Letter in Support of the waiver from AUSTIN CITY CODE § 4-9-4(A) requested by Success Foods Management Group LLC d/b/a Torchy's Tacos, located at 1822 South Congress Ave., Austin, Texas.

Dear Mr. Auzenne:

As one of the seemingly vanishing breed of native Austinite and an itinerant taco addict, the the you in enthusiastic and fervent support of the waiver from AUSTIN CITY CODE § 4-9-4(A) requested by Success Foods Management Group LLC d/b/a Torchy's Tacos ("Torchy's").

As you are aware, Section 4-9-4(A) prohibits the sale of alcoholic beverages within 300 feet of a school. Austin City Code § 4-9-4(A). Here, Torchy's new flagship store is located at 1822 South Congress Ave., some 138 feet from Fulmore Middle School, located at 201 East Mary St.

However, Section 4-9-5 lists six (6) exceptions under which alcohol sales may be conducted within the 300-foot zone created by Section 4-9-4(A) if the City Council determines that the enforcement of the distance requirement meets *any* of the following criteria:

- (1) It is not in the best interest of the public;
- (2) It constitutes waste or the inefficient use of land or other resources;
- (3) It creates an undue hardship on the applicant;
- (4) It does not serve its intended purpose;
- (5) It is not effective or necessary; or
- (6) For any other reason Council, after consideration of the health, safety, and welfare of the public and the equities of the situation, determines is in the best interest of the community.

Fulmore middleschoolers, their families, and school staff) than allowing Torchy's to serve its delectable fare to all patrons along South Congress, as well as alcoholic refreshments to its parched or singed customers 21 years of age or older. See id. § 4-9-5(6). Indeed, there is nothing more equitable than the natural complement of a cold beer or a frosty margarita with a spicy taco. No doubt the health, safety, and welfare of the Austin public will be imperiled if no cooling alcoholic beverages are available for purhase to the public at Torchy's after consuming a searing interpertor or Diablo-sauce-laden taco. Consequently, the City Council should determine that the Austin public's health, safety, welfare, and equitable interests are best served by allowing alcoholic beverages to be sold at Torchy's South Congress flagship location.

In all seriousness, the incredibly hard-working folks at Torchy's have worked their tails off over the last many years to not only serve this community, but bring outstanding and unique fare to some of the most far-flung parts of the state—all of which enhances Austin's image, brand, and allure. Because the risk of Fulmore middleschoolers illegally obtaining alcoholic drinks from Torchy's is less than nil and completely unsupported both by fact and the record before the Council, I do not believe that the general concerns AISD expresses in its Letter (and upon which city staff expressly base their recommendation to deny Torchy's waiver request) form a reasonable or justifiable basis upon which to deny the waiver Torchy's seeks.

Thank you for your time and consideration of this Letter in Support of Torchy's requested waiver, as well as for your service to this city that we all love so dearly.
