms must be small businesses as defined by US Small Business Administration (SBA) guidelines
- Site visits required for all firms.

Historically Underutilized Business (HUB) is a certification program offered by the State of Texas. The State of Texas may accept City of Austin certified vendors as HUB candidates.



Compliance Division's role

Compliance is responsible for program enforcement from project solicitation to completion. Duties include, but are not limited to:

- Setting MBE/WBE participation goals
- Educating constituents and participants on program requirements
- Reviewing & tracking MBE/WBE utilization
- Performing audits
- Determining contractor compliance
- Facilitating Prime/Subcontractor issues

Goal Development

All solicitations over \$58,000 MUST be reviewed by SMBR. Goal determination based upon:

- MBE/WBE availability
- Estimated Budget
- Scopes of Work or Services

Goal Calculation formula:

No. of Certified Vendors (Per Ethnicity) × % of Scope Total Vendors





Meeting Goals and Good Faith Efforts (GFE)

Proposers/contractors must meet goals or perform Good Faith Efforts, otherwise bid/proposal will not be considered

Goals are not a quota

Goal(s) can only be met by using City of Austin certified firms who are certified for commodities/ services identified in solicitation or approved by PM to use during open solicitation period

 Dual certified firms (MWBE) can be counted as either MBE or WBE but not both

Post-award program violations may result in a sanction



Good Faith Efforts Include

- Justification for not meeting MBE/WBE/DBE goals
- Notifying certified firms (fax, e-mail, mail or phone call)
- Negotiating in good faith with interested MBEs and WBEs
- Publishing notice in a local publication
- Seeking services of minority and women organizations
- Contacting SMBR for assistance
- Selecting portions of work that will increase MBE/WBE opportunities
- Assisting MBE/WBE firms with bonding, lines of credit,
 and insurance

Solicitations without Goals

If Bidders/Proposers identify subcontracting opportunities on projects without goals, compliance with MBE/WBE Procurement Program is required at all phases of project:

- Good Faith Effort Requirements/Documentation
- SMBR approval of addition/deletion/substitution
- Expenditure Report Submissions
- Contract Close-Out Submission
- Contact SMBR for an availability list





Resource Division

- Outreach
 - Monthly workshops
 - Collaboration with local small businesses
- Bonding
 - Bonding Financial Consultant on staff to meet with business owners on Bid, Payment, and Performance Bonds
- Plan Room
 - Free access to McGraw Hill Dodge Online database of plans, news, and specifications for construction projects in over 100 Texas counties
 - Paper & electronic construction plans and specifications also available
