soon as possible.

#### Additional Backup Information

This ordinance will establish a Homestead Preservation District under Texas Local Government Code Chapter 373Awith the boundaries set by the attached map. This area will be referred to as Homestead District D.

The first Austin Homestead Preservation District (A) was established in 2007. In 2013, in response to City Council direction, staff identified and recommended three additional areas eligible for Homestead Preservation District (HPD) designation. These three areas are referred to as HPD B, HPD C, and HPD D.
