- 1. Mobilized a Boarding Houses Task Force
 - Code, Fire, Police, Emergency Medical Services, Health and Human Services, Law and 3-1-1
- 2. Reviewed HB 216
- Retrieved 3-1-1 and Police data
- 4. Researched each Departments ability to run reports on existing group homes
- 5. Reviewed Best Practices in the Texas Cities of: El Paso, Dallas, San Antonio, Brenham
- 6. Toured group homes in District 1


What we've done

- Met with stakeholders
- 8. Drafted reasonable accommodation ordinance
- 9. Presented draft reasonable accommodation ordinance to Community Development Commission and Mayors Committee of People with Disabilities
- **10. Received** legal opinion on expanding the existing rooming and boarding house licensing program
- 11. Initiated research to identify eligible homes that meet the expanded definition

Rooming and Boarding Houses

- A building, other than a hotel, where lodging for more than six unrelated persons is provided without meals in return for compensation.
- A building, other than a hotel, where lodging and meals are provided for more than six unrelated persons in return for compensation.
 - includes a transient boarding house.





Rooming and Boarding Houses

- Requirements:
 - Zoning restrictions
 - Certificate of Occupancy
- Annual Operating License required
 - Application Fee,
 - Less than 10 units, \$110
 - Less than 50 units, \$165
 - 50 units or more, \$5 per unit
 - Inspection



 Regulated by: Austin Code, Health Dept., Austin Fire and State of Texas







Implementation

- Reasonable Accommodation Ordinance before City Council—October 15
- 2. Expand the Boarding and Rooming House Licensing Program (60-90)
 - Identify eligible properties
 - Revise case management system
 - Send notification and application
 - Process application
 - Begin inspections

Phase One	Austin Code Actions
October 15	Reasonable Accommodation Ordinance before City Council
60-90 days	Initiate residential survey and notification process to expand the rooming and boarding house program
	Stakeholder process
	Begin License and Inspection Program for residential

Phase Two	Task Force Actions
	Create Model Standards
90-180 days	Stakeholder process
	Consider Expanding the Boarding and Rooming House Licensing Program to include Commercial
	Determine Cost Analysis Fiscal Impact
	Create Task Force Inspection Process
	Update tracking and database system
	Fully Implement Program
