Letter of Intent

Title: Lanterns

In Asian cultures many community festivals utilize the lantern as a symbol of hope, love, the spirit, and contemplation. Inspired by these traditions, artist District Seven artist Teruko Nimura will work with area residents to create origami lanterns that will be used to create an illuminated outdoor procession. Teruko has worked with many in the community including the director of the Northwest Recreation Center, and the Asian American Resource Center to hold classes in origami folding..

Once the origami pieces are finalized a processional ceremony will bring the lanterns to the structure.. The origami pieces created by community members will be threaded onto solar string lights and placed horizontally along the uprights secured to the park bridge thus creating an illuminated tunnel.



Images from Artist Body of Work





Estimated budget

The budget for the entire piece is \$10,000 which includes artists fee and materials. Currently the Drawing Lines team is currently working with lumber / construction / and lighting companies to help defray artist costs, thus allowing Teruko more time to work directly with community members.

Method of installation

The piece is designed for easy installation and deconstruction. It is anticipated that a crew composed of the artists, Drawing Line team members, and project volunteers would both erect and deconstruct the project over the period of a day.

Maintenance requirements and who will maintain the piece

The proposed piece is temporary and therefore no long-term maintenance plan will be required. During the two weeks of the piece's presence in the park it will be checked on daily for any issues of vandalism or needed repair. In the event of a sever rainstorm the piece will be taken down, due to the degradation of the lanterns.

The origami lanterns that are created will be made of a material that is both foldable and water resistant so that the individual pieces will be able to stay in tact as part of the installation.

The lights that will be part of the lantern display will be both battery and solar powered and therefore will not need any electrical hook-up or generator power.

Security requirements

There are no anticipated security needs. At the moment it is anticipated that the lanterns and lights would remain in place for the two weeks that the structure is in place. If evidence of vandalism arose, these plans could be modified.





Site Specific Considerations

Because the bridge on the site in near a small fish pond and located in a very publicly accessible area, it makes for an idea spot to hold both the piece itself and a larger opening night ceremony that will support a procession by community members to the structure.

At the same time, the piece is discrete and will impede normal traffic along the bridge. The display will not stop or inhibit any other park functions from occurring.
