Central Health: A Key to Affordability for Low-Income Austin Residents







- Central Health is a single-purpose district, statutorily obligated to provide access to health care for low-income residents
- Keeping Austin and Travis County affordable requires a commitment to manage health care costs for our most vulnerable residents
- Central Health benefits <u>all</u> of Travis County by helping to create:
 - A better quality of life
 - A healthier workforce and healthier children
 - An innovative health care system

CENTRAL HEALTH'S 4 STRATEGIC PILLARS

Central Health is here to make our community stronger by investing in access to health care for our most vulnerable residents. We are the local public entity that connects low income Travis County residents to high-quality, cost-effective health care. We do this by working with a network of partners

like the Seton Healthcare Family, CommUnityCare, Sendero Health Plans, the Community Care Collaborative, and the Dell Medical School at The University of Texas at Austin. When health disparities are eliminated, Travis County will be a model healthy community.

HEALTH CARE

Transform health care delivery to create high quality, cost-effective, person-centered care for vulnerable people in Travis County.

HEALTH COVERAGE

Maximize enrollment in health coverage by Travis County residents through enhanced navigation, eligibility, and enrollment services.

HEALTH Infrastructure

Improve the health of the Travis County population into the future by expanding the number of providers, increasing and improving healthcare facilities. implementing enhanced technology. and serving in a coordinating capacity for the transformation of regional health care delivery.

HEALTH PROMOTION

Support the improved health of individuals and the community through implementing new health promotion activities, collecting and reporting community health indicators and establishing a Health Policy Council.



Fiscal Year 2016 Health Care & Health Infrastructure Priorities

Continue the transformation of health care delivery

- Through the Community Care Collaborative (CCC):
 - Implementation of the Integrated Delivery System (IDS) with a focus on improved access to specialty care
 - 1115 Waiver projects—including mobile health teams
- Women's health care services re-design

Continue developing local affordability solutions


- Building structurally balanced budget to continue meeting our mission

Central Health Demographics Report


- Analysis of age, poverty and race/ethnicity trends in Travis County
- Projects population increases/decreases from 2014 to 2019
- Allows Central Health and its partners to better plan for movements and increases in vulnerable populations
- Planning tool for future service methods



Expanding Health Care Delivery

CommUnityCare Mobile Teams

- Increased from three sites in fiscal year 2014 (yellow) to 12 sites in fiscal year 2015 (green)
- Teams include medical provider (physician or physician assistant), nurse, case manager and medical assistant
- No one refused service
- Offer primary and preventative care services, referrals and enrollment





Women's Health Care Services

1115 Waiver Transformation projects:

- Long acting reversible contraception (LARC) and sexually transmitted infection screening
- Centering Pregnancy program
- Four Obstetrics navigation and oncology screening projects

Women's Health Redesign pilot:

- Partnership of Central Health, Community Care Collaborative, and the Dell Medical School
- Improved data sharing
- Guidelines for care across providers
- Triage of high-risk pregnancies
- Establishing equitable resources across health centers
